

## Copyright Compliance: Utilization of 3<sup>rd</sup> Party Content

Instructional material made available for online student use can raise legal issues on compliance.

Providing links to material available on the internet raises fewer copyright questions than copying and uploading the material. The DUT Library provides access to numerous full-text databases to which negotiated license permit linking, printing, and other necessary use in the online environment and educational setting. Subject librarians can assist locate material and make links available while ensuring appropriate authentication.

Vast amounts of material available on the Internet, may not include a statement on Copyright. Although these works may seemingly be freely accessible, it is indeed so, but only for personal consumption. The Copyright Act provides protection of such work. Anyone accessing the work must assume that works are protected by law unless otherwise stated.

One can make productive use of material found on websites for educational purpose. Users must seek permission from the copyright owner for use other than not allowed by fair use or other provisions of the Act. If you need assistance with identifying or locating the copyright owner of a work, please contact the owner of the page from which you linked to the work or contact the webmaster on the page to obtain permission for use. Permission obtained must be uploaded together with material onto the online platform, and a copy must be sent to the DUT Copyright Office for records purpose.
