1. INTRODUCTION

The Library's core mandate is to support and enhance the teaching, learning and research activities of the Durban University of Technology. The recent infrastructural developments and enhancements at the various site libraries, have transformed all our physical spaces into vibrant and interactive, flexible environments that support the various types of academic learning activities by providing both collaborative and individual study spaces.

In this report, the Library reviews activities undertaken during the course of the year and reflects on some of the highlights. We also endeavour to demonstrate how the Library encourages and supports research and scholarship through its collections, staffing, partnerships, services and physical and virtual spaces.

2. HIGHLIGHTS FOR 2019

2.1 LIBRARY WEEK

The South African library community traditionally celebrate South African Library Week every year and in 2019 it was held from 18 - 24 March 2019. Every year a theme is identified, and the theme for 2019 was *Collaborate @ your library*.

DUT Library produced a programme for the week that included a public lecture, the launch of the new library basement space at the Alan Pittendrigh Library on Steve Biko campus, and various other events and workshops. The plenary speaker at the Public

lecture was Prof. L. Dube from UNISA who provided an insightful overview of what decolonization means and what steps libraries could take to decolonize their collection.

During a workshop on *Library as publisher* Dr R. Raju (UCT) posited that the Library can enhance the scholarly output of the university by assisting faculty, researchers and students to produce new, born-digital journals, books, conference proceedings or multimedia projects. The spiralling costs of access to cutting-edge scholarly resources has necessitated a relook at the existing sourcing of resources by academic libraries.

2.2 PUBLIC LECTURE OPEN ACCESS WEEK

The second Public Lecture of the Library took place during the second semester and formed part of the Open Access Week celebrated in October 2019. Open Access Week is an annual scholarly communication event centering on Open Access and related topics. It takes place globally during the last full week of October. Former DUT Vice-Chancellor and Principal Professor Ahmed Bawa led an open lecture on the 2020 Open Access Model under the title: A Journey Towards Open Access to Scholarly

Journals: towards transformative agreements. This event was held at the DUT Hotel School and Conference, Ritson Campus on Monday, 21 October 2019.

The Library also took the opportunity at this event to launch DUT's first open-access journal and book as follows:

- The open-access journal: The African Journal of Inter/Multidisciplinary Studies (AJIMS) aims to
 explore how different academic foci could be brought together to address society-related issues.

- The open-access book: The book, *Ubungqabavu* (*Vitality*), provides practical nutritional and related financial advice targeted at students. It is available at:

DUT Library held its first Research Day on 11 September 2019. The aim of Research Day was to provide a platform for library staff who have not presented a paper at a conference. To assist interested staff, a mentorship model was implemented, where potential presenters were paired with mentors who have had previous research experience. Five Library staff presented papers based on various library themes: RFID, patterns of purchasing and use of



books, services for the differently-abled students, information-seeking behaviour, and conflict in the workplace.

The Library Staff Training and Development Committee's efforts were recognized at the DUT Council Awards in December 2019. Developing the Library into a learning organization was one of key Library strategic goals for 2015 to 2019.

2.4 LIBRARY STAFF RECOGNITION AWARDS

A Library Staff Recognition Workshop was held on the 25th of January 2019 at Coastlands Hotel. The main purpose of this event was to recognise significant contributions of the Library staff to the mission, strategic initiatives and overall operations of the Library. Awards given through the programme identified individuals who embody the organizational values and exemplify excellence in all aspects of their job performance.

Staff were able to nominate their peers for certain categories of awards and Library management identified several staff for special recognition and awards. The Library also used this event to recognise departments and faculties that have successfully worked with the Library on projects, or who have been very supportive of the Library.

She has a wealth of experience of both public and academic libraries. Prior to joining DUT she was based at University of the Western Cape where she was the Manager: Research Data and Impact Services. She was also based at the National Research Foundation, in Gauteng for five years where she was a Senior Information Specialist in the Library and Bibliometric Services division. We warmly welcome her to the DUT community.

Resignation: Ms Mbali Hlophe, stack attendant, resigned at the end of February 2019.

3. TEACHING, LEARNING AND RESEARCH


3.1 INFORMATION LITERACY FOR UNDERGRADUATES: INTEGRATING INFORMATION LITERACY (IL) INTO THE CURRICULUM

The Library continues to make gains in integrating information literacy skills into the curriculum. In higher education, information literacy has generally been defined as set of skills that enable individuals to recognize when information is needed, and to locate, evaluate, and effectively use the required information. Academic librarians have taken up the challenge to ensure that our undergraduate students are able to successfully navigate the vast amount of information that is available, and to do so in an ethical manner.

Research has indicated that Google is still the first choice for assistance for an assignment rather than prescribed and recommended textbooks or journals. Unfortunately, the Internet contains unfiltered and unsubstantiated information, and requires considerable skill to evaluate the veracity of the information. Students must acquire the skill not only to find information but also to select, evaluate and use it appropriately and effectively. Librarians have therefore worked diligently with academics to embed information literacy training into the departmental programmes, Cornerstone, GenEd Technical Literacy, and GenEd Business Communication and Information Literacy.

During 2019, the Library offered 234 face-to-face training sessions across all faculties. These sessions were supplemented with online tutorials and online assessments.

The following is a breakdown by faculty of IL initiatives for the past three years:



Faculty summary of IL training - % attendance

Disruptions caused by power cuts, student protests and non-functioning air-conditioning in the library labs at the ML Sultan campus, severely affected Information Literacy training for the Faculty of Accounting and Informatics this year. Librarians resorted to scheduling training at the Steve Biko Library labs as well as Faculty labs where available.


Training sessions were conducted with 71 international students who hail from various countries including SADC, DRC, China, Germany and France.

The IL training sessions were customised for the various groupings of students in the faculty including the Cornerstone cohort, the ECP student cohort and the Business Information Management (BIM) group. The sessions were interactive and catered for face-to-face walk-in sessions. Students had to reserve a seat ahead of the walk-in sessions, as only a certain number of students could be accommodated at a session.

IL was offered to the BTech students in the faculty and the following departments requested training for their students:

- Cost and Management Accounting
- Tax and Internal Auditing combined
- Corporate Administration

Generally, there was a slight improvement in attendance statistics for 2019, with IT BTech showing the most improved attendance. The subject librarians would be approaching lecturing staff where the attendance percentages have decreased over the last three years.



Faculty summary of IL training - % attendance


The efforts of the librarian have yielded a positive result with departments from the Faculty of Applied Sciences and there has been an increased uptake on the scheduled Information Literacy sessions compared to 2018. Despite the disruptions caused by student protest, this year cooperation from departments has improved relative to previous years. The training sessions ranged from basic instruction on information retrieval to more advanced features of evaluation and ethical use. EndNote training was also offered to BTech students. The following three groups participated in the Blackboard (TLZ) Information Literacy module:

- Cornerstone students,
- Horticulture 1st year group and
- Food and Nutrition (ECP)

The Food and Nutrition ECP group (25) received training that covered the usual content of the IL module incorporating tutorials on plagiarism and referencing.

The Plagiarism dropbox tutorial and the LibGuides were used as tools to engage the students in active learning.

Particular success stories included the Horticulture 1st year students and the Food and Nutrition ECP cohort. Of concern is the low attendance statistics for Food Technology, Sports Studies, Chemistry and Textile Technology.



Faculty summary of IL training - % attendance


The statistics above generally reflect a higher attendance for first year students as compared to previous years. This was partly due to the improved relationship between the lecturing and library staff. The S2 Industrial Engineering cohort provides an illustrative case. The lecturer concerned has decided to embed the information literacy training as part of the course module from 2020 onwards, with IL contributing 10% towards the student's final mark. This would contribute to improved attendance at the various interventions.

The first year lecturer for Technical Literacy (Electronic engineering) allocated 50% of the first assignment mark to referencing. This assignment required students to create a technical report.

Advanced levels of information training were conducted for Chemical Engineering, Industrial Engineering and Town Regional Planning BTech students. The information literacy training included topic analysis and the research process, searching for information, referencing and EndNote.

The Engineering Librarians used a blended approach to teaching Information Literacy, and made extensive use of the Library Guides (LibGuides) and TLZ (Blackboard) in conjunction with face-to-face training. These

approaches saw students engaging with pre-and post-assessment exercises as well as other tools like the LibAnswers and the Live Chat facility.

Information literacy (IL) basic training took place with various departments across the Faculty of Management Sciences. Overall, the attendance has improved from previous years, with the exceptions of Public Relations and Business Law (BTech).


The librarians at the site taught the Cornerstone face-to-face sessions jointly and this year the student attendance improved significantly. The content covered in these sessions were: An Introduction to the Blackboard module, Topic Analysis, Basic Summon Searching and Basic Referencing.

Hospitality Management ECP (35 students) received IL training, which was conducted over 5 sessions. The assessment rendered an 86% pass rate for the group.

Advanced training sessions were also conducted and some of these training initiatives took place in the evening to accommodate part-time students.

The Business Communication and Information Literacy GenEd module was offered in the 4th term, due to logistical issues. Whilst this was not ideal, the module was successfully delivered and assessed.

Departmental orientations were conducted with Marketing, Retail, Operations, Entrepreneurial Studies and Management, Public Relations, and Human Resources Management.



Faculty summary of IL training - % attendance


The Faculty of Health Sciences' participation in the IL programme generally improved during 2019 with the exception of Medical Orthotics. Although student protest action interrupted the IL programme, departments reallocated time to have the training done.

Mixed/blended teaching methods were used in the delivery of the IL lessons. Blackboard, Online Subject/Research Guides, peer/group teaching, games, debates and face-to-face teaching were used to encourage student participation in the lessons. It was evident that students preferred these interactive lessons.

There were fewer ECP groups during 2019 compared to previous years and students from this cohort reported that they found the sessions informative and that they learned skills that they did not have before. However, attendance during test week or periods close to holidays and assignment due dates saw a decrease in attendance.

The Faculty Office requested IL training, which included: referencing, paraphrasing and academic writing. Subject librarians co-ordinated the session, arranging for the Writing Centre to deliver the academic writing section whilst the subject librarians covered referencing and paraphrasing. The training was scheduled for four departments from the Faculty of Health, which included Environmental Health,

Homoeopathy, Somatology and EMCR. Unfortunately, students from EMCR did not attend the training. However, the attendance by the other three departments was very good.



Faculty summary of IL training - % attendance


IL training was offered to most departments in the Faculty of Arts and Design, across various levels. The approach adopted was to offer the training at the point of need. Thus the training was scheduled immediately after students received their first assignment for the year.

The librarian conducted departmental orientation sessions with the following departments:

- Department of Translation and Interpretation (1st years)
- Department of Journalism (Masters and BTech)

The librarian reports that she has built up an excellent relationship with the academics from this faculty which has contributed to improved attendance at IL training sessions.

An assignment for ECP students in the faculty, directed students to use only journal articles as sources of information. The Subject Librarian responded accordingly and trained students on how to identify a journal; finding a journal article; searching across journal databases and referencing journal articles.

The collaboration between the Library and the Business Information Management (BIM) programme has seen Information Literacy being recognised as valuable training and offered across the first and second year programme in the Midlands. Areas of focus were Topic Analysis, Library Database Searching, Referencing, as well as how to navigate the Subject/Research guide via the Library web page.

BIM2 students (86) were provided with refresher sessions before completing an IL assessment. All students were required to complete an IL test after attending all the lessons. An IL assessment using Blackboard for the BIM cohort was used and the test scores contributed 30% toward the student's research project.

Accounting students of the ECP cohort were given an essay type assignment designed to assess their understanding on how to find Thesis/Dissertations as well as how to apply in-text referencing and compile a reference list in an assignment. Eighty percent of the students received more than seventy - five percent on the assignment. Of particular concern this year, is the low attendance by Ecotourism 1 and Public Management BTech students.

Formal IL sessions were conducted for the GenEd groups: Business Communication and Information Literacy (BCIL) and Business Information Literacy (BILT). BILT took place in the first semester and BCIL took place in the second semester during the third quarter. The BILT group consisted of Public Management, Local Governance and Supply Chain Management. The BCIL group consisted of Human Resource Management, Public Relations Management, and Business Administration. Both BCIL and BILT groups

completed an assessment, which contributed 30% towards the students' final mark. All the assessments were completed online via TLZ (Blackboard).

IL sessions for the Cornerstone group took place during the first semester. Unfortunately, most of the students had not been uploaded to TLZ by the time the assessment was made available. One of the factors that contributed to this challenge was late registration.

Management ECP students (41) started attending IL classes towards the end of February. Extensive support material was provided via the Subject/Research guide (LibGuides) as well as via TLZ. Content covered included:

- Library services and facilities
- Library collection (Books, periodicals and reference materials)
- Topic analysis
- Finding library resources using the library database
- Library website LibGuides, LibChat & Tutorials
- Plagiarism and basic referencing

Ecotourism for the ECP cohort was introduced in 2019. The department only managed to put in place a coordinator very late and although a time slot was scheduled for students, most of them did not attend the training sessions. As a result, this group did not complete the IL assessment planned for 2019. This issue has been flagged to be resolved at the beginning of the first semester of 2020.

3.2 RESEARCH AND POSTGRADUATE SUPPORT

The Library facilitates research and innovation and has positioned itself as a provider of customised and focussed support for postgraduate students at the institution. It aims to make a meaningful contribution to the postgraduate attributes of competency in information and digital literacy, building in-depth subject knowledge, and fostering an understanding of scholarly publishing. With the support of the Research and Postgraduate Support Directorate and Faculties, the Library has set up Research Commons facilities at four of the six site libraries. A Research Commons is a dedicated space that limits access to postgraduate students and researchers. Currently the Library employs three full-time Postgraduate Librarians who provide a comprehensive service to the community. Below are a few highlights for this division during 2019:

- Planning and developing content for referencing workshops (including flashcards and an assessment game).
- A series of Research Support SWOT meetings.
- A number of Information Literacy and Digital Literacy workshops.
- Library Research Day mentoring.
- PhD Review: Compilation of a report for the impending PhD Review at DUT.
- Updating both the Postgraduate Guide to the Library and the Academics Guide to the Library.

3.2.1 WORKSOPS AND SERVICES

Fifty-four face-to-face workshops were offered to postgraduate students, academic staff and researchers with an overall attendance of **938** for the year.



It is evident that 'Searching for Information Resources', 'EndNote' and 'Word4Thesis' are the most popular workshops and are well-established. The 'Referencing' and 'Systematic Reviews' workshops have been recently introduced and show potential to gain popularity. Positive and supportive feedback about the workshops has been received throughout the year. The image on the right depicts a tweet for one of the well-attended training sessions held on a Saturday.




The annual statistics for queries answered by the postgraduate librarians appear in the table below. Statistics are presented for the past three years. It is apparent that there is an increase in referencing and Turnitin queries. However, the most time-consuming queries are usually those requiring assistance with formatting theses in MS Word.

3.2.2 USE OF THE RESEARCH COMMONS

The Research Commons at the AP (Steve Biko campus) and BM Patel (ML Sultan campus) are used by Masters and Doctoral Students. There has been a decrease in the usage of these facilities, however, the statistics are reflected of the print registers that are signed by students. Statistics from the access control system would provide a more accurate reflection of the usage.



3.3 POSTGRADUATE SUPPORT (MIDLANDS)

There is a close collaboration between the Durban and Midlands postgraduate librarians.

The introduction of formal support for postgraduate services in the Midlands is new, yet despite this, the librarian reports an increase in usage of the services and requests for training and other assistance.

In the Midlands, most of the queries relate to accessing information resources and navigating the library databases.

Comprehensive training is offered; however, very few can attend these interventions as they are part-time students. Where possible, librarians have accommodated these students by scheduling training on a Saturday. See the table for a breakdown of the training initiatives hosted at the Midlands campus libraries.

Over and above the timetabled workshops, librarians also accommodate walk-ins. These walk-ins receive assistance in how to download and use EndNote, as well as in searching techniques when using databases such as SABINET, Current and Completed research database, SA ePublications, Summon and the DUT Open Scholar repository.

3.4 BIBLIOMETRICS WORKSHOP

In partnership with the Research Office, the Library arranged Bibliometric training for both librarians and researchers. The workshop was widely advertised using the noticeboard and Pinboard. Training was held on the 29 to 30 October 2019 and was facilitated by staff from the University of Pretoria. Fifteen (15) library and academic staff attended this intervention.

3.5 PHD PROGRAMME REVIEW

A report was prepared by the Postgraduate librarians and submitted to CQPA during 2019 for the internal review for the PhD programme.

3.6 TUTORS IN THE LIBRARY

The Library once again appointed library tutors to help students with general and information queries. The call for applications was sent to the LIS academic department and the target group were DUT LIS graduates, including those who were registered for a BTech or higher qualification. An exception was made regarding applicants in the Midlands as there were no LIS graduates in that area. The Training Librarian set up an intensive training schedule to ensure that these tutors would be able to assist students with most queries.

4. RESOURCE MANAGEMENT AND SUSTAINABILITY


4.1 INFORMATION RESOURCES BUDGETS

4.1.1 BUDGET ALLOCATION

R1,677,450 was allocated for books and media for 2019. This represents a 5.5% increase compared to the total of R1,590,000 received in 2018. The allocated amount was divided as per the Information Resources

Management Policy, based on a formula of student numbers (FTE's of 2018), average price of material, and usage figures.

Budget allocation

R14,849,500 was allocated for subscriptions to databases, periodicals and newspapers for 2019 – an increase of 12.58 % from 2018.

Expenditure

Most of the large journal and database invoices were paid at the beginning of 2019 when the invoices were received. Credit notes were also collected for outstanding journals to the value of R28,814, resulting in a surplus of R26,754.

4.3 USAGE

4.3.1 E-RESOURCES

Full text databases

- A substantial increase of 61% in the number of full text items viewed as compared to 2018. In 2019,1 061 350 full text were viewed, compared with 659 293 for 2018.
- •519 164 of the full text items viewed were from the database Worth Global Style Network (WGSN), which was the most used database for 2019.

Abstracting/In dexing Databases

- In 2019, 92 694 searches were performed in the abstracting/indexing databases compared to the 15 308 searches in 2018, translating into an increase of 505%. This is attributed to the 603% increase in usage for Web of Science.
- Waters & Oceans Worldwide decreased by 16.24% from 2 868 searches in 2018 to 2 402 in 2019
- Web of Science increased by 603% from 12440 searches performed in 2018 to 87 447 searches in 2018

e-book usage

•The number of full text (subscriptions and purchased titles) for e-books viewed, during 2019 was 168 715, an increase of 8.56% over the total of 155 492 e-books viewed in 2018.

-e-book subscription packages

- •Encyclopedia Britannica increased by 27.66%
- E-book Central usage increased by 8.61%
- Jaypee Digital usage decreased by 10.22%

e-book purchased packages

- Science Direct e-book usage increased by 35.61%,




Most downloaded database, journal and e-book titles

Science Direct was one of the most popular databases for 2019 with 208,195 full text downloads, and five journals from Science Direct featured in the top five most-downloaded journals.




The most-used journal for 2019 was *Bioresource Technology* with 6,690 full-text downloads, followed by the journals *Renewable and Sustainable Energy Reviews, Journal of Cleaner Production, Water Research and Science of the Total Environment* with 3266, 3121, 3085 and 2651 full-text downloads respectively. This is the third consecutive year that both journals *Bioresource Technology* and *Renewable and Sustainable Energy Reviews* featured in the top five journal downloads and the second consecutive year that journals *Water Research* and *Journal of Cleaner Production* featured in the top five journal downloads.


E-books: The five most-downloaded, library-owned e-books were acquired from Science Direct, Ebook Central, Ebsco, and Cambridge for 2019. These statistics were analysed further and the five most-downloaded e-books (DUT owned) were from *Ebook Central*, *EBSCO* and *Elsevier (Science Direct)*.



Usage trends: The graph below illustrates usage of electronic resources 2014 to 2019.



The graph depicts the usage trend for Full-text downloads 2016 to 2019. Significant decreases in usage were from the EBSCO SANLIC package, ProQuest and Springer, while Science Direct and WGSN remained the top-used resources for five consecutive years.



4.4 DIGITAL REPOSITORIES

4.4.1 INSTITUTIONAL REPOSITORY (DUT OPEN SCHOLAR) UPLOADS

186 (166 theses and 20 research articles) items were uploaded into DUT Open Scholar during 2019. 36 current research titles for the Faculty of Engineering and Built Environment were uploaded to the Nexus database. The Nexus database is currently under revision and all updates on current titles are paused until further notice

New workflows: The new Library workflows for the submission of theses dissertations was implemented for the September graduation. Some Faculty Officers have uploaded theses directly to DUT Open Scholar, thereby making the resource available in the shortest possible time. All faculties should be using this facility from 2020.



4.5 WEB USAGE

4.5.1 SUMMON (DISCOVERY TOOL)

The number of searches performed on Summon for 2019 was 838,406. In 2018, 473,811 searches were done, indicating an increase of 76.94%.



4.6 LIBRARY INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

- The **Library User Satisfaction Tool** has been implemented across library sites. Preliminary data indicates that students are rating the library positively, with an average score of 4 out of 5.
- **WIFI**: There have been reports of limited or no Wi-Fi connectivity at some of our libraries. The library has informed ITSS about areas where Wi-Fi was problematic.
- Cashless Library: Prashanth Sivsaran and Sagren Moodley met with a representative from Standard Bank and Konica to determine the different options that are available for a cashless solution. After many meetings, the library still does not have a viable solution.
- Installation of new computers: As part of the University's Computer replacement project, the library benefitted by receiving 223 new computers. The majority of library student ezones have now been refitted with new computers.
- **Library Virtual Assistant**: The library is partnering the IT Department on a project to implement a Library Virtual Assistant

4.6.1 IT AND SYSTEMS

4.6.1.1 COMPUTER BOOKINGS

Usage of the BM Patel (ML Sultan campus) and AP (Steve Biko campus) Libraries has decreased significantly due to the venues being closed for various reasons. Due the lack of air-conditioning, one of the BM Patel Library Ezones was closed for most of the year.

5. INFRASTRUCTURAL RESOURCES

This section of the report refers to the refurbishment and enhancement of existing spaces in the Library. The refurbished library basement at the Steve Biko campus was officially launched in March 2019 during Library Week. The new space incorporates 12 group rooms and three seminar rooms that vary in size, 150 desktop stations, 60 laptop stations, archives storage and workroom, stack area, three staff offices, ablution facilities, as well as casual, relaxed seating areas.

During the course of 2019, Library Management acceded to CELT's request to host support centres in the Library. CELT support centres are now operating at Alan Pittendrigh, Indumiso and City libraries. These centres incorporate Technology for Learning, First-Year Student Experience, and Residence Education Programme services.

5.1. FACILITIES MAINTENANCE

The air-conditioning on the second floor of BM Patel Library (ML Sultan campus) had not been working since October 2018 and for the whole period of 2019. This resulted in extremely poor air quality as library windows are sealed. With the heat emanating from over 40 computers, the situation became untenable and library management had no option but to cancel all training in these facilities. Other venues had to be sourced for the training. After the lengthy tender process for the air-conditioning system, new air-conditioning units were finally installed in December 2019.

The BM Patel Library has been plagued with a number of infrastructure-related problems, which disrupted library services. These included water leaks from the cooling towers that damaged the 4th floor Research Commons, uncovered electrical skirting's that became a hazard, and faulty lifts. The lifts at BM Patel Library are due to be replaced with new ones in 2020. The repairs to the BM Patel Library roof took place during the first semester and the contracting company caused immense damage due to poor workmanship.

Central Services: a number of infrastructure-related problems affected this section of the library as well, such as: roof leaks, faulty air-conditioning system and plumbing issues in the bathrooms. Some of these problems have only been partially resolved. These faults can mainly be attributed to lack of regular maintenance and the age of the building.



In terms of circulation of materials and headcounts, the Alan Pittendrigh Library on the Steve Biko campus has the highest statistics compared to the other site libraries. This is largely attributed to the proximity of the student residences as well as the fact that this is one of two library sites that offer 24/7 access to the library during the exam periods. This library also boasts the highest seating capacity. The other 24-hour library site is the Indumiso Campus Library. This campus also has a student residence and its library is well-used.

There is a notable decrease in photocopying and printing at all sites. It is still too early to speculate as to the reason for this although we are inclined to link this to greater access to online resources and the ability to scan and save content to devices rather than generating photocopies.

6. STAFF TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT

The Library has a diverse staff complement of 81 permanent staff members located at six sites. In terms of gender, the staff are made up of 53% female and 47% male staff. Below is a pie chart that reflects the racial demographics of the Library.
