I. Introduction

The report provides an overview of DUT Library Services from January 2022 to December 2022. The continuity of Coronavirus (COVID-19) regulations, lockdowns, and health protocols during the first semester caused serious service and access disruptions across all DUT libraries. Nonetheless, the prevailing circumstances presented the library with opportunities to explore new ways and technologies of delivering library and information services to the university community. In view of the numerous achievements highlighted in the report, the library has had a productive year.

A new culture of research and publications was unleashed for the betterment of the library's positioning within the academic project. Upon my arrival as the Library Director, I began inculcating a culture of research and publishing to see more library staff contributing towards the sustainable future of DUT through publications. "It is a matter of 'publish' or 'perish' for the masters and doctorate holders in the library". To achieve this, a library colloquium and writing workshops were offered to provide library staff members with relevant skills to produce high-impact publications from their research. As a result, the library has published eight research outputs, seven in national and international open access journals and monographs approved by DHET. Other outputs are still in process or in press.

Furthermore, the library has signed a transformative agreement with Wiley as part of its strategy to enhance its footprint in open access knowledge production, dissemination, and discoverability of the university's high-impact research. The Wiley transformative agreement affords DUT researchers to publish in high-impact journals without having to pay Article Processing Charges (APCs). Taking advantage of this opportunity, our researchers published eight (8) publications in Wiley journals without incurring APCs. We expect more researchers to take advantage of this opportunity in the coming year. Transformative agreements and many other open access initiatives help to make the university's research enterprise more open, inclusive, developmental, and sustainable.

As part of the library's contribution to assisting the university with postgraduate supervision capacity concerns, all PhD holders in the library were urged to start postgraduate supervision in their areas of specialization. Human capital development is crucial to the library's ability to provide smart library services, resources, spaces, and technologies to its smart-university community. As a result, the library's leadership invested in a variety of capacity building projects relative to these smart technologies, services, and spaces in order to align the minds and hearts of the staff with the organization's vision and strategic objectives.

1.1. Highlights

- **Launch Indumiso Research Commons**

As part of re-imaging its spaces, the DUT Library launched a Research Commons at the Indumiso Campus. The project launched is aligned with strategic objectives on the digital environment and state-of-the-art Infrastructure from the systems and processes perspective. The Research Commons is a dedicated state-of-the-art research facility to support postgraduate students and researchers. There is sufficient space for future expansion as the demand increases.

- **Library Colloquium**

As part of supporting and sustaining a culture of research and publication, a colloquium was arranged for the library staff on the 16th of November 2022. The DUT Library hosted its first inaugural annual colloquium where 11 papers were presented by library staff members. DUT Library staff presentations were based on experiences and practice-based topics, conference presentations and masters' dissertations that were completed in 2022. The purpose of this initiative is to encourage the library staff to continue to participate in the production of scientific conference papers, further their studies and present their current and completed research publications. Some of these papers are conference-ready for presentation at LIASA2023, while others are ready for publication.

- **Library Benchmarking**

Library Management undertook a benchmarking exercise with the University of Cape Town, University of Johannesburg and the University of Stellenbosch. The purpose of the benchmarking exercise was to investigate organizational structures as well as to explore particular specialist areas in preparation for the library structural review and the development of the Library ENVISION2030 aligned strategy.

- **Smart Libraries Webinar by Dr Clara Chu, University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign**

The recent buzz in the library has been about smart libraries, smart people, smart services, smart technology and smart spaces. In keeping with this theme, library management invited Dr Clara Chu, Director of the Mortensen Centre for International Library Programmes at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign. As an expert on emerging technologies and trends, she was invited to share her experiences with library staff members, as well as students and staff from the Department of Information Systems.

- **Library Makerspace Launch**

The library launched a new social and dynamic technological space known as the Makerspace at the Indumiso Campus Library on 30 August 2022. The facility houses 4IR technologies which include 3D technology printers, 3D scanners; Drone Phantom, Lego, Raspberry, VR

headset, a large interactive screen, Raspberry Pi kits and PCs and many other latest equipment and technologies aimed at stimulating creativity, innovation and entrepreneurship.

- **Systematic Review**

For the period under review, there has been an increase in desktop research methods. One such method is the use of systematic reviews for conducting research. Postgraduate librarians are becoming more frequently requested to participate in database selection and searching tactics, either as team members or as experts. In response to the increasing demand for consultation on systematic reviews among postgraduate librarians, researchers, and students, a series of workshops on systematic reviews, designing search strategies, and using Endnote were established in partnership with the research support department. The main purpose of the workshops is to bring awareness to the processes, available resources, and software that support systematic reviews.

- **Durban International Book Fair (DIBF)**

DUT Library participated in the Durban International Book Fair (DIBF) that took place from 1 to 5 August 2022 at the Isibaya Conference Centre. The DUT Library partnered with the Writing Centre and Corporate Affairs at the recent Durban International Book Fair. The fair was held at the Sibaya Conference Centre in the first week of August. The joint team not only manned an exhibition stand for the duration of the book fair but was also involved in two major events that took place during the weeklong fair. The first event was the launch of a book called “*Planting the Seeds: emerging student voices*” which was compiled by the Writing Centre and published on the library’s open books platform. The second event was a panel discussion which highlighted the copyright issues that impact authors and the publishing industry.

- **Performance Review**

Inculcating a culture of accountability is a priority for the DUT Library and a critical pillar for the successful rollout of the performance management system across the system. To this end, for the period under review, 99% of library staff signed the performance contracts and completed their mid-term review reports. The Library almost achieved a 100% compliance target except for one individual staff member who did not complete the contracting due to her nearing retirement.

- **Operationalising an MOU with the Department of Information Science**

On 28 September 2022, the library management met with staff and the management team from the Department of Information Systems to operationalise a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) signed with the Library and Information Science Programme (LIS). On this day, presentations and speeches were delivered by teams from both the library management and the Information Systems Department.

- **Ground Floor: BM Patel Library**

The ground floor at BM Patel Library is now fully operational after it suffered fire damages that occurred 2 years ago. The whole ground floor was closed for public use as it was in the hands of the insurance company for repairs ever since the fire accident took place. The floor has been revamped from floor to ceiling, however, there are still a few items outstanding. These are being dealt with as we are carrying on with the business of the day.

- **Supporting Multimodal Approach**

The library has invested much of its investment philosophy in building electronic collections of information resources, services, and products. It is for this reason that the DUT Library has managed to move with speed in response to the new normal.

- **PERLEGO: New E-Textbook Resource Platform**

The library has subscribed to PERLEGO, an e-book database that contains over 800,000 books. The subscription model provides access to all the resources per student licence. As a single licence costs around R900 per year, the library has decided to pilot this resource in 2022. Currently, 200 licences have been allocated for student use.

- **South African Library Week**

The library commemorated South African Library Week (SALW) from March 14 to 22, 2022, and as part of the commemoration, a public lecture event was held on March 17. This event was held virtually and received positive feedback. Mr Nazeem Hardy, the President of the Library and Information Association of South Africa (LIASA) presented the public lecture entitled “The theme for the SALW was ReImagined, Repurposed, Rediscovered”. The theme resonated with several library programmes and strategic directions.

- **Preparing for Change: Change Management Workshop**

Change is inevitable in any organization to remain competitive, relevant and aligned to pressures at the micro and macro levels. The academic library is a dynamic environment where change is constant. It is for this reason, that a library workshop on change management was organized and attended by all staff to provide suitable tools and techniques to deal with change in both the workplace and our everyday lives.

- **Open Access Week**

The DUT Library commemorated the International Open Access (OA) Week with colourful and creative displays, a public lecture, and the publishing and launch of an open access book, titled “**Critical Reflections on Professional Learning During Covid-19: Context, Practice and Change**” by HELTASA via the DUT Open Monograph Press platform. Open Access Week was celebrated in South Africa and globally from 24 to 30 October 2022. This is an annual international event celebrated by institutions and people across the globe. The International OA community celebrates this momentous week to encourage libraries, researchers, and institutions to deliberate and tackle critical issues about open access. As part of celebrating International OA Week and advancing the discourse on open access within the university, the DUT Library hosted on the 27 October 2022, a Public Lecture “**A Fair Pricing**

Model For Open Access", which was presented by Miss Faranah Osman, an Executive Director responsible for Information Communication Technology (ICT) and Knowledge Resources at the National Research Foundation of South Africa. Participants at this event included library staff, academics, and researchers who engaged in a robust discussion about publishing on open access platforms.

The second event was a seminar on transformative agreements facilitated by Glen Truran and Nora Buchanan from South African National Library and Information Consortium (SANLIC). The discussion focused on the transformative agreements that DUT had signed. Dr Suleiman Patel, one of the other presenters at the seminar, shared his experience with his uptake of the Wiley transformative agreement.

- **Staff Recognition Award Function**

The annual library staff recognition function was held on April 22 at the Coastland Hotel to celebrate staff achievements and milestones for the year 2021 as part of the strategic priority focus area of stewardship.

- **Writing for Publications Workshops**

Library management has invested in capacity development initiatives to instil a culture of research and publication, and to see library staff contributing to the sustainable future of the university through scientific knowledge production. Three targeted publication writing workshops were held during the period under review and were attended by a number of the library professional staff. The writing workshops were facilitated by Prof Saras Reddy from UKZN.

- **Improvement in the Submission of Theses and Dissertations**

Several long overdue theses from the Faculty of Management Sciences and the Faculty of Health Sciences were submitted to the library in 2022. Some of these items were overdue in 2018. This process increased compliance with the Policy on Institutional Repository.

- **Africa Day Celebrations**

The library collaborated with the International Education and Partnerships (IEP) office to commemorate Africa Day in May. The joint team organised a virtual public lecture event as well as a physical event to commemorate Africa Month. The virtual guest lecture was held on 25 May via MS Teams and the guest speaker was Dr Ismail Lagardien, an author who recently published a book titled "*Ismail Lagardien's Memoir: Too White to be Coloured, Too Coloured to be Black*". This was a hybrid narrative, blending memoir with social commentary and political analysis. As part of promoting African literature and authors, a variety of eloquent speakers were invited and they articulated their work around African origin and their writing experiences. Amongst some of the authors that took part in the proceeding was Dudu-Busani Dube, the renowned author of the Hlomu Series.

- **Library Divestment Philosophy Initiatives**

An information audit of the extent of usage of the library information resources is an important activity to ensure that library resources (physical and electronic) stay relevant to support and sustain the academic project. It is in this regard that during this term, subject librarians in collaboration with academic staff from across faculties and sites, managed successfully to complete the 2021 weeding. This included discards of the video collection and other information resources that are outdated and irrelevant to support the academic programme. The Library is currently working on the stack area discards. The stack area includes certain resources that have not been used in more than five years and some in three decades. This exercise will assist the library to free the much-needed spaces for new resources, learning and research spaces.

- **Work Integrated Learning (WIL) Programme**

During the year under review, the library hosted two (2) groups of students from the Library and Information Studies (LIS) for their WIL programme. This forms part of implementing and strengthening a memorandum of understanding (MOU) between the library and the LIS programme at DUT.

- **SRC Donation of K53 Manuals to the Library**

In August, the SRC donated 90 copies of the K53 learner books to the library. This SRC initiative will ensure that all students who are undertaking learner or driver's license tests would have access to these resources from the library.

1.2. Lowlights

- **Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) Project**

There were numerous delays in the completion of this project. The tagging of the books from the Alan Pittendrigh library has been disrupted many times due to student riots and other infrastructure issues, but these were eventually completed in February 2022. The last phase of the project was the acquisition of the kiosks and installation of student self-check units, both projects were completed in December. The library is ready for launch in the first quarter of 2023.

- **Flooding in the Province and Its Impacts on Libraries**

The recent flooding in the KZN province has had an unprecedented negative impact on humanity and life in general. Two of our libraries, Alan Pittendrigh (AP) and City Campus were not spared a moment. AP Library at Steve Biko was flooded and had to close for about a week. City Campus Library was the worst affected, flooded to over 1.8 meters on its basement floor and had to close for more than two months for the replacement of the damaged infrastructure, furniture and electrical supply. This natural disaster has had negative impacts on service delivery, availability and access to these two campus libraries.

- **Internet / Wi-Fi Connectivity Issues**

There were many Wi-Fi problems during August. This had a negative impact on our work, as librarians couldn't be online to respond to queries and search for information. Furthermore, poor connectivity and connecting via Smartphones have presented challenges for staff and students.

- **Loadshedding**

Loadshedding has become regular and has caused significant disruptions to library services. This is very disruptive for students who have to leave libraries when the power goes out. It also impacts staff operations. This has negatively affected library access, availability, and service delivery to library users across campuses. The network was also affected by continuous blackouts, which impacted productivity.

- **Cases of Copyright Infringement**

The library recently noticed an increase in Copyright infringement and Intellectual Property ownership cases involving academic staff members during print room audits. This is mainly a result of the ease with which digital resources can be copied and distributed online. Academics need to ensure compliance to avoid infringement, which could lead to financial or reputational damage to the institution.

- **Statistics**

The FOLIO system is unable to generate all the statistics required. This has limited the library's ability to map usage of the library collection and report appropriately at forums, including for programme reviews. Panorama delays are exacerbating this challenge.

- **Poor Attendance of Information Literacy**

Academics have recognized the value of sending students to IL training. However, it was frequently observed that attendance for online IL sessions was low. One of the factors cited as contributing to low attendance was poor connectivity. Students often signed in, then left the session or did not attend at all. Attendance at advanced IL training was also low, as several departments failed to expose their senior students to the interventions provided. It was clear that many senior students had never had any library training. These students frequently seek assistance from any librarian's office.

- **BM Patel Library Fire Repairs**

This ageing library on the ML Sultan campus has been plagued by infrastructural issues such as water leaks, faulty air conditioners, and malfunctioning elevators, all of which have contributed to the disruption of services at this site library. On November 25, 2020, the BM Patel Library was destroyed by a fire that damaged the ground level and the Library IT section. Fortunately, no staff members or students were injured. The fire severely damaged the library's IT computer room and equipment. The ground level of the library was closed to enable forensic investigations to determine the cause of the fire and the processing of insurance claims. An

alternate entrance on the first floor of the library was created to allow operations to continue. The repairs at the BM Patel Library ground floor took longer than expected, largely due to insurance claim-related issues and the appointment of the service providers.

- **Library Closures**

Indumiso and Riverside Libraries closed several times due to power cable theft and water cuts respectively. Such closures impacted negatively on the service delivery and access to library and information services.

- **Student Protests**

During the riots and student protests, libraries became popular targets. Due to student protests, some libraries were forced to close. As a result, library service delivery and availability suffered.

- **Outdated Library Structure**

The outdated library structure, based on the obsolete traditional print model, renders the library irrelevant, non-responsive, and ineffective in responding to the new service requirements and technological changes posed by the Fourth Industrial Revolution and new scholarly communication models. The library hopes to address these structural inefficiencies once the institutional structural review phase 2 starts within the teaching and learning sector environment.

- **Library Research Colloquium**

This colloquium took place on 16 November 2022. This was done to extend the library profile from supporting research to including participating in research. The colloquium was an initiative where we created a 'safe space' for the library to engage in reflecting on practice-based research. It was divided into 3 streams, namely:

Stream 1: Lightening talks (open to all library staff that wish to share about their practice or any projects that they worked on).

Stream 2: Recently completed qualifications (Highlights from the research findings).

Stream 3: Conference presentations (Papers/posters presented at conferences).

- **Library Webinar**

Dr Clara Chu from the University of Illinois at Urban-Champaign Library presented an online webinar on “Smart and Smarter Libraries: from concepts/idea to action”. The webinar took place on 16 September 2022.

- **Mentorship:**

- ✚ Mrs Nomonde Mqalelo resigned in October to take an offer elsewhere, after serving the university for 12 years.

2.2. Institutional Culture

• Operational Planning: development of the Library 2022 EAPP

The library management team worked on operational plans that cascaded from the Strategic Plan and developed the Library's Extended Annual Performance Plan (EAPP). This plan cascaded from the DVC: T&L's EAPP and contributed toward the operational planning and development of Performance agreements.

• Institutional Audit

The Library has made submissions to CQPA in preparation for the upcoming audit. A working group has been established with Dr Paulette Powell to coordinate the institution's preparation and submission of the SER. The Library SER coordinators have been engaging with this group and a library report has been submitted together with associated evidence.

- **LibQual Survey**

Library Management is currently interrogating the survey report to identify areas of improvement. A summarized report has been compiled and shared with Management. The survey will be administered every 2 years going forward.

- **Performance Review Culture**

Inculcating a culture of accountability is a priority for the DUT Library and a critical pillar for the successful rollout of the performance management system across the system. To this end, for the period under review, 99% of library staff signed the performance contracts and completed their mid-term review reports. The Library almost achieved a 100% compliance target. This is due to one staff member who did not complete the contracting due to her nearing retirement.

- **Programme Reviews**

Library reports were submitted for the following reviews. In some cases, there were site visits as well.

A program review and evaluation report for the Civil Engineering Department was received. Although there wasn't anything for the library to respond directly to, there were issues that may require some attention. These issues include promoting electronic collections and paying attention to student challenges with online learning.

2.3. Creativity

2.3.1. Marketing of Events/Webinars

The Twitter account @dutlibresearch was active. The final Read for Research alert for the year was issued in October.

- Read for Research alerts were compiled and distributed by the postgraduate librarians (Ms Mitha and Ms Finlayson). The monthly alerts showcased useful research books and other research resources available to DUT researchers and postgraduate students.



- EndNote Retraction Watch:** This new feature identifies retracted papers in an EndNote library. It was shared in the formal RCDP library information sessions offered by the postgraduate librarians.
- The Rayyan app** was recently improved and the free version offers researchers a means of facilitating the screening process in systematic, scoping and other types of reviews. This helpful resource was highlighted in the information session offered by the postgraduate librarians on RCDP Systematic reviews: Developing search strategies and using EndNote.
- DUT Harvard Style File for Mendeley:** there have been problems getting the style file to our Mendeley users. LIT uploaded the incorrect file and is now trying to sort it out. Hopefully, this will be done soon. Due to this confusion, some supervisors have insisted that postgrads move their references from Mendeley to EndNote.

2.3.2. Promotion of New Technologies and Services

- **Ebsco Discovery System (EDS) Testing**

With the implementation of the discovery tool, librarians were engaged to conduct rigorous testing of the platform to ensure that results and facets were working the way they were supposed to. Problems identified were reported and are being addressed. Librarians have attended training on the platform and are currently rolling out training to students and staff at DUT. Subject librarians have been actively promoting the discovery tool at various forums. Several training sessions (individual and group) with staff and students have been held to raise awareness and develop competencies for using the tool.

- **Investigation of eBook Platforms**

To build the e-book collection to support the Academic programme, a subscription to the Perlego eBook collection has been subscribed to. A pilot investigation is underway with access being granted on a needs basis within identified programmes.

- **Library Videos**

The training librarian and the marketing librarian have been working together with the service provider in developing the library videos. The 3 videos would be used for Marketing and instructional purposes. Unfortunately, various delays have impacted the project.

- **Makerspace Launch**

The new makerspace facility was launched at Indumiso on 30 August 2023. This facility has cutting-edge technology such as 3d printing and scanners, smart screens and many more.

2.3.3. Innovative Projects

- **Study Guide**

An information services task team worked on updating the IL study guide. The review of the guide was necessary to bring it up to date with new ideas and technologies being used in information literacy. The guide was amended and is now almost complete.

- **IL for Schools**

A library task team involved in creating an online information literacy package for high school learners has reviewed the content and format of the tutorial videos and has repackaged it relative to the environment within which it would be piloted. This will be piloted with an identified school within the Imbali Precinct project. The project has been postponed to obtain the necessary ethical clearance.

- **How to Videos**

The training librarian worked with the marketing librarian to develop a how-to video for EndNote installation to support users when downloading and installing the software. This is hosted on the Library website and the YouTube channel.

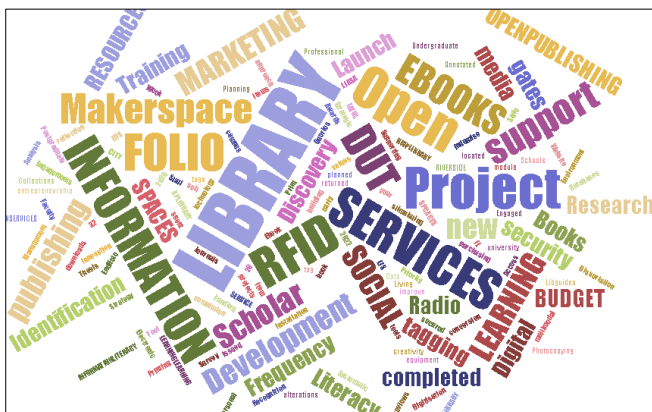
Currently, the training librarian and the marketing librarian are working on a Self-check system video tutorial in collaboration with the circulation coordinators. The tutorial will assist students in navigating this new technology in the library.

- ✓ **Orientation Video**

The marketing librarian worked training the librarian on an orientation video for undergraduates which was featured in the institutional orientation programme. A further training video was developed to be used by librarians at their departmental orientation sessions.

- ✓ **Tipasa**

The DUT Librarians have always initiated the ILL pre-request on behalf of the students or staff. The Tipasa application would allow the patron to initiate the requests. The trial was set up by SABINET however the trial was not well utilised and the cost of subscribing to Tipasa was extremely high.



3. PERSPECTIVE: Systems and Processes

3.1. Innovative Curricula and Research

3.1.1. Teaching and Learning Support

3.1.1.1 Undergraduate Support Services

- **Cornerstone and Information Literacy (IL):**

IL integration into the Cornerstone module was negotiated by the Manager: Academic Services and the GenEd coordinators. Access to the Moodle classroom was granted.

The training librarian worked on updating the lesson content and assessments. She further edited, developed and uploaded video tutorials related to the section content. She also manages the student queries related to IL. Currently, IL is offered via the Moodle platform.

- **Information Literacy:**

Information Literacy is about developing the skills of staff and students to recognize when and what kinds of information are required to address a particular information need, know what sources to consult, successfully navigate the medium/platform to retrieve the information and then apply that information ethically.

Librarians embraced the multimodal approach to teaching and learning this year. It entailed a high learning curve as well as additional administrative work associated with creating and delivering lectures and providing support in an online environment. Librarians are now teaching Information Literacy fully online and are actively utilizing platforms like MS Teams, Moodle and LibGuides to deliver content, host support material and even administer assessments in some instances. Librarians continue to explore alternative teaching strategies and applications that encourage participation and engagement with the students however it has been noted that participation in the online teaching environment (MS TEAMS) was minimal. Students are still experiencing connectivity challenges when trying to access the IL training sessions, however, recordings of the lectures are posted on the various platforms mentioned above.

The uptake for IL training sessions by departments varies and in some cases despite the efforts of librarians, some students do not benefit from this opportunity to learn and apply these lifelong skills. During this year, librarians have revised their lesson content to include the newly launched information discovery tool, QuickFinder.


QuickFinder has replaced the Summon Discovery tool. Although it functions in the same way as 'discovering' relevant academic content from the resources available, it is a more robust tool that will ensure the retrieval of relevant content including open access content. IL training has been focusing on training staff and students in effectively navigating the platform. Unfortunately, there have been challenges with QuickFinder not retrieving all the relevant results and linking to content, but these are being addressed and will be resolved soon.

IL training has been offered at a basic and advanced level, relative to the needs of the programme. Advanced sessions include navigating databases and other e-resources. Information Literacy has been successfully integrated into the Technical Literacy module offered in the Faculty of Engineering and Built Environment and the Business Communication and Information Literacy module offered in the Faculty of Management Sciences. For both these modules, the IL assessment contributes a percentage toward the module mark.

It is encouraging to note that some Librarians have been granted access to lecturers' Moodle classrooms. The librarians can now actively participate with the student in that space by providing relevant information and guidance at the point of need. For some programmes, librarians have managed to integrate IL assessments into the Moodle space. Not all librarians are granted access in this way but have shared content with lecturers to host in this space. The LibGuides are used as an alternate platform to host recordings and tutorials.

Librarians also participate in ECP programmes, at the discretion of the respective departments and coordinators. In such cases, an integrated approach to teaching and assessment of IL is adopted.

The table below provides the average percentage attendance of students by Faculty. It reflects the average attendance for the sessions held during this reporting period.

In addition to the IL training session, Librarians are available online to support staff and students. They address queries via multiple platforms including email, MS Teams via the LibChat application as well as WhatsApp. The LibChat application allows for synchronous engagement with the librarian.

Reference Queries: Reference queries for teaching and learning support by faculty.

The table below provides the number of reference queries by faculty, entertained during this reporting period.

There is a noted decrease in the number of reference queries as compared to the previous year. Some librarians have not collected statistics consistently and this will be addressed in 2023. The RefAnalytics platform has been customised for improved routing and another layer of staff providing reference support has been added.

3.1.1.2 Postgraduate Support Services

- Training, Queries, Faculty Analysis

To develop research support services, some of the opportunities embraced by the postgraduate librarians are described below:

- ✚ Liaising actively with the Directorate for Research and Postgraduate Support, to include relevant library information sessions in the Research Capacity Development Programme (RCDP) schedule of activities for 2022.
- ✚ Requests were received by the Research Office to provide h-indexes for some academics. Individual academics also made requests when preparing for their NRF submissions.
- ✚ The RCDP library sessions were rescheduled to accommodate the loadshedding schedule. Offered on the RCDP were Resources for your Research, EndNote for academic writing and Word for thesis. These sessions were well attended, and very positive feedback was relayed from these sessions.
- ✚ The Midlands entrepreneurial unit has introduced a programme for postgraduate students. A workshop was conducted to encourage students to consider entrepreneurship as they conduct their postgraduate studies. The postgraduate librarian was invited to be part of the initiative.

- ✚ Postgraduate librarians attended Envision 2030 Institutional Awards 2020 and Research & Innovation Awards for 2021. The Envision 2030 Institution Award was won by the African Journal of Inter/Multi-disciplinary Studies (AJIMS) which is the DUT in-house journal and an accredited publication. Library staff have been involved in the setup and the initiation of the journal using the open journal platform.

- **Formatting References for Journal Article Publication**

With the introduction of the policy regarding the publishing of journal articles before the submission of theses, postgraduate librarians have had an increase in queries regarding journal publications. This involved assistance with identifying journals to publish in as well as the formatting of references to suit the referencing style for the particular journal. Some students used the EndNote software to manage their references and the postgraduate librarians had to modify the referencing style on EndNote to comply with the journal's referencing style.

- ✚ **Systematic Reviews**

Since COVID 19 there has been an increase in desktop research methods. One such method is the use of Systematic Reviews for conducting research. Postgraduate librarians have been increasingly called upon to be involved either as team members or being consulted concerning database selection and searching strategies. This increasing demand for consultation between the postgraduate librarians and the academics and students concerning systematic reviews resulted in the postgraduate librarians developing a workshop on Systematic Reviews: developing search strategies and using EndNote.

- ✚ **Course Attendance**

Ms Mitha enrolled on the library-mediated course *Systematic Reviews: opportunities for librarians*, which was held online by the University of Michigan librarians on 26 October 2022 – 9 December 2022. It was a valuable experience and the facilitators were very passionate and knowledgeable about systematic reviews.

The course was designed to teach librarians about the systematic review process and is accredited with 20 Medical Library Association continuing education credits. The course combined asynchronous online resources on Canvas, with live instruction (online and in-person). Some of the challenges were the time difference and loadshedding.

- ✚ **Appraising Articles**

Ms Finlayson assisted in appraising evidence for a scoping review for a Health Sciences researcher. This involved applying the Mixed Methods Appraisal Tool (MMAT) to a collection of articles. The process requires that for each relevant study, the type of design be determined, and then the corresponding criteria are applied to appraise the study's quality and to allocate a score. This data contributed to an article which was submitted to the OA journal *Cosmetics* for consideration.

- ✚ **Customised Search Strategies:** Increased support for customising info search strategies in response to systematic review research has been apparent. These are often complex and require close consultation.

✚ **SciVal Visibility**

- *Course attendance:* Postgraduate librarians were part of the global cohort 2 for 2022 of the SciVal Certification programmes from 24 October 2022. This six-module online programme covered the core competencies and functionalities for librarians to navigate SciVal.
- *Lightning talk:* Following on from the RCDP information session offered on “DUT research and researcher analysis with SciVal”, Ms Mitha offered a lightning talk at the library Research Colloquium which highlighted this resource and DUT research on systematic reviews.
- *Customised requests:* Several information requests have been received for bibliometrics and data from SciVal.

✚ **DH (Digital Humanities) IGNITE PROGRAMME 18 -19 October 2022**

The programme aimed to bring scholars together to build relationships and digital capacity within the humanities and social sciences in South Africa. DH-IGNITE provided universities with an opportunity to showcase how they support their faculties in adopting digital and computational methodologies and interdisciplinary approaches in humanities and social sciences research.

The event was offered in a hybrid format to allow participants to join in person or virtually. This initiative was funded by SADiLar and DSI. Ms Mitha, Ms Gumede and Ms Majola were nominated to participate in the DH Ignite Programme. This was held at the Coastlands Hotel. Participants were from all the higher education institutions in KwaZulu Natal and were exposed to the different tools and software that researchers were using for their research.

The table below is a summary of the attendance at library information sessions offered and the reference queries fielded.

Numerous queries relate to EndNote installations, accredited publications, H-index, referencing, SPSS, Turnitin, and formatting of the thesis.</p>

- Resources for your research.
- Word4thesis.
- DUT research and researcher analysis on SciVal.
- Researcher profiles and research visibility.
- Systematic reviews.
- Research publishing: identifying journals in which to publish.
- Information resources and EndNote.
- EndNote for Academic Writing.

3.2. Digital Environment

3.2.1. LibGuides

The subject/research guides are customized by librarians to provide a portal to resources that support the various subjects offered at DUT. Librarians curate links to content which includes resources that the library subscribes to as well as open access content.

The platform is robust enough to function as more than a repository and has been engaged as a platform to market products and events as well as to administer formative activities. In consultation with lecturers, the librarians collate and present content that supports specific assignments.

While some of the guides are consulted frequently, others are not. This platform provides a gateway to finding relevant resources within the discipline but requires greater marketing and adoption.

With the migration to the discovery tool, Permalinks to resources on LibGuides had to be updated. Librarians have received training on linking to resources and have made the necessary updates.

Below are the view statistics for the reporting period. The pandemic in 2020 and the subsequent lockdown restrictions saw increased activity on the LibGuides, but a general decrease has been noted in 2022. With students back on campus and having access to a stable and secure internet connection, it was anticipated that students would engage in this resource more. However, this was not the case. Librarians will be increasing efforts to promote the use of these guides in the new year.

3.2.2. Library Technologies

- Scholarship, DUT Repositories, Virtual Library Tools, Social Media Presence and Management, Open Scholar

Subject librarians and postgraduate librarians continue to have a virtual presence by adopting various tools for teaching and engagement. These include MS Teams, Moodle, LibGuides, LibChat, WhatsApp, and email.

The LibChat facility has been adopted as a primary medium for synchronous engagement with staff and students. Students often use LibChat. This is used not only for library-related queries but students see it as a place where they would get assistance so librarians often field queries that do not relate to the library, e.g., about departments within the institution, getting a student card and many more such queries.

Ref Analytics

The platform has been customized to facilitate improved data collection and analysis.

Research Support Twitter Feed

The library research support Twitter feed @dutlibresearch was active during the year and over 100 tweets and retweets were posted. Currently, there are 368 followers.

Library Discovery Tool Launched


The library launched its new information search tool, QuickFinder on Thursday, 25 August 2022 at the Alan Pittendrigh Library, Steve Biko Campus.

🌐 **Discovery Tool (QuickFinder)**

The Summon discovery tool which has been in use since 2012, was replaced by the Ebsco Discovery Service, now known as QuickFinder on 01 July 2021 that is now known as QuickFinder. QuickFinder is an advanced tool that will enhance the discovery of print, electronic, and research material.

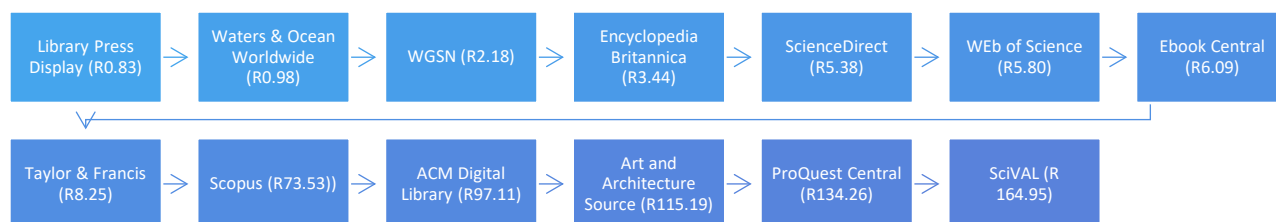

Cost per Search (cost of resource / no. of searches done)

The cost per search provides a useful indicator of the cost vs the usage of the library resource. Several other factors are considered alongside this indicator when making decisions about library purchases and cancellations. SciVal (R164.950) has the highest cost per search for the year.

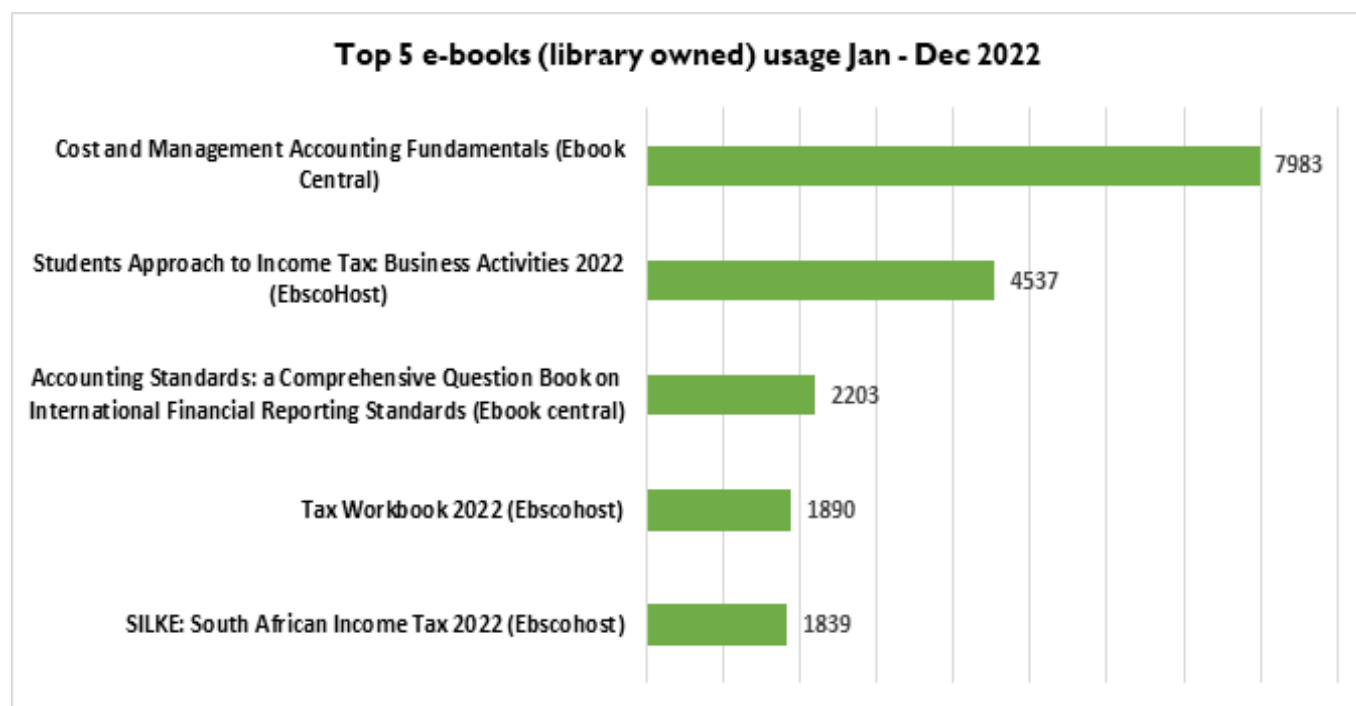
Cost per search for library databases



3.2.3. eBook Usage

The 5 most downloaded owned e-books were collected from Science Direct, eBook Central, EBSCO, Cambridge, Wiley and RSC for January – December 2022. These stats were analysed further to determine the top 5 e-books downloaded. The 2 most used purchased e-books for Jan – December 2022 were “*Cost and Management Accounting Fundamentals*” (eBook Central) with 7983 and “*Students Approach to Income Tax: Business Activities 2022*” (Ebsco) with 4537, downloads respectively. “*Accounting Standards: a Comprehensive Question Book on International Financial Reporting Standards*” (eBook Central) with 2203 and Tax Workbook 2022 (Ebsco) 1890 downloads respectively, followed by, “*SILKE: South African Income Tax*” (Ebsco) in 1839.

The top 5 most purchased downloaded e-books during this year were from e-Book Central and EBSCO.

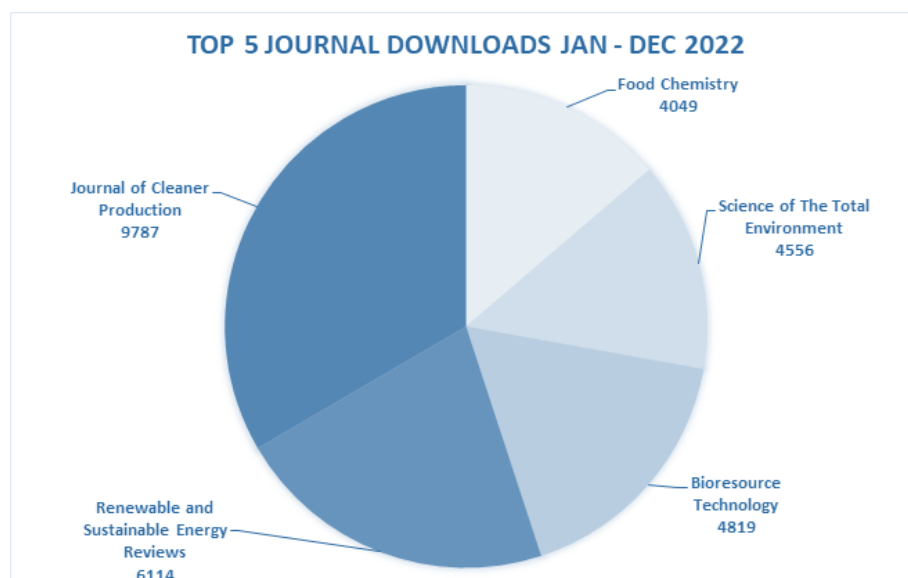


3.2.4. Journal Downloads

The 5 most downloaded journals were collected from 8 full-text databases i.e., Science Direct, EBSCOhost, Emerald, IEEE, ProQuest, Taylor & Francis and Wiley for Jan – December 2022 to determine the 5 most downloaded journals.

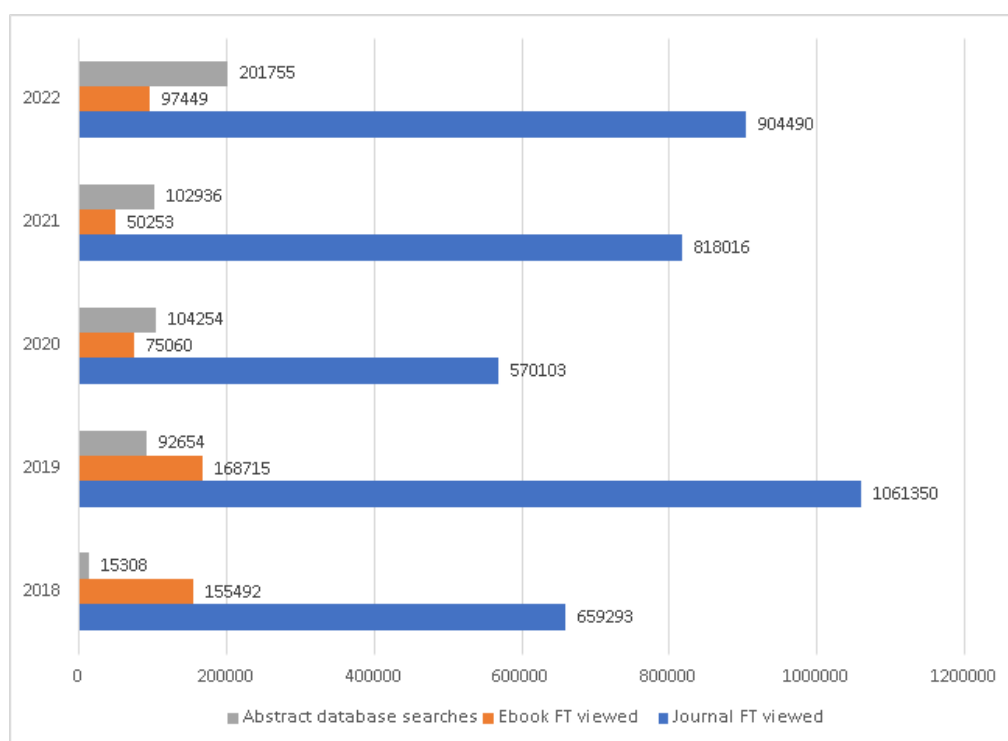
The most popular database for January - December 2022 was Science Direct with 244394 full-text downloads and 5 of the most downloaded journals for this period were also from Science Direct. The top 5 journals remained the same as the last year.

The most used journal for Jan - December 2022 was the Journal of Cleaner Production with 9787 full-text downloads, followed by Renewable and Sustainable Energy Reviews with 6114 downloads, Bioresource Technology with 4819 downloads, Science of the Total Environment with 4556 downloads, and finally, Food Chemistry with 4019 downloads.



- **Electronic Resources: Trends Analysis**

Trend graphs are useful to examine progress over time for select library measures. The trend graph below highlights the usage of subscribed and purchased electronic resources over a five (5) year period. The data presented in the graph include searches completed and full-text views from abstract databases, full-text e-books viewed as well as full-text articles.



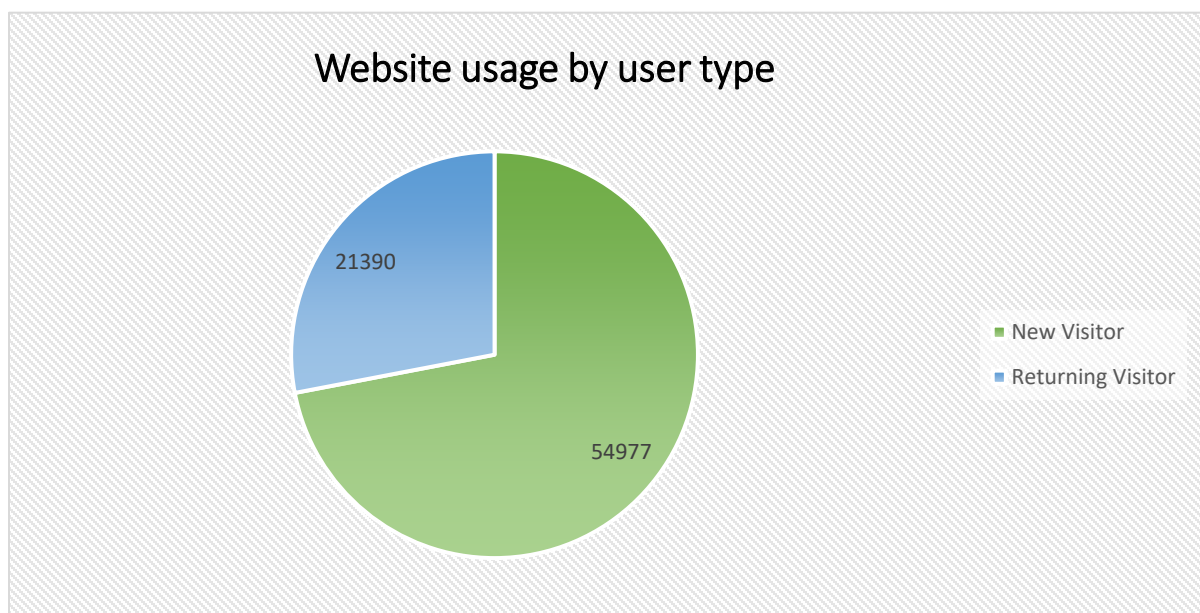
E-Resources Usage Trend: 2018 - 2022

A notable trend is a shift in usage of e-resources before COVID-19; during the national lockdown; the move to multimodal learning; and finally, back to campus activities. It is promising to note that the usage of e-journals is on an upward trajectory, moving towards pre-COVID-19 usage levels.

The usage of e-books is of concern, as the library's investment in e-books has increased considerably since 2018. Issues relating to data and connectivity impacted heavily academic learning, including the use of library e-books in 2020 and 2021. The increased usage in 2022 could be attributed to the return to campus activities as well as the purchase of PERLEGO, a platform with over 800 000 e-books. The use of books (including e) in the undergraduate curriculum needs to be purposely integrated so that students can maximize the benefits of these resources in their studies.

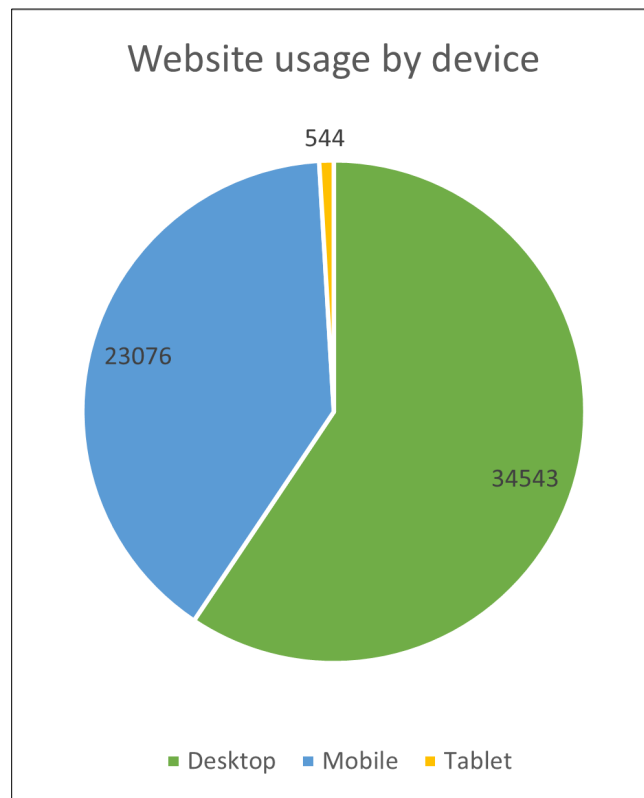
On a more positive note, the use of abstract databases has increased significantly since 2018. This is mainly due to new resources in the form of SCIVAL and SCOPUS, which are used extensively by both researchers and administrators. The increased usage of the Web of Science is also a contributing factor having increased by over 100% in 2022.

3.2.5. Library Website and Support Tools



- ✚ The library website <https://library.dut.ac.za/> is the main source of all library information and resources. The library's discovery tool, Qui, subject and research LibGuides, tutorials, eBooks, journals, databases, and open access collections are all prominently located for easy and seamless access.

- ✚ Through the usage of the above, detailed statistics are captured and analysed regularly to ensure alignment of our services to the needs of the academic and research project.
- ✚ About 75367 users accessed the library website in 2022 from multiple devices. The majority of traffic to the website was from a desktop (34543), 23076 via mobile device, and 544 students accessed the library using a tablet.
- ✚ The use of mobile devices to access the library is promising, as we continuously develop our online tools and resources. Desktop users dropped by 20.83%, mobile users dropped by 3.47% and tablet users decreased by 20.65% in 2021.

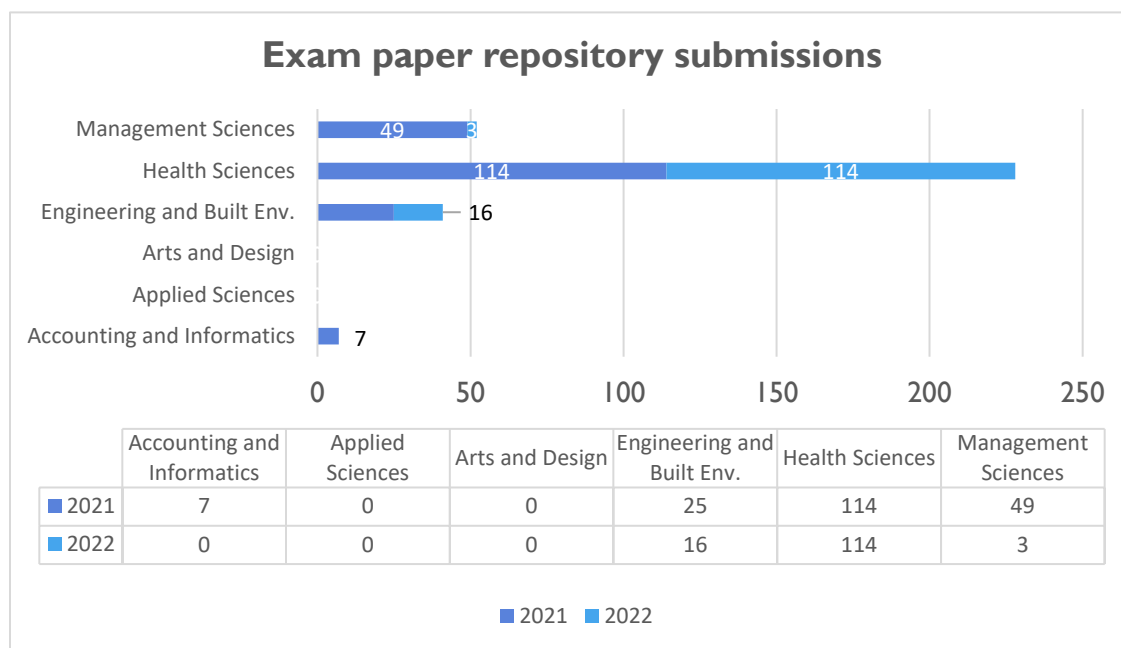

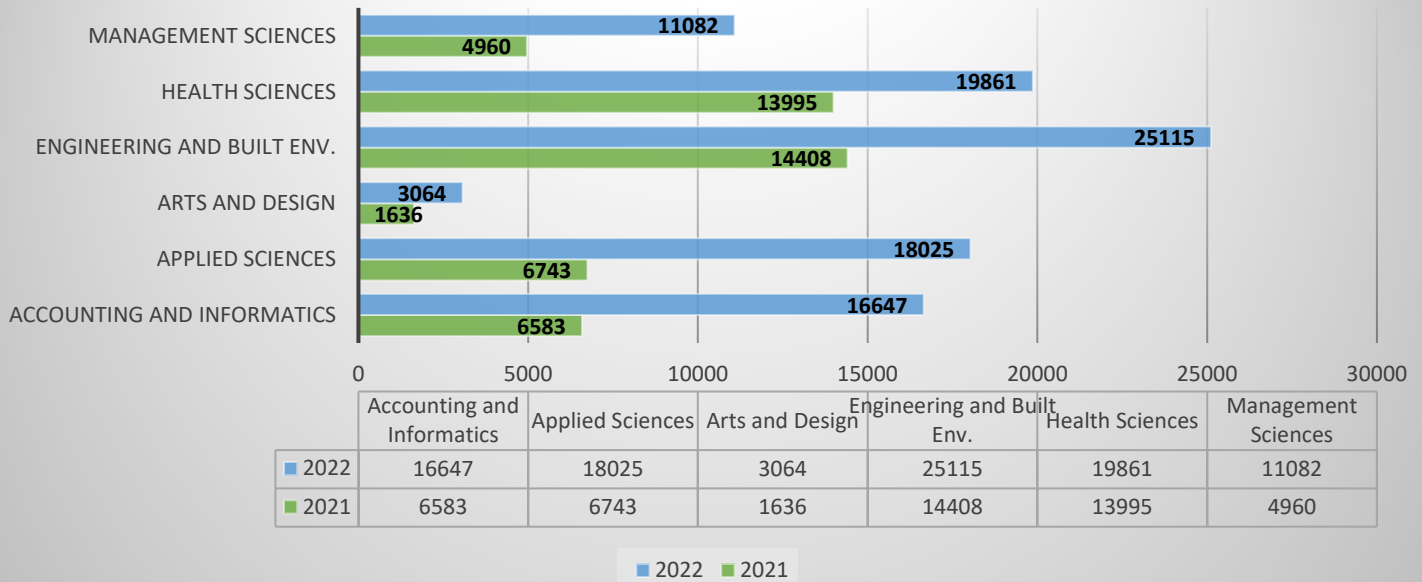

There has been a decrease in the number of papers submitted to the repository. This could be attributed to an increase in the number of continuous assessments being undertaken in some faculties. Exam paper downloads increased significantly in 2022, with some faculty usage increasing threefold.

- The graph above shows the downloads of exam papers per faculty for the period 2021 to 2022. As per the graph, more exam papers were downloaded in 2022 compared to the year 2021.
- In both 2021 and 2022, the Faculty of Engineering and Built Environment received more downloads compared to other faculties.
- The Health Science faculty followed in second place with 19861 exam paper downloads in 2022 and 13995 downloads in 2021.
- The Applied Science Faculty also received a good deal of downloads in the year 2022, with over eighteen thousand (18000) downloads. This was a significant improvement compared to the 6743 downloads received in the year previous year (the year 2021).
- The Faculty of Arts and Design received the lowest downloads compared to all other faculties in both year 2021 and year 2022. In 2021, the faculty received 1636 downloads and 3064 downloads in the year 2022.

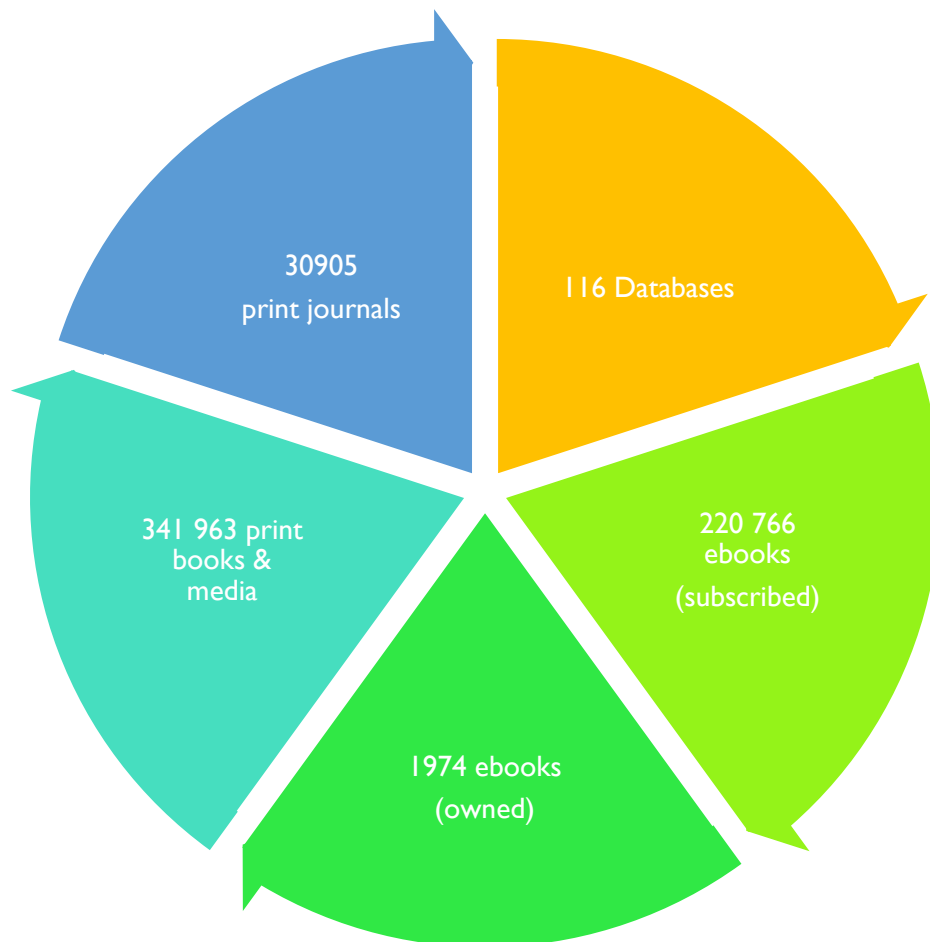
- ✚ There has been a serious increase in the usage of library facilities.
- ✚ The footprint is telling the story that students were longing for the library as the common space to work in.
- ✚ This is attributed to the lockdown restriction being lifted and all students being back on campus.

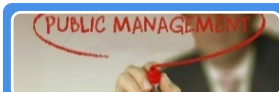

A total of **R 1 461 223.70** was spent on approved copyright licences during the 2022 academic year. The table below provides Faculty expenditure. An increase in Copyright Licence is noted from previous years as indicated below:

The increase in expenditure can be attributed to the strict inspection control at the Print room that was made possible at the request for a WIL student appointment in mid-August. The positive impact towards ensuring a high level of copyright compliance has been achieved since reverting to the past practice of daily Print room inspections. Non-compliance had been recorded and licences to print were obtained. The table below further reflects a breakdown of departmental expenditure.

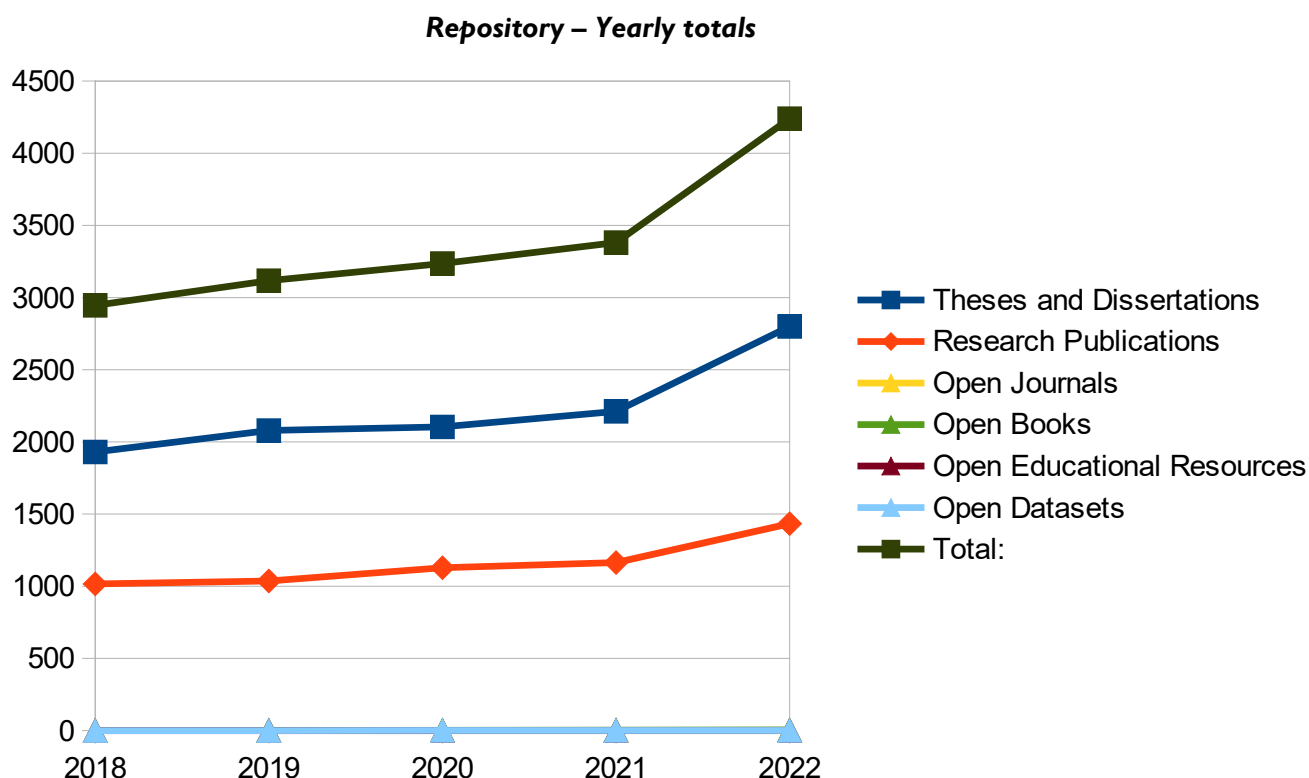

3.5. Research Support (postgraduate and faculty research services)

3.5.1. DUT Open Scholar

There has been a gradual growth in the repository, this is due to awareness campaigns around open access; increased commitment to archiving of DUT research; development of a new library unit, Digital Services/ Scholarship; enhanced submission processes; and integration of reporting and submission systems. The graph below depicts the growth of the repository from 2018. There is a year-on-year growth in the repository as the adoption of open access increases at DUT. From 2021, over 1000 items were added to the repository – these include theses, research articles as well as open books and open journals.



- Submission of Theses & Dissertations**

The overall total of items uploaded on DUT Scholar for 2022 was 779, (533 theses and 246 articles). The breakdown of items uploaded on DUT Scholar per quarter for 2022 is shown below:

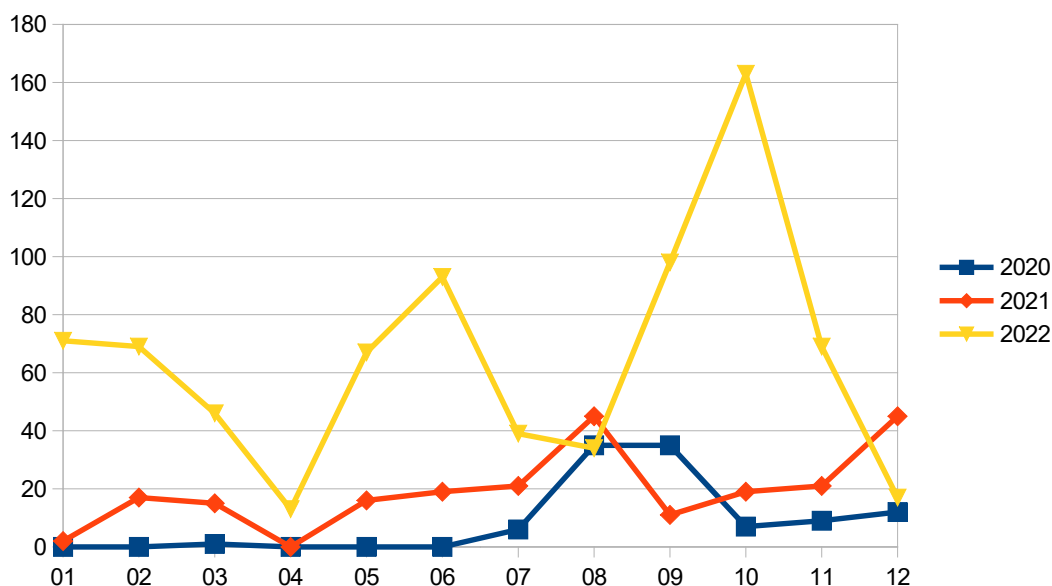

ETD Uploads: 2022 compared to 2021



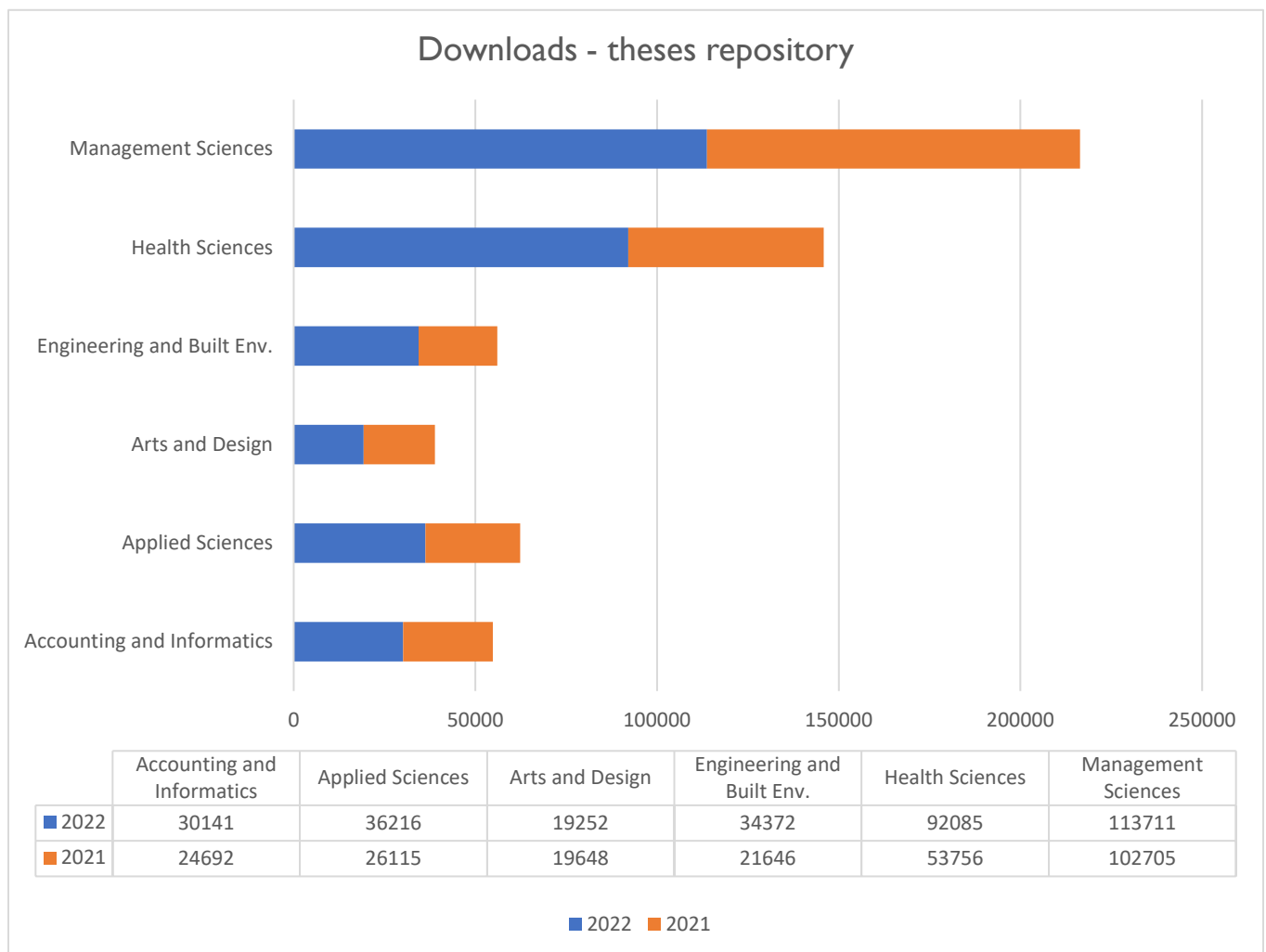

- **Discoverability and Visibility of Research Outputs in DUT Open Scholar**

Depositing research publications on DUT Open Scholar increases the visibility and discoverability of the research outputs. The institutional repository (DUT Open Scholar) is harvested in multiple platforms including national and international repositories as well as Google. The harvesting help to ensure the greater discoverability and visibility of the research outputs in the repository. M&D theses and dissertations are proving to be the most downloaded items in the DUT Open Scholar for the period under review.

There is a significant increase in the use of theses and dissertations from all faculties. In 2022, significant increases in the downloads of theses and dissertations are noted from across all the faculties. There is significant activity on the thesis repository with high downloads taking place throughout the year. An increase of 23% from 2021 is noted with Faculty of Health Sciences theses almost doubling year on year.

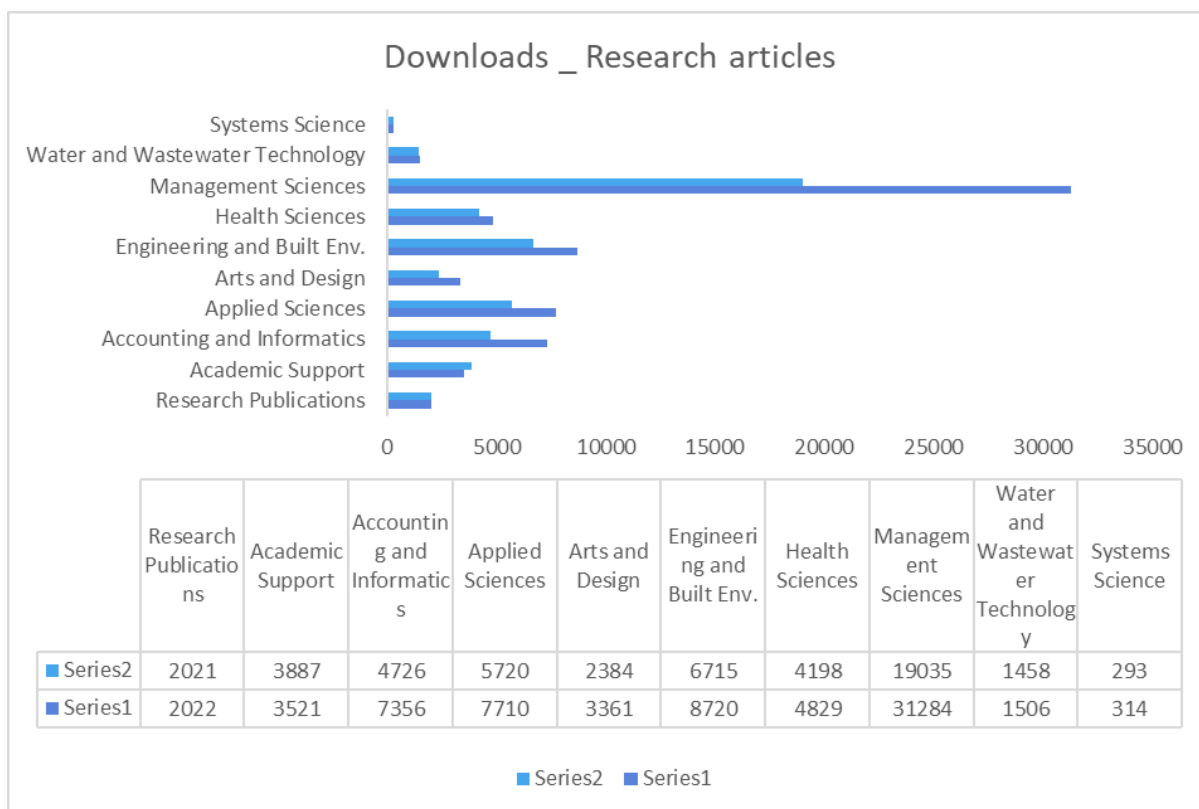

- **Research Data Management**

Despite implementing the tools, software, data management templates, and repository and providing the necessary support for the archiving of research data, there has been little progress in integrating these tools within the research processes. RDM activities are on hold, following the departure of Dr Liganiso. Several tasks are still to be undertaken by the Research Directorate for RDM to be effectively implemented at DUT. These include the finalization of the RDM policy, setting up of an information sharing session with the research community as well as the finalization of workflows and personnel to manage the entire process. The library awaits the development and approval of the Research Data Management (RDM) Policy and the formalization of processes for research data management. RDM project is hamstrung by the lack of a policy.

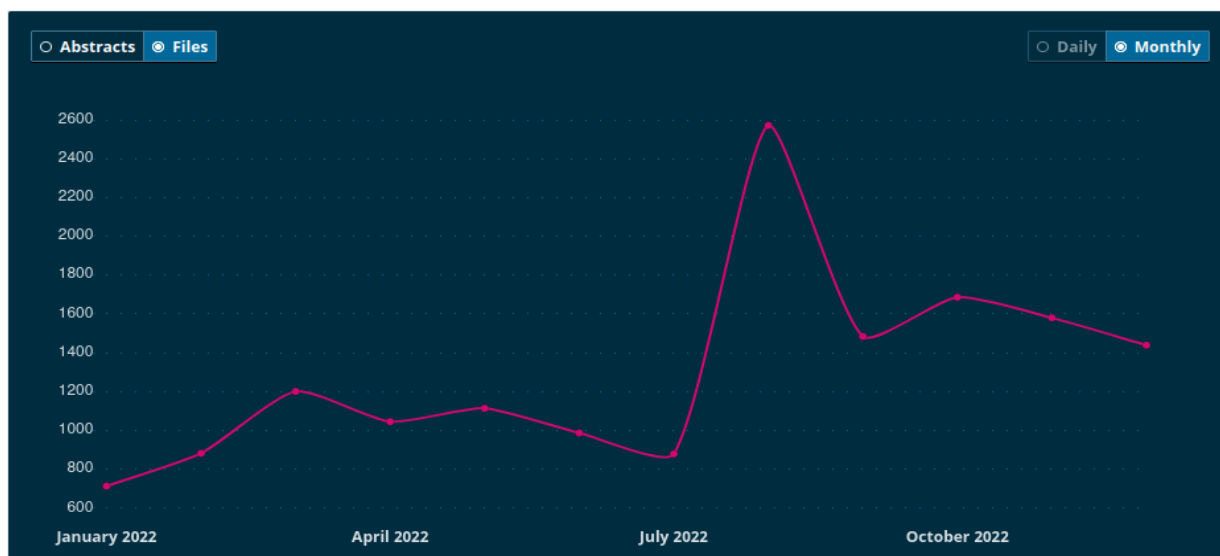
- **DUT Library as a Publishing Service Platform**

The library has been increasingly adopting the publishing role. The library has directed much of its investment philosophy towards making Open Access a reality. We are moving away from a traditional print collection-based model to a more broadly service-oriented model. The current library publishing initiatives such as DUT Open Journals and Open Books bear testimony to that effect. With these Open Access Science initiatives, the aim is to ensure the discoverability and visibility of our research outputs.

- **DUT Open Journals**

The library is slowly developing its portfolios of open Journals <https://journals.dut.ac.za>. The library is hosting the Research Office's **African Journal of Inter/Multidisciplinary Studies (AJIMS)** on its journal publishing platform. There were views and downloads from across the world, but significant usage from South Africa (50%) and the United States of America (10%). Other countries accessing the journal include Nigeria (4%), the United Kingdom (3%), the Philippines (3%) and India (3%). This increase may be attributable to the increasing acceptance of open access as a method of scholarly publication, or possibly to the increasing prestige of the AJIMS journal itself as its reputation continues to grow.

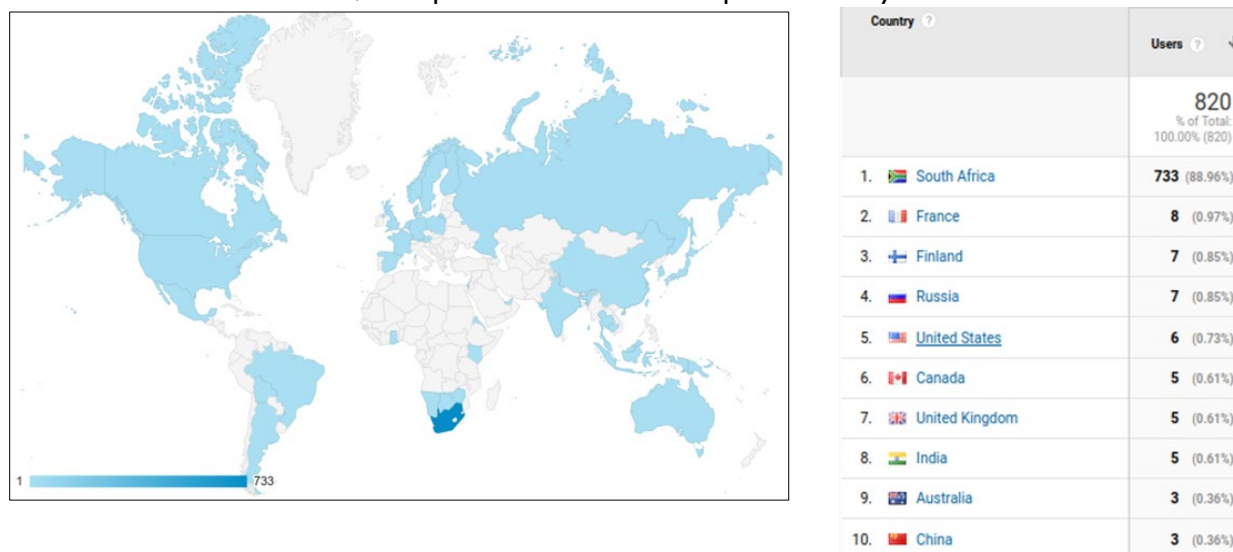

From the statistics below, the open books are accessed predominately from within South Africa.

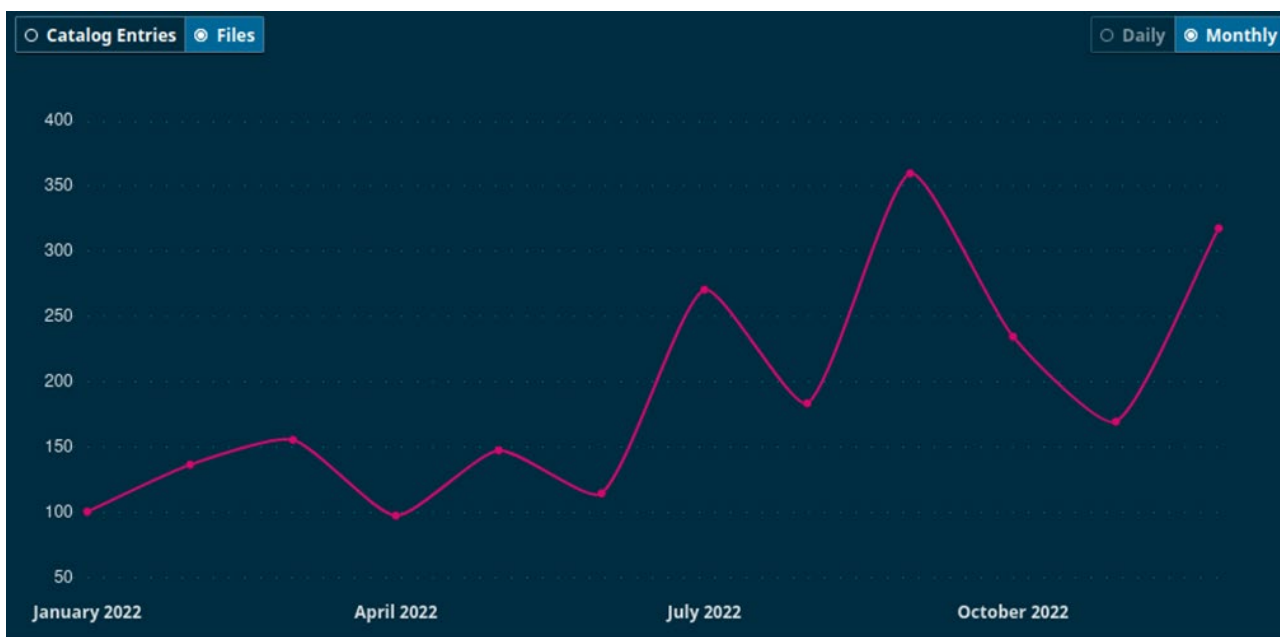


3.5.2. Open Books Publications Views

- **Digital Object Identifiers (DOIs)**

DUT became a member of Crossref in January 2021, giving the Library the means to assign DOIs for our digital objects, such as research articles, theses, eBooks and journals. A DOI is a unique and permanent identifier for a digital document, ensuring its reliable location by potential readers. The library is engaged in an ongoing project to retrospectively assign DOIs to theses and articles. The retrospective allocation of DOIs to both theses and dissertations as well as research articles continued into 2022. Due to an increase in the submissions of recently completed theses and dissertations in 2022, the metadata team focussed on theses and dissertations only. A total of 1781 DOIs were assigned to DUT open journals, DUT open books and theses and dissertations. The retrospective assigning of DOIs to research articles will continue place in 2023.

- **Library Digitisation Project**

4.1. Distinctive Education

- Library participation in the university's international projects**

Library management has engaged with the IEP directorate in identifying shared spaces that would support COIL projects. 4.1.1. Financial Sustainability

- CAPEX, OPEX, Strategic Priorities Funds**

In 2022 the DUT Library received a total operational budget of R 25 442 758. As of 31 December 2022, 88 % of the main budget had already been spent. These were strong indicators that the library budget was used to fulfil present needs while also allowing for the acquisition of new software and other online material to support academic and research projects for the rest of the year and into 2023.

A National Repository Task Team was convened by Council on Higher Education Libraries (CHELSA) to investigate the feasibility of a national electronic theses and dissertations repository as well as a replacement for the defunct Nexus current research database. For the period under review, Mr Sean Carte and Mr Sagren Moodley continued in the Infrastructure Task Team and the Planning Committee respectively.

- **DUT Africa Day Events**

The library collaborated with the International Education and Partnerships (IEP) to commemorate Africa Day in May. The organising committee organised a virtual public lecture event as well as a physical event to commemorate Africa Month. The virtual guest lecture was held on 25 May via MS Teams and the guest speaker was Dr Ismail Lagardien, an author who recently published a book called Ismail Lagardien's memoir: *"Too White to be Coloured, Too Coloured to be Black"*. This was a hybrid narrative, blending memoir with social commentary and political analysis. The theme for this year was "Strengthening Resilience in Nutrition and Food Security on the African Continent: Strengthening Agro-Food Systems, Health and Social Protection Systems for the Acceleration of Human, Social and Economic Capital Development". However, the public lecture focused on promoting and celebrating African literature. At the beginning of the lecture, a special presentation prepared by the marketing librarian was displayed. The presentation showcased some of the respected and celebrated African authors and their published books. - **International Open Access Week Celebration**

The Library commemorated the International Open Access Week with colourful and creative displays, a public lecture, and the publishing and launch of an open-access book, titled “*Critical Reflections On Professional Learning During Covid-19: Context, Practice And Change*” by HELTASA via the DUT Open Monograph Press platform. - **Knitted Clothes**

A library team consisting of the Marketing and Communication librarian, Sandra Achary, Sarah Khan, Kogie Naicker and Ini Naidoo visited two places of safety and care for abused children and women in Durban to donate knitted scarfs and hats. This visit took place on 29 July 2022.

5.1.2. Adaptive Graduates

- **Work Integrated Learning (WIL) Programme**

Hosting WIL students is one critical area used by the library to make a meaningful contribution towards preparing the students for the world of work. This year, the library had the opportunity to host 2 groups of students from the LIS programme. The WIL students spent 8 weeks and 5 weeks respectively in the library, gaining exposure and experience in the different functional areas. A well-structured programme was put in place which included activities and assessments. The students did presentations reflecting on their WIL experience in the DUT Library. The feedback from them was positive and encouraging. The team spirit and commitment displayed by every library member during the WIL programme were very encouraging.

- **Tutorship Programmes**

The Information Literacy (IL) and Research Commons tutors have been employed and trained to offer online support to students attending IL training sessions. Their responsibilities include administrative tasks related to collecting training-related data. The training librarian together with the site subject librarian's coordinators planned and delivered an induction programme for tutors.

- **Representation in the LIS Advisory Board**

The LIS programme convened a stakeholder meeting on August 24. The meeting was attended by representatives from all the organizations that host DUT's LIS students for work-integrated learning (WIL). The library's WIL team was further invited to the WIL luncheon at the end of the year, where student achievements were celebrated.
