I. INTRODUCTION

The report provides a general overview of the DUT Library Services for the reporting period, January 2023 to December 2023. The year 2023 has been characterized by outstanding accomplishments across the four ENVISION2030 perspectives and a steadfast dedication by smart library staff in providing exceptional smart services, resources and services to our diverse community of users. Against a backdrop of challenges, the library has not only maintained its operational excellence and integrity but has emerged as a beacon of knowledge, fostering an environment conducive to learning, research, and intellectual exploration. Facilitating access to information and knowledge in digital spaces with fewer physical resources means the library investment philosophy should be directed to address issues of access, social justice, equity and inclusivity in a much more transparent and sustainable manner. In this regard, the library has achieved a significant milestone in increasing its portfolios of transformative agreements with major publishers of scientific content from three to five. This development is very much aligned with the new library strategy intent, which is "to facilitate access to scholarly information and knowledge in a manner that is open, inclusive, developmental, and sustainable." For the period under review, the DUT Library has signed two transformative agreements (TAs) with Elsevier Science Direct and Springer Nature. TAs and many other open-access initiatives help to make the university research enterprise more open, developmental, inclusive, impactful and sustainable. Furthermore, as part of our Library strategy to increase the university footprint in open-access knowledge production and distribution across the globe to ensure the visibility and discoverability of the university's high-impact research, the Library has developed a marketing strategy to maximise the uptake by DU-affiliated researchers in open-access. For the period, a total of 58 journal papers authored or co-authored by university researchers were approved and published in transformative agreements (TAs - Springer Nature, Science Direct, Emerald & Wiley), with an estimated cost saving of R 3 719 733,78 to the university. The majority of these papers were authored by recent Drs (emerging researchers). Under normal circumstances, these emerging researchers would not have been able and afforded to publish their outputs in these high-impact publishing outlets and journals. This achievement will go a long way in increasing the visibility and impact of our research enterprise, hopefully translating into better rankings in the near future.

Smart Library people continue to make their mark and raise the DUT flag on the international stage, representing the university library at various national and international industry forums and knowledge-sharing platforms such as the International Federations of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA), International Association of University Libraries (IATUL), European Conference on Knowledge Management (ECKM), European Conference on Information Literacy (ECIL). At the regional level within SADC, the Library continues to attract attention from other university libraries as a model of best practice for benchmarking purposes. It is largely due to this internationally impactful contribution and strong social media presence that during the month of May, the Library hosted Ms Patience Chibanda, the University Librarian at Midlands State University in Zimbabwe and Dr Aubrey Chaputula (Technical Services Librarian) from Mzuzu University in Malawi during the month of September, on their benchmarking projects.

A newly found culture of research and publications was taken to another level for the betterment of the library's positioning within the university research enterprise and at various relevant subject-specific scientific communities at the global level. To this end, thirteen (13) research outputs were accepted for publication by the library staff, nine (9) of which were published in DHET-approved national and international journals, conference proceedings and four (4) book chapters in international book projects. Two of our young members also got articles published in Q1 international journal (Digital Library Perspectives) in the field of information science. Elsewhere across the globe, three staff members presented papers at the European Conference on Knowledge Management and the European Conference on Information Literacy. These research outputs and achievements bear a testimony that attest that indeed, a culture of research and publishing has been unleashed for the greater societal impactful contribution and for ensuring the sustainable future of DUT through publications. However, such achievements did not happen by chance, the library's smart leadership has invested in a number of strategies and tactics geared towards creating enabling culture and human capital development in knowledge production capabilities.

The period under review also saw the two members of the smart team graduating with their Ph.D. degrees, taking the number of Ph.D. holders in the library to a total of five. Several African Library staff members enrolled for their Ph.D. studies. As part of the library's contribution towards assisting the university with the postgraduate supervision capacity challenges, all five Ph.D. holders in the library were actively involved in postgraduate supervision in their areas of specialization. The Library has also driven its investment philosophy

in the development of the state-of-the-art infrastructure and facilities, in the form of the self-check system (RFID) across all campus libraries, acquisition of new computing equipment and replacements in its smart learning and research commons at BM Patel, Indumiso and AP Library and High-Tech Conference facility. Human capital development is very critical to make sure the DUT Library deliver smart library services, resources, products, and technologies to its university community. It is for this reason that the Library leadership continues to invest in various capacity development initiatives relative to these smart technologies, services, and products to align the minds and hearts of the staff with its vision and strategic orientations. The reporting period under review also saw the library developing its long-term strategy, the Library Operational Plan 2023-2030.

I.I. Highlights

• Library Operational Plan 2023-2030

There is a quote that says "Strategy without tactics is the slowest route to victory. Tactics without strategy is the noise before defeat" which is attributed to Sun Tzu, an ancient Chinese military strategist and philosopher. In line with this famous quote, during the period under review, the library developed its operational plan 2023-2030. In the last five to ten years, Durban University of Technology as part of the South African higher education landscape has faced many pressures at micro and macro levels. The "Fees Must Fall" movement has opened doors of opportunities for massification and inclusivity in higher education space where the demand for higher education far outstrips the existing capacity. This has led to overcrowding in lecturing, research and library facilities.

Moreover, the decline in state funding across the higher education landscape, NDP2030 targets higher education, tax on electronic information resources, shrinking library budgets, the speed of digital transformation and the fourth industrial revolution technologies require academic libraries to be creatively and innovatively responsive to these pressures. So, does the DUT Library. This strategic context and paradoxes require the DUT Library to be strategically smart, and responsive in the manner that it seeks to entrench itself as the primary support resource for teaching, learning and research. To that effect, our library strategy development process has taken into consideration the need to be aligned and support the university to achieve its ENVISION2030 strategic objectives across the four perspectives in a manner that is open, inclusive, developmental, and sustainable.

Self-Check Service Facilities (RFID Project)

Over the last five years, the DUT Library has embarked on several projects to re-imagine, repurpose and re-design its learning and research spaces to create an enabling environment (physical and digital) to support teaching, learning and research enablement. During the period under review, as part of reimagining and redefining its service offerings through the deployment of SMART technologies, the Library dedicated itself to enhancing the library user's experience by offering state-of-the-art technologies in both the physical and virtual library environments. To this end, the library hosted Library TECH Week, an annual celebration designed to showcase and promote innovative library technologies utilised by DUT's esteemed staff and students. The TECH Week was held from Monday, 24 July 2023 to Friday, 28 July 2023.

The launch of the library's self-check service was held at the BM Patel Library on 26 July, and this was indeed the biggest highlight of the week. With the new self-check service, users can independently borrow and return books, which also aims to shorten lines at the circulation desks. Students, academics, and administrative staff from many departments attended the launch event, along with representatives from Universal Knowledge Systems (UKS), the company that provided the units. In his engaging presentation, Mr Mohamed Ismail from UKS highlighted the benefits of using self-check services in libraries.

The Library Services Director, Dr Malefetjane Phaladi also addressed the audience on the importance of moving toward adopting smart technologies to create more smart libraries for smart people. A digital video and photos of the various activities that took place during this week were created and posted on the Facebook and Twitter pages.

After this long and exciting week, articles were published in the DUT Newsletter and LIASA In Touch Magazine.

In addition, a library Makerspace Open Day was held at the Indumiso Campus Library where students were introduced to some of the cutting-edge technology in the makerspace, such as a mobile drone, 3D printers and 3D scanners.

• Transformational Agreements

Change is inevitable in any organization to remain competitive, relevant and aligned to pressures at the micro, macro and international levels. The transformational agreements are changing the depth, intensity and speed of the scientific knowledge production and access thereof. The academic library and the publishing landscape are dynamic environments where change is constant. In our efforts to ensure that we support our research enterprise in a manner that is sustainable and equitable, the university library through the South African National Library and Information Consortium (SANLiC) has put in place signed transformative agreements with the following top publishers of scientific knowledge.

- **ACM** (Association of Computing Machinery)
- Emerald
- **♣** Wiley
- Springer Nature
- Elsevier (ScienceDirect)

DUT authors can publish in any of the five (5) transformational agreements that have been signed by the DUT Library, without paying article processing fees (APCs). The library community uses the terms transformative and transformational agreements interchangeably, but for the SA context, the preferred term is transformational, as these agreements seek to address social justice issues, including exclusionary publishing practices These agreements are with major publishers of scientific knowledge – ELSEVIER, Springer Nature, Wiley, Emerald and ACM. Essentially, DUT authors would not pay for article processing charges (APCs) if their articles are accepted for publication. The approval process for the waived APCs is managed by the library, who follow specific criteria. While uptake of these agreements has grown significantly in 2023, there are several challenges we are experiencing:

- a) rejection of articles due to the primary authors not inserting DUT as the institution.
- b) inconsistent use of the DUT email address
- c) verification of DUT affiliated authors is leading to delays

We worked with the Research Directorate and other role-players to address some of the issues raised above. For the period January to September 2023, a total of 58 journal papers were approved and published in transformative agreements (TAs - Springer Nature, Science Direct, Emerald & Wiley), with an estimated cost saving of R 3 719 733,78 to the university. The majority of these papers were authored by recent Drs (emerging researchers). Under normal conditions, these emerging researchers would not have had the financial support to publish their findings in prestigious outlets and journals with significant impact. This achievement will go a long way in increasing the visibility and impact of our research enterprise, hopefully translating into better rankings in the near future.

• Library Colloquium

As part of building, supporting and sustaining a culture of research and publication, a colloquium was arranged for the library staff on the 3rd of November 2023. This was a hybrid event and featured 11 Lightning talks and 5 conference presentations. DUT Library staff presented on experiences and practice-based topics, conference presentations and completed masters' dissertations in 2023. The initiative aims to engage staff in reflecting and presenting on their practice or areas of interest. Various support measures were in place to support the presenters, especially the novice presenters. Some of these papers are conference-ready for presentation at LIASA2024 and some of these papers are prepared for actual publications.

• Library Benchmarking Visit from Mzuzu University in Malawi

The DUT Library continues to offer capacity development opportunities for academic libraries at a regional, national level and SADC region. For the period under review, considerable effort went into assisting the regional library, supporting national programmes and developing staff professionally. DUT Library continues to be recognised by peers in the LIS sector within the country and regionally as a role model library of best practice. Dr Aubrey Chaputula (a librarian) from Mzuzu University in Malawi was hosted by the DUT Library, as part of his benchmarking visit. Incorporated into the programme was the planning and delivery of a Knowledge Management workshop, the establishment of an MoU between the 2 institution's libraries and plans toward a joint research project. The engagement proved to be fruitful as it ended with a Knowledge Management Workshop, where participants received certificates. The Library also developed and signed an MOU with Mzuzu University Library to put into effect international collaboration, staff exchange programmes, joint publications and programmes.

• Benchmarking: Regional and National Capacity Development (Hosting Director of Midlands State University Library, Zimbabwe)

The DUT Library continues to offer capacity development opportunities for academic libraries at a regional and national level. For the period under review, considerable effort went into assisting the regional library, supporting national programmes and developing staff professionally. The library hosted the Director of Midlands State University Library (Zimbabwe), Ms Patience Chibanda for two weeks. Part of her programme was the visit to the site libraries. She expressed her admiration for the professionalism and passion that was demonstrated by the library staff.

• International Conference Presentations

As part of the strategy for developing and inculcating a culture of writing and publishing and sharing knowledge in the field, Library staff are representing the library at national and international forums, as staff members have had their submissions accepted for conference presentations. For the period under review, Dr Phaladi presented a paper at the 24th European Conference on Knowledge Management (ECKM), held 7-8 September, in Lisbon, Portugal. The paper was also published in their proceedings which are indexed by Scopus and Web of Science among major indexes. In the month of October, Ms Sogoni and Ms Badenhorst presented their paper at the European Conference on Information Literacy Conference (ECIL) in Poland, 09-12 October 2023.

• Academic Progression (an increase of PhD holders)

Congratulations to Dr Anushie Moonasar and Dr Mousin Omarsaib on completing their PhD in Information Science from UNISA and DUT respectively. The library doctoral holders have been increased from three to five following the confirmation of the completion of a PhD in Information Science by Dr Anushie Moonasar and Dr Mousin Omarsaib. As part of the library's contribution towards assisting the university with the postgraduate supervision capacity challenges, all five doctorate holders in the library were encouraged and released to embark on postgraduate supervision in their areas of specialization.

Furthermore, a record number of library staff members are currently busy with higher degree studies. Currently, 5 staff members from historically disadvantaged groups are in various stages of their PhD studies.

Durban International Book Fair (DIBF)

One of the main highlights was DUT's participation in the Durban International Book Fair, which took place from 09 to 13 August 2023. DUT showcased its staff and student authors at the fair. This was the second time DUT has participated in the fair, and the Library, Writing Centre and the Department of Graphic Design were co-hosts at the DUT stand. This year's event was on a much bigger scale, attracting many more literary partners, authors, schools and members of the public. Representatives from the library book club, as well as Library WIL students and interns also attended the book fair to experience the many interesting talks, book launches and workshops that took place during their visit.

On the opening day of the Book Fair, Wednesday, 09 August 2023, DUT staff member, Barry Lottering held a one-hour session on Cover Design and Layout. He left the guests fascinated by the process of book cover design and layout. Later on this day, DUT 2nd year Graphic Design students, Ntobela Zonke (How Ella Got Her Friends Back), Joshua Naidoo (MAX Goes Shopping), Kaurin Reddy (The Wondering Duckling) and Shrivar Rabichand (The Big Clean Up) presented their soon-to-be-published children's books under the title: "Design, Sustainability, Community & Entrepreneurship". On Sunday, 13 August 2023, DUT student authors, Sboniso Ngcobo and Nomali Zondi were in conversation with the Writing Centre's Dr Jeff Mkhize on their recent publications. They shared insights on the writing journey and shared advice to aspiring student writers. Sboniso's book called "Ubungqabavu (Vitality)" is available on the library's open-access books platform, while Nomali's novel, "The Rusty Tin Hotel' is available for purchase on Amazon. Representing the staff authors were Professor Fulufhelo Netswera, Executive Dean: Faculty of Management Sciences at DUT and Dr Sasi Gangiah who launched their recently published academic books. Prof Netswera co-edited a book called "State-owned Enterprises in Africa and the Economics of Public Service Delivery", Dr Gangiah recently published her book on "Environmental Ergonomics: Commercial Kitchens in a Semi-tropical City" and Dr Catharina Womack's books on "The Influence of Labour Legislation on Job Creation and Job Sustainability in South Africa" were featured at the fair. All three of the books are published open-access and can be viewed on the publisher's website.

• Performance Review

Inculcating a culture of accountability is a priority for the DUT Library and a critical pillar for the successful rollout of the performance management system across the system. To this end, for the period under review, 100% of library staff signed the performance contracts, completed their mid-term review reports and were scheduled to complete year-end final reviews. The Library achieved a 100% compliance target.

• Practice Sharing Sessions with TUT

In reflecting on Information Literacy practices and Research Support training, sharing sessions were arranged with library colleagues from the Tshwane University of Technology Library on the 9th of February and 18th of July 2023. Such sessions provide insight into best practices in this area.

• Information Literacy Residence Programme:

A joint initiative between the Library and the CELT residence programme was piloted in the fourth term. Tutors were identified and trained to offer Information literacy support at the residences. Minimal sessions were held due to exam/test schedules but the initiative has shown potential for further implementation in 2024

• South African Library Week

The Library celebrated South African Library Week (SALW) from 20-26 March 2023 and as part of the celebration hosted a public lecture event on 23 March. This event was held virtually and was well received. Mr Mandla Ntombela, the former President of the Library and Information Association of South Africa (LIASA) presented the public lecture online. The theme for the SALW was theme "Libraries: Telling Powerful Stories". The theme resonated with several library programmes and strategic directions. The South African Library Week represents an important occasion in our university calendar. It is for this reason that yearly as the DUT and the Library, we plan and celebrate the SALW including the hosting of the public lecture as part of the proceedings.

Makerspace Training

Mr Strauss, Makerspace Manager of the University of Johannesburg, visited the DUT Library on 8 and 9 June 2023 to assist with the operationalisation of the Indumiso Library makerspace. Mr Strauss has extensive knowledge and expertise in this area and provided consultation for senior administrators and academics and training for library technical staff. Concerning the consultations, he offered advice on space utilisation, new equipment and possible integration opportunities with the academic programme at the Indumiso campus. Library staff were trained in the use of 3D printers, 3D scanners and programming kits. The facility houses 4IR technologies which include 3D technology printers, 3D scanners; Drone phantom, Lego, VR headset, a large interactive screen, Raspberry Pi kits and PCs and many other latest equipment and technologies aimed at stimulating creativity, innovation and entrepreneurship.

International Open-access Week

The Library commemorated the International Open-access Week with colourful and creative displays, a public lecture and informative posters from 23 to 28 October. Activities planned for this week included a public lecture, a demonstration of open resources and a promotion of the existing transformational agreements. The Library designed special posters to inform users about the existing open-access publishing platforms at DUT and transformational agreements information.

Furthermore, a programme and invite to the planned open-access week public lecture was designed and shared on all library channels such as Facebook, Twitter (now known as X), TV screens and library traditional notice boards. The Library further facilitated the OA Week public lecture that was delivered by one of the giants in the LIS field, Ms Ellen Tise, the current Senior Director: Library and Information Services at Stellenbosch University Library.

Staff Recognition Function

As part of its strategic priority focus area and perspective on stewardship, in a heartfelt tribute to the dedicated individuals shaping the success of our library, the much-anticipated 2022 Staff Recognition Awards Function took centre stage on Friday, 31 March 2023, at the elegant Elangeni, Maharani Hotel. This event served as a beacon of appreciation, acknowledging the unwavering commitment and hard work of our esteemed library staff. Behind the scenes, the Staff Recognition Working Group orchestrated a series of planning meetings to meticulously organize the event and ensure its seamless execution. The 2022 Staff Recognition Awards Function stands as a testament to the library's commitment to fostering a culture of appreciation and excellence.

Mobility Programme to University of Huelva

Manager: Library Information Resources and Systems, Mr Sagren Moodley visited the University of Huelva in Spain in June 2023, as part of a mobility programme facilitated by the International Office. The programme which ran from the 19 to 23 June 2023 was also attended by four (4) other DUT staff, three academics and one support staff. Each of the DUT staff attended a facilitated programme as well as discipline-specific activities that were pre-arranged with counterparts at the University of Huelva.

The daily cultural programme included Spanish language and dancing classes and many opportunities to network with participants from other countries that attended. Mr Moodley was fortunate to have multiple engagements with library staff that allowed him to learn about the library and share information about DUT and its many successes.

• Institutional Audit

In preparation for the audit, Library Management like other departments at the University made submissions to the institutional Self Evaluation Report (SER) that was submitted to the CHE. In April, a mock audit was held where representatives from the various departments were interviewed. Library Management participated in this process. Feedback from that mock session was used to prepare for the actual audit that took place from 8-12 May 2023.

The Library Director was interviewed on the 11th of May 2023. In addition, the panel conducted site visits. These visits included the AP, BMP and Midlands libraries. Library representatives at the sites, led by the respective site Managers met the panel and took them around for a tour of the key areas.

Africa Day Celebrations

The library collaborated with the International Education and Partnerships (IEP) directorate, Corporate Affairs, Student Governance and the Housing Unit to commemorate Africa Day in May. The joint team organised a virtual public lecture event as well as a physical event to commemorate Africa Month. Library sites put up attractive and informative displays to create awareness and support this annual event.

The 2023 event was graced by Dr Gcina Mhlophe as a special guest. A Question and Answer session to find out more about her journey as a poet, writer, traveller, director, and author was facilitated by Mr Siphumelele Zondi, a well-respected journalist, TV anchor and Journalism lecturer at DUT. Dr Mhlophe later delivered a speech encouraging participants to understand their African identity, the importance of one's culture and sense of belonging as well as sharing her experiences in writing and travelling as an African storyteller.

• Relocation of the Research Commons

As part of re-imagining its library spaces, the Research Commons at BM Patel Library on the ML Sultan campus was relocated from the fourth floor to the ground floor for the benefit of the postgraduate students and researchers. The project is aligned with strategic objectives on the digital environment and state-of-the-art Infrastructure from the systems and processes perspective.

• Library Hi-Tech Conference Facility

Over the last five years, the DUT Library has embarked on several projects to re-imagine, repurpose and re-design its learning and research spaces to create an enabling environment (physical and digital) to support teaching, learning and research enablement.

During the year under review, as part of its strategy to continue re-imagining its spaces, the Library was allocated half a million rand (R500K) by the Acting DVC: Teaching and Learning, Prof Singh to develop a high-tech conference facility. Building the 21st century, fit-for-purpose academic smart libraries is about facilitating access to information and knowledge in digital spaces with fewer physical information resources. It is against this background that the library management has put together a motivation for the allocated funds to build a Hi-Tech Conference and Training Facility at BM Patel Library on the ML Sultan campus to facilitate knowledge sharing for the Library and the University.

Apart from supporting the institution in providing a Hi-Tech Facility that could be used as knowledge sharing space for hosting conferences and meetings, this facility would also enable the library to generate third-stream income to support the maintenance and growth of the facility. The conference facility on the fourth floor is now almost 100% complete, and drywall and furniture have both been ordered and installed.

• Appointment of Postgraduate Librarian

Ms Patricia Nonsikelelo Badenhorst, the former Training Librarian has been appointed as the Postgraduate Librarian based at the BM Patel Library. She will support the PG cohort for the Faculties of Management Sciences, and Accounting and Informatics. Ms Sara Mitha has moved to the AP Library and will service the Faculties of Applied Sciences, Health Sciences and Engineering and the Built Environment. Mr Nkuna was appointed as the Midlands postgraduate librarian from 1st September 2023.

• Library EAPP2023

During the period under review, the library management was involved in a series of workshops and consultations with staff to develop the Library's Extended Annual Performance Plan. The Library EAPP2023

cascaded down from the Teaching and Learning EAPP 2023 and the institutional EAPP2023 targets. The development of this operational plan informed and gave much-needed direction to the performance contracting process.

• Library Research and Postgraduate Support

The Directorate for Research and Postgraduate Support requested that the library research support workshops be scheduled within their research activities or events for the first semester of the year. Since COVID-19 19 the workshops have been held online. The very first workshop was held in person on 14 February 2023 and the attendance has been phenomenal as over a hundred participants partook in the library research support workshop.

1.2. Lowlights / Challenges

Water Damages at AP Library

There was serious water damage at the AP Library on the Steve Biko Campus. Water damage in Alan Pittendrigh Library was a result of a fire eruption in the lecture venues above the Library at the complex. Ceiling tiles in the boardroom, study area, social seating area, CELT training room and offices were all damaged and needed to be removed and replaced. Light fittings were all damaged and Carpets were soaked with water in the affected areas.

Library Closures

Indumiso and Riverside Libraries closed several times due to power cable theft and water cuts respectively. Such closures impacted negatively on the service delivery and access to library and information services.

• Student Protests

There have been instances of student protests across the campuses. This has negatively affected operations. The libraries had become the easy target during the riots and student protests. Some libraries were forced to close due to student protests. As such, this impacted negatively on library service delivery and availability.

• Outdated Library Structure

The outdated library structure which is based on the outdated traditional print model is rendering the library irrelevant, non-responsive and ineffective in responding to the new service requirements and technological changes posed by the fourth industrial revolution and new scholarly communication models. The Library hopes to address these structural inefficiencies once the institutional structural review phase 2 starts within the teaching and learning sector environment.

Loadshedding

Load-shedding has become a regular occurrence and caused major library service disruptions. This is very disruptive for students who have to leave the libraries when the power is switched off. It also impacts staff operations. This has negatively affected library access, availability and service delivery to library users across campuses. The network was also affected by the continuous blackouts which also impacted productivity.

Damage to the Indumiso Library Building

The libraries have become the easy target during the riots and student protests. Indumiso Library building was stoned and damaged and forced to close due to student protests. This impacted negatively on library service delivery and availability and has negative implications to the University resources since the repairs are quite costly.

Network / Wi-Fi Connectivity Issues

For the period under review, many Wi-Fi problems affected both our Midlands-based Libraries. For almost three weeks, Indumiso and Riverside Libraries experienced intermittent network connection. This resulted in the disruption of the normal site operations and services. This is a course of concern since this situation is still not fully resolved. This had a negative impact on our work, as librarians could not be online to respond to queries and search for information. Furthermore, poor connectivity and connecting via Smartphones have presented challenges for staff and students.

Payment of Invoices and the Currency Rates

The exchange rate impacts heavily on the library information resources budget. The exchange rates this year have been volatile, making it difficult to manage the information resources budget effectively. The timeous processing of requisitions, signing of subscription contracts and the payment of foreign exchange invoices is of critical importance, as delays in any of these processes, do lead to payments being made at a higher rate, thereby reducing our capacity to meet all yearly subscription costs.

Poor State of Printing and Photocopying Solution

The library's printing and photocopying solution needs urgent replacement. The contract to replace the current equipment ended in 2020 and the service has been compromised, with a limited number of machines still operating optimally. Further, vital equipment for the loading of funds to photocopy or print is also antiquated and cannot be repaired. The delays in replacing the equipment are due to an institutional-wide solution being sourced that would be more efficiently managed. A task team comprising of ICTS, Library and Printing Room staff have worked on specifications in preparation for the tender.

Delays in the Access Control Project

The library had developed plans in 2019 to secure library entrances with the installation of modern, high-tech solutions to improve security and access in all six libraries. This project has now been absorbed into a university-wide project that will improve security across the campus. The biggest challenge for the library is that due to delays in this process, other library security projects to install access control to postgraduate research commons at site libraries cannot be completed until specifications for the university-wide project are completed.

• Training & Development

Unfortunately, a percentage of allocated Staff Development funds were withdrawn by HCS, during the course of the year. This affected the planned training interventions for the year. Library staff attended some of the centrally arranged training courses arranged by HCS. Library Managers attempted to manage the process by supporting staff attendance to interventions relative to those identified as part of their staff development plans.

The figure below highlights the major in-house initiatives for this year.




Figure: Visual depiction of the development initiatives hosted in 2023

CV Writing and Interview Skills

In response to staff requests, a training intervention on CV writing and interview skills, for library staff was arranged. The training aimed to assist staff with compiling an informative, relevant and up-to-date CV and to empower them with skills for an interview. Ms Portia Rakoma from the LIS programme was engaged to facilitate an in-person session and cover related content that is included within the LIS curriculum. In addition, a peer-coaching model was set up for follow-up assistance.

Knowledge Management (KM)

As part of Dr Chaputula's benchmarking visit to the DUT Library, he jointly presented a KM workshop with Mr Thomas. The workshop targeted senior staff and involved providing some foundational understanding of KM as well as reflection on current practices within the lens of KM. The training took place on the 18th and 20th of September 2023. Staff that attended received certificates of attendance.

Data Literacy

In positioning the Library for data-driven decision-making, it became necessary to build a data culture that involved staff understanding the dynamics of collecting, storing, ethically engaging and sharing data as well as presenting data in an informative manner.

A service provider (Kubicle) has been engaged to administer an online scaffolded training course for all library staff that would build an understanding and capacity in handling data. The learning path has been structured such that staff will be directed to modules relative to the needs analysis whilst still allowing for some flexibility. The course will continue into the new year.

• Transformational Agreements (TAs) Briefing Session

As a strategy to increase the uptake of the TAs, information sessions were held with information services librarians. This intervention was intended to give the librarians an operational understanding of the agreements, unpack the processes involved and how to appropriately direct academics to benefit from these agreements.

• Training on Braille Equipment

As part of its project to become more inclusive and responsive to the needs of the differently abled students at DUT, the Library acquired Braille equipment. A training session on the use of the software application was arranged with Edit Microsystems.

The training was targeted at members of the Library's Universal Access Working Group, SHE Committee members, Library IT staff and Disability Rights Office (Student Services).

Self-Check Service

With the implementation of the RFID self-check kiosks, all staff were trained on the service. This empowerment initiative will also allow staff to direct and support students in the use of self-service. A video tutorial was also developed and is hosted on online platforms. Further enhancements to this service are forthcoming.

Discovery Tool User Interface Discussion/testing

The Information Services team were engaged in interrogating the platform for consistency and completeness. Inconsistencies and errors experienced were addressed with representatives from UKS and Ebsco respectively. In the last quarter of the year, the team gave input on the new user interface. This will be released in the new year.

Compiling Programme Review / Mid-term Check Reports

Mr Julian Vooght from CQPA was invited to the Information Services meeting on the 17th of August to address the Information Service team on these review reports, providing some context and the type of information that should be presented.

Library Assistant Occupational Qualification

The Education, Training and Development Practices Sector Education and Training Authority (ETDP SETA) have developed a LIS qualification (Occupational Certificate: Library Assistant) that targets Library Assistants.

The qualification includes knowledge modules and practical modules and requires that the students enrolled gain industry experience through in-service at a designated industry Workplace Learning Site. The DUT Library has been evaluated and recognized as such a site. Mr Thomas will be coordinating our involvement in these learning programmes.

Annual Library Research Colloquium

This colloquium took place on the 3rd of November 2023. This was a hybrid event and featured 11 Lightning talks and 5 conference presentations. The initiative aims to engage staff in reflecting and presenting on their practice or areas of interest. Various support measures were in place to support the presenters, especially the novice presenters.

Copyright Processes

The Information Services team participated in a workshop held at DUT, focused on copyright processes and procedures. Dr Ramika Bansi, DUT's designated Copyright practitioner, served as the workshop facilitator.

The primary objective of the workshop was to enhance librarians' understanding of the intricacies involved in adhering to copyright legislation. Additionally, Dr Bansi conducted awareness and training sessions for various faculties throughout the year.

Lunch & Learn: Al Introduction

An introductory presentation was held for Library staff within the Lunch & Learn initiative. The Lunch & Learn concept is built around having a forum to discuss recently published articles or trending topics, around the lunch table.

This session was presented online by Mr Prashanth Sivsaran. During the session, Mr Sivsaran delivered a short presentation focussed on Generative Al tools.

• National & International Conferences

For the period under review, the Library's conference budget was limited and could not support all conference applications received. Staff were therefore encouraged to make applications for funding available from the Research Directorate.

This year the Library supported the attendance of 16 staff to attend the LIASA conference. Six persons attended in person while a further 11 attended virtually.

2.2. Institutional Culture

• Library Strategic Planning

Library management engaged in strategic planning on the 29th and 30th of May. The session was facilitated by Mr Anil Salick and it focussed on plotting the way forward for the period 2024-2030 and embracing the service offerings that are deemed relevant for the evolving library. Library staff were allowed to engage with the document. University senior staff also engaged with the plan and apart from a few adjustments required, the efforts of the Library were acknowledged.

• Operational Planning: Development of the Library 2023 EAPP

The library management team worked on operational plans that cascaded from the Strategic Plan and developed the Library's Extended Annual Performance Plan (EAPP). This plan cascaded from the DVC: T&L's EAPP and contributed toward the operational planning and development of Performance agreements.

• Institutional Audit

The Library provided input into the institutional Self Evaluation Report (SER) that was submitted to the CHE. The Management team participated in both the mock audit and later in the actual audit that took place from 8-12 May 2023. In addition, the panel conducted site visits. These visits included the AP, BMP and Midlands libraries. Library representatives at the sites, led by the respective site Managers met the panel and took them around for a tour of the key areas.

Developing the LibQual QIP

The QIP in response to the LibQual survey 2021 was developed and shared with relevant persons within the library. These actions now need to be operationalised and managed by the respective managers. Library Management intends to administer the LibQual survey again in 2024.

• E-Resources Usage Surveys

In response to declining usage statistics, a survey to determine contributing factors was considered to be an appropriate instrument. Such a survey was conducted for the Faculty of Arts and Design in May 2023. The results indicated the need for increased awareness and training. Also, the nature of the assignments did not require the use of databases. These findings will be factored into a marketing strategy. Similar surveys are planned for the other faculties.

• Performance Review Culture

Inculcating a culture of accountability is a priority for the DUT Library and a critical pillar for the successful rollout of the performance management system across the system. To this end, for the period under review, 100% of library staff signed the performance contracts, completed their mid-term review reports and were scheduled to complete final year performance reviews. The Library achieved a 100% compliance target.

Engagement with Student Leadership

Library Management met with representatives from the Student Leadership forum on the 26th of June and then on the 13th of September. Library Management is hopeful for continued engagement and cooperation between both parties.

Book Clubs

To contribute to the development and nourishment of a reading culture within the university, book clubs have been created. The Book Club at the DUT Library are still expanding. Throughout 2023, the Book Club Representatives held numerous meetings at various locations, remaining extremely busy. These Representatives organized several events in collaboration with library employees.

Book clubs have been established to support the growth and upkeep of a reading culture inside the university. Book club activities are organized and supported in large part by the marketing and communication librarian. Support for the book club in 2023 included organizing meetings, making posters detailing the events, and posting information about the club's activities on the library's digital channels, including Facebook, Twitter, TV screens, and notice boards. This year, library book clubs situated at both the Durban and Midlands sites boasted approximately 450 members collectively.

There were numerous seminars and gatherings in the Midlands and Durban. In addition, the meetings serve as a platform for recruiting and motivating new members to take part in book club activities. Co-chairs of the staff and student book clubs attended one of the planning sessions in Durban.

2.3.1. Marketing of Events/Webinars







2.3.2. Innovative Projects

• Indumiso Makerspace

Key library personnel have met with the Midlands Directorate and academic staff to continue talks on the integration of the Indumiso Library Makerspace into the curriculum. A meeting that was convened in June 2023 during the visit of Mr Rudi Strauss, the UJ Makerspace Manager, was attended by some academics and Dr Joe Molete, the Midlands Director. The library hopes to develop the Makerspace facility incrementally, and once fully developed, it will serve as a blueprint for other library sites.

The Makerspace is open to all students on the Midlands Campus. A dedicated library staff member is available to assist students with the use of the equipment in the facility. Currently, the team is working on finalizing standard operating procedures as well as working on acquiring additional equipment and tools for the Makerspace. From the integration perspective, we have held many discussions with academics, but we are still working towards identifying a pilot programme for 2024.

DUT Library TECH Week

A library task team involved in creating an online information literacy package for high school learners have reviewed the content and format of the tutorial videos and has repackaged it relative to the environment within which it would be piloted. This will be piloted with an identified school within the Imbali Precinct project. The project has been postponed to obtain the necessary ethical clearance.

The DUT Library is dedicated to enhancing the library user's experience by offering state-of-the-art technologies in both the physical and virtual library environments. Library TECH Week is an annual event designed to showcase and promote the innovative library technologies utilized by our esteemed staff and students.

This year's TECH Week was held from 24 to 28 July 2023. Activities during this week, included demonstrations on the use of the technological services provided by the library, including ENDNOTE installation, using OneDrive, connecting mobile devices to the Wi-Fi, setup of MFA (Multi-Factor Authentication) system for remote login, and PressReader, which allows users to access and read newspapers and magazines remotely using their mobile devices. The following activities were part of the Tech Week celebrations:

Library RFID Self-Check Service Launch

RFID Launch was one of the activities that happened during Library Tech Week. The ground floor of the BM Patel Library hosted the event. The event went smoothly even though there were a few unplanned power outages that weren't related to load shedding.

Library Makerspace Open Day

In addition to Library Tech Week, a library Makerspace Open Day was held at the Indumiso Library where students were introduced to some of the cutting-edge technology in the maker space, such as a mobile drone, 3D printers and 3D scanners.

Smart Libraries, Smart People!

PERSPECTIVE: SYSTEMS AND PROCESSES

Transforming and positioning the library into a "Smart Library", a key role player in the scientific knowledge production and distribution systems and as the preferred publisher of scientific knowledge for that matter demands a rethink of our systems and processes. It is for this reason that some strategic initiatives have been developed to re-imagine the library's business processes and systems environment by investing in the development of state-of-the-art (smart) facilities, learning and research spaces.

3.1. Innovative Curricula and Research

Referencing Style Review 2023

A task team that reviewed the DUT Harvard referencing guide was established. In doing so, they considered whether to adopt the universal conventions of referencing or remain with the DUT Harvard style. The task led by Mr Thomas includes Mr Nxumalo, Ms Mitha, Ms Spershott, Ms Naidoo and Dr Omarsaib. The information services team was engaged in giving input into this review process. The team resolved to maintain the current DUT version of the style which does incorporate the standard conventions of referencing but agreed that the current style may need some enhancements.

Plagiarism Policy Review

The Library team engaged with the policy and made submissions as to how to incorporate Al use, into the policy.

3.1.1. Undergraduate Services (Information Literacy Training, Queries, Faculty Analysis)

Cornerstone and Information Literacy (IL):

The Cornerstone Information Literacy module was offered online on Moodle, over the 2 semesters. The 5 learning areas were accompanied by self-tests, using multiple-choice questions. Manager: Library Academic Services, Mr Thomas has raised concern on whether this approach did result in learning taking place since Librarians reported that students were not able to translate the learning into practice. Mr Thomas has been negotiating additional information Literacy tutorials for 2024, which will supplement the Moodle instance of the module.

Information Literacy Training

Information Literacy is about developing the skills of staff and students to recognize when and what kinds of information are required to address a particular information need, know what sources to consult, successfully navigate the medium/platform to retrieve the information and then apply that information ethically. The number of training sessions over the year varies by faculty and by the particular programmes. Librarians have noted improvements in some departments while declines in others. A strategy that has demonstrated improved attendance to these sessions, is having the lecturer present in the sessions. The Librarians have engaged different pedagogical strategies to better engage the students. Whilst this does allow for the student to better grasp the skills being taught, it does mean that more time is necessary to do justice to such approaches. Unfortunately, more time for IL sessions is a 'luxury'. Online sessions are continuing and provide the benefit of a wider reach as well as the benefit of having the session recorded for later reference. Such sessions are arranged in conjunction with the lecturers concerned.

The table below provides the average percentage attendance of students by Faculty. It reflects the average attendance for the sessions held during this reporting period.

Information Literacy Evaluation Surveys

Student feedback on Information literacy training sessions provides valuable formative feedback on both the content of such lessons as well as the pedagogical approaches and skills applied. Such feedback has not been captured consistently by all librarians, hence the Manager: Academic Services has provided a template of possible questions that could be used as part of such a questionnaire, that librarians need to administer. This will be tracked and reported on in the new year.

Reference Queries (Reference queries for teaching and learning support by faculty)

The librarians are fielding queries via various online platforms including email, WhatsApp, and MS Teams as well as via the Ask a Librarian service which entails a real-time live chat facility. The live chat facility (LibChat) has been customised to enhance the routing process and is monitored by librarians as well as the Circulation coordinators and IT support staff. The stats generated from queries for the Circulation coordinators and IT support staff will be reported on in the respective Managers' reports. An overall decline in the number of queries has been noted. This could be due to the students being able to navigate the platforms easily and do not require assistance beyond the information literacy training or it could be that the service requires more marketing. It is noted however that the Librarians are not consistently capturing this data. This needs to be addressed. Queries vary in nature and complexity and the team has been trained in dealing with FAQs as well as routing the queries appropriately. An overall decline in statistics has been noted. This could be attributed to students being familiar with the library environment at this juncture or finding answers via the support resources that are available, for example, the LibGuides and tutorials.

3.1.2. Postgraduate Services

• Appointment of New Members to the Library PG Support Team

Ms Patricia Badenhorst has been appointed as the postgraduate librarian from the 1st of June 2023 for the Faculties of Arts and Design, Accounting and Informatics and the Management Sciences. She is based at the BM Patel Library on the ground floor in the Research Commons.

The second PG Librarian was appointed in the third quarter. He is Mr Themba Nkuna who was appointed as the Librarian: Site & Information Services at the Midlands Campus libraries. Mr Nkuna also supports postgraduate students at the Midlands campus.

• Relocation of the Research Commons (BM Patel Library)

The relocation of the Research Commons from the 4th Floor of the BM Patel Library to the ground floor took place at the beginning of June 2023. The intention for the relocation is that the facility will become a 24/7 facility for postgraduate students in the future.

• Systematic Reviews

Postgraduate librarians have been increasingly called upon to be involved either as team members or being consulted concerning database selection and searching strategies. Increased support for customizing information search strategies in response to systematic review research has been apparent. These are often complex, require close consultation and are time-consuming but rewarding to both authors and postgraduate librarians.

SciVal Visibility

Ms Badenhorst and Mr Nkuna have recently achieved a notable milestone in their academic journey by completing the SciVal certification course. This six-module online programme covered the core competencies and functionalities for librarians to navigate SciVal. The course is designed to enhance participants' knowledge and skills in the field of academic research evaluation and assessment. It covers various aspects related to research impact, collaboration networks, and scholarly performance metrics. See below certificates:

Customised requests: Several information requests have been received for bibliometrics and data from SciVal.



• Training, Queries, Faculty Analysis

Library information sessions were offered at the Research Capacity Development Workshop for all postgraduates and researchers. This is organised by the Research and Postgraduate Support Directorate. In addition, there were specific requests from faculties or departments, which were accommodated.

This year has been very productive in terms of the number of workshops, webinars and orientations held. The majority of events were held online to accommodate the number of participants.

For this year these were the sessions offered. The content and examples used were customized for the different groups.

3.2. Digital Environment

3.2.1. Library Technologies

Scholarship, DUT Repositories, Virtual library tools, Social media presence and management, Open Scholar

LibGuides

The subject/research guides are customized by Librarians to provide a portal to resources that support the various subjects offered at DUT. Librarians curate links to content which includes resources that the library subscribes to as well as open-access content. The platform is robust enough to function as more than a repository and has been engaged as a platform to market products and events as well as to administer formative activities. In consultation with lecturers, the librarians collate and present content that supports specific assignments. While some of the guides are consulted frequently, others are not. This platform provides a gateway to finding relevant resources within the discipline but requires greater marketing and adoption. Based on the comparative statistics, some guides boast a high number of views. This is contributed by the strategy employed by the librarians to make the guides a critical resource in supporting academic and research programmes. Such strategies drive traffic to the guides, which contain links and support material, including tutorials.

Subject librarians and Postgraduate Librarians continue to have a virtual presence by adopting various tools for teaching and engagement. These include MS Teams, Moodle, LibGuides, LibChat, WhatsApp, and email.

The **LibChat** facility has been adopted as a primary medium for synchronous engagement with staff and students. Students often use the LibChat facility. This is used not only for Library related queries but students see it as a place where they would get assistance. Often Librarians field queries that do not relate to the library, e.g. about departments within the institution, getting a student card and many more such queries. The period under review saw an increased uptake of the LibChat facility by users.

• Web Presence Group

Ms Spershott coordinated inputs from librarians concerning the new design to include a Tab for Undergraduate and postgraduate support. Proposals were shared on customising the discovery tool search box and branding of the virtual reference services. These actions are currently in process.

▶ Library E-Resources: Usage Statistics

• QuickFinder (EBSCO Discovery Tool)

There are clear patterns in the usage of QuickFinder. During the month of March, there was a consistent peak in usage and in August there was higher engagement, particularly in terms of abstract requests, indicating academic preparation. Fluctuations in December might be attributed to reduced academic activities during this period. These statistics provide valuable insights into user engagement with library services throughout the year, emphasising the importance of considering seasonal variations and user preferences in the planning and delivery of library resources and support.

Full-text Databases (journals and e-books)

Between Jan - Dec 2023, 1575772 full-text items (journals and e-books) were viewed, compared with 1043564 for the same period last year – an increase of 50.99%. The reason could be that Worth Global Style Network (WGSN) increased usage by 1317.29%, (high usage from the 3rd quarter).

Abstracting/Indexing Databases

A total of 144065 searches were done in the abstract databases from Jan to Dec 2023 compared to 204342 searches done for the same period last year, a decrease of 29.49%. Scopus usage increased to 14361 by 18.26% searches during Jan – Dec 2023 compared to 12143 of the same periods in 2022.



The databases with the **highest cost per search** in Jan – Dec 2023 are:




E-Book Usage

These stats were analysed further to determine the top 5 e-books downloaded. The 5 most used purchased e-books for Jan – Dec 2023 were Cost and Management Accounting Fundamentals [Proquest E-book Central] with 3204. Followed by Accounting Standards: a Comprehensive Question Book on International Financial Reporting Standards [Proquest E-book Central] with 2645, GAAP Handbook 2021 Vol I & 2 [Ebscohost] with I314, Cost and Management Accounting: Operations and Management [Proquest E-book Central] with I296 downloads and Core Principles of Accounting [Proquest E-book Central] with I234 downloads. The top 5 most purchased downloaded e-books for this year were from ProQuest E-book Central and Ebscohost.



Journal Downloads

The 5 most downloaded journals were collected from 8 full-text databases i.e. Science Direct, EBSCOhost, Emerald, IEEE, ProQuest, Taylor & Francis and Wiley for Jan – Dec 2023 to determine the 5 most used journals downloaded. The most popular database for Jan – Dec 2023 was Science Direct with 321645 full-text downloads and 5 of the most downloaded journals for this period were from Science Direct. The most used journal for Jan—Dec was Journal of Cleaner Production [ScienceDirect] with 9311 full-text downloads, followed by the Renewable and Sustainable Energy Reviews [ScienceDirect] with 7349 downloads, Bioresource Technology [ScienceDirect] with 6756 downloads, Science of The Total Environment [ScienceDirect] with 6361 downloads and finally Food Chemistry [ScienceDirect] with 6146 downloads.


• Usage of Library Resources: user authentication


Open Athens (library software that manages access to resources) keeps a log of all library users who sign in to access the library's full-text resources. 

Examination Repository

All faculties have made submissions to the repository in 2023 as compared to 2022, where only the Faculties of Management Sciences, Health Sciences and Engineering & Built Environment made submissions to the repository. Usage of the repository has increased significantly in 2023. This could be attributed to the availability of a large number of papers as compared to 2022. Significant increases can be noted in the Faculties of Management Sciences and Accounting and Informatics.

Circulation:

In 2023, there was a substantial increase in circulation, reaching 250,519 instances. This represents a remarkable 70% increase compared to the previous year, reflecting heightened activity and utilization of resources.

Headcount:

The headcount for 2023 surged to 676,517, demonstrating a considerable rise in the number of individuals availing library services. This represents an impressive 186% increase from the previous year, signifying a substantial expansion in user participation.

Photocopying:

Photocopying services experienced a significant uptake in 2023, reaching 363,710 instances. This reflects a substantial 70% increase compared to the previous year, indicating a heightened need for reproduction and document-related services.

In-house Usage:


In-house services recorded an increase in 2023, with 15,806 instances. This represents a notable 36% increase from the previous year, showcasing a growing demand for on-site services. The Faculty funds available balance is not a true reflection, as the remaining faculty funds at the end of August were transferred to a newly created funded (Merged Faculty Fund). This merged fund was open to all faculties to purchase information resources.

• Budget for Periodicals & Databases

R22 817 000 was allocated for subscriptions to databases and periodicals for 2023, an increase of 14.99% from the R19 841 610 received in 2022. Two 2022 subscription amounts (below) were paid from the 2023 budget.

- ♣ Scival (R838 906.37) The invoice was processed for payment on 13 July 2022 from the library.
- Springer (R467 087.47) The invoice was processed for payment on 03 November 2022 from the library.

For 2023, the database requisitions were sent to Procurement in November and December 2022 as per the Procurement plan. At the beginning of 2023, the exchange rate was unstable, and not favourable. Most of the large journal and database invoices were paid when the exchange rate proved to be unfavourable. Despite the volatile market, the 2023 budget was adequate to sustain the current subscriptions.

Copyright Expenses

A total of R 2 498 356,53 was spent on approved copyright licences during the 2023 academic year. The table below provides Faculty expenditure. An increase in Copyright Licence is noted from the year 2022 which was R I 46I 223.70.

The increase in expenditure can be attributed to the strict inspection control at the Print room that was made possible at the request for a WIL student appointment in mid-August. The positive impact towards ensuring a high level of copyright compliance has been achieved since reverting to the past practice of daily Print room inspections. Non-compliance had been recorded and licences to print were obtained.

The request for the disclaimer was finally accepted and implemented in January 2022. The implementation had a positive effect on compliance, which can be determined by the total expenditure committed to Copyright Licenses (as reflected below).

3.3.1. Research Support (postgraduate and faculty research services)

3.3.1.1. DUT Open Scholar

There has been increased growth in the repository, this is due to an increase in the number of masters and doctoral graduates, increased awareness campaigns around open-access; increased commitment to archiving of DUT research; development of a new library unit, Digital Services/ Scholarship; enhanced submission processes; and integration of reporting and submission systems.

The repository operational work is managed by the Institutional Repository Working Group, while policy and governance issues are handled by the Institutional Repository Advisory Committee (IRAC). IRAC is a representative forum consisting of the library, faculty research coordinators, research office and ICTs.


The DUT Open Scholar repository is running an old version of DSpace (version 5), which reached the end of its life in January 2023. In addition to security updates and support for this version of DSpace no longer being available, third-party utilities, such as Google Analytics ceased to function after June 2023. Since DUT's F5 firewall proxies all requests to the repository, it is not possible to determine the source of requests except by using Google Analytics. Consequently, there are no usage statistics for 2023. Furthermore, disk space on the current server is almost depleted.

ICTS did make a new server available in the third quarter of 2023 but has not been able to make the necessary adjustments to the firewall to make this server usable.

For the continued operation of DUT's institutional repository, the server must be migrated to the new environment and upgraded to DSpace 7 in early 2024.

The repository continued to grow steadily throughout 2023. This is due to continued participation from the majority of the DUT community in submitting theses and dissertations timeously, and also the dedication from library staff in ensuring that the appropriate systems and support are available to expedite submission and discovery.

The graph below depicts the growth of the repository from 2018. There is a year-on-year growth in the repository as the adoption of open access increases at DUT.

The graph below highlights the increase in uploads for the period under review.




ETD Uploads: 2023 compared to 2022 and 2021

Discoverability and visibility of research outputs in DUT Open Scholar

Depositing research publications on DUT Open Scholar increases the visibility and discoverability of the research outputs. The institutional repository (DUT Open Scholar) is harvested in multiple platforms including national and international repositories as well as Google. The harvesting helps to ensure the greater discoverability and visibility of the research outputs in the repository. M&D theses and dissertations are proving to be the most downloaded items in the DUT Open Scholar for the period under review. Compared to 2022, the downloads of theses and dissertations increased by 3.7% this year (from 325,777 to 337,989), while the downloads of articles increased by 31% (68,601 to 90,102). These are positive signs that suggest that the university's research output is accessible and continues to offer value to the wider research community. Downloads of ETDs from the Faculty of Management Sciences and Faculty of Health Sciences collections continue to dominate.





• SDGs Engagement of Research Available on Open Scholar

Using the database's built-in natural language processing functionality along with keywords developed from the University of Auckland's Keyword Mapping Project and Elsevier's SDG Research-Mapping Initiative, it is possible to assess the degree to which research available on Open Scholar engages with the different United Nations's Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The following graph provides an overall assessment of SDG engagement of all research on the repository up until the end of 2023:



The most engagement was with SDG 17, 'Partnerships for the goals', where 114 keywords were matched within the abstracts, followed by SDG 4, 'Quality Education', with 108 matched keywords, and SDG 3, 'Good health and well-being', with 104 matches. The least-matched SDG was 14, 'Life below water', with only 7 matched keywords.

• Research Data Management

Despite implementing the tools, software, data management templates and repositories and providing the necessary support for the archiving of research data, there has been little progress in integrating these tools within the research processes. RDM activities are on hold, while the Research Office and library address the issue of the RDM policy. A number of tasks are still to be undertaken by the Research Directorate for RDM to be effectively implemented at DUT. These include the finalization of the RDM policy, setting up of an information sharing session with the research community as well as the finalization of workflows and personnel to manage the entire process. The library awaits the development and approval of the Research Data Management (RDM) Policy and the formalization of processes for research data management. RDM project is hamstrung by the lack of a policy.

• DUT Library as Publishing Service Platform

The Library has been increasingly adopting the publishing role. The library has directed much of its investment philosophy towards making open access a reality. We are moving away from a traditional print collection-based model to a more broadly service-oriented model. The current library publishing initiatives such as DUT Open Journals and Open Books bear testimony to that effect. With these Open-access Science initiatives, the aim is to ensure the discoverability and visibility of our research outputs.

• **DUT Open Journal**


The library is slowly developing its portfolios of open Journals https://journals.dut.ac.za. The library is hosting the Research Office's African Journal of Inter/Multidisciplinary Studies (AJIMS) on its open-source software, Open Journal Systems (OJS). There were views and downloads from across the world, but significant usage from South Africa and the United States of America. Other countries accessing the journal include Nigeria, the United Kingdom, India, Philippines and Australia.



Digital Object Identifiers (DOIs)

DUT became a member of Crossref in January 2021, giving the Library the means to assign DOIs for our digital objects, such as research articles, theses, eBooks and journals. A DOI is a unique and permanent identifier for a digital document, ensuring its reliable location by potential readers. The Library is engaged in an ongoing project to retrospectively assign DOIs to theses and articles. total of 341 DOIs were assigned to DUT publications and theses and dissertations during 2023. journals, DUT open books and theses and dissertations. The retrospective assigning of DOIs to research articles will continue place in 2023.

Similarly, the Library must demonstrate the value proposition and usage of such investment.

3.3.2.1. Systems and support

Student Support – this service is offered virtually and on-site. The statistics highlight the evolving landscape of technology support at DUT Library, with a specific focus on the implementation of MFA and various other technical support categories. This information can be valuable for the university in optimizing resource allocation and enhancing support services for students. The IT Team offered both online and on-site support.

4. PERSPECTIVE: SUSTAINABILITY

4.1. Distinctive Education

COIL

The MOU and SOP between the Library and the International Office about the COIL venues in the Library, have been finalised and will now provide clear direction pertaining to the operationalizing of these venues Two venues have been set up. One at the basement of the AP Library and the second at the BM Patel Library.

UCDG Funds

Tutors were recruited, trained, and provided with peer assistance for Information Literacy and the Research Commons throughout the year. Preference was given to students enrolled in the LIS programme for these opportunities. Two categories of tutors were employed: Information Literacy tutors and Research Commons tutors. While their responsibilities differed slightly, so did the academic level of the students they supported. To sustain this service, the Library was involved in submitting a funding proposal for the next cycle of funding 2024-2026.

4.2. Financial Sustainability: OPEX, CAPEX, Strategic Priorities Funds

For the period under review, the Library received a total operational budget of R 29 843 180. As of 31 December 2022, 99% of the main budget had already been spent - these were positive indicators that the library budget was used to meet current needs, as well as allow for the acquisition of new software and other online materials to support the academic and research project. Library Capex spending was at 99%. The spending was a good indicator of the university's commitment towards prioritizing investment in building and maintaining state-of-the-art infrastructure and equipment.

• Transformational Agreements (TAs) with Big Publishers of Scientific Information

Science coming out of publicly funded universities should flourish inclusively and sustainably to ensure public access that is free from copyright restrictions.

Through the signed TAs with five publishers of scientific knowledge, the Library continued to transform the university research enterprise (scientific knowledge production) in a manner that is much more open, developmental, inclusive and sustainable.

A total of 58 articles in TAs were approved during Jan – Dec 2023, with an estimated saving of R 3 719 733,78 to the institution. Under Creative Commons (Open-access) Licenses, these DUT-affiliated researchers retained copyright to the articles. As highlighted in the figure below, DUT authors have not taken up the free TAs for ACM Digital. There has been a significant increase in the number of articles published in the second term.

Although the ScienceDirect /Elsevier and Springer Nature transformational contracts were only signed in July 2023, articles from these publishers account for 63% of the articles that have been approved by the library for the TAs.




External Assessment and Examination

mobile drone, 3D printers and 3D
scanners.

A highlight of this week was the launch of the library's Self-Check Service on 26 July at the BM Patel Library, ML Sultan Campus. Self-Check Service units allow users to borrow and return books independently while endeavouring to reduce long queues at the circulation desks. The launch event witnessed a diverse attendance, with students, academics, and administrative



staff from various departments, along with representatives from Universal Knowledge Systems (UKS), the supplier of the units. Mohamed Ismail from UKS delivered an informative talk highlighting the advantages of utilising Self-Check Services in libraries. The Library's Self-Check Service is supported by Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) technology.

As part of the programme, a brief background on the significance of TECH Week was delivered by Sagren Moodley, DUT's Manager of Information Systems and Resources. The popular KwaZulu-Natal comedian, Moemish and DUT Library Book Club member, Junior Mhlungu, entertained the audience with comedy and poetry.

Dr Malefetjane Benny Phaladi, Director: Library Services, delivered a thought-provoking speech on the SMART Library principles, and the DUT Library's strategies to develop smart spaces and smart technologies to deliver smart user-focused services in the digital era. He indicated that, following the library's recently created slogan, "Smart Library for the Smart People Using Smart Technology to Provide Smart Services, Spaces and Resources", the library is implementing advanced Fourth Industrial Revolution (4IR) technologies. 5.2. **Adaptive Graduates**

• Work Integrated Learning (WIL) Programme

The students were taken through a comprehensive practical programme that saw them get exposure to industry practice. A special request to host 3 Business Information Management students for a 4-month programme was also supported. The programme ran from 10 July- 31 October.

• Internship Programme

- Mr Smanga Xolo (was allocated to Copyright Services)


All four candidates completed the relevant programmes and achieved the learning outcomes. It was evident that these interns grew in experience as well as in confidence and ability.

• Tutorship Programmes

The Information Literacy and Research Commons tutors have been employed and trained to offer online support to students attending IL training sessions. Their responsibilities include administrative tasks related to collecting training-related data. The Training Librarian together with site SL coordinators planned and delivered an induction programme for tutors.

• Information Literacy Residence Programme

In collaboration with the CELT residence education programme (REP), the library has introduced an Information Literacy tutor programme, which involves student tutors offering basic Information Literacy training and support to fellow residence students. A total of 5 Durban-based and 2 PMB-based tutors have been appointed by CELT. These are students who are residence-based. This pilot programme intended that these tutors would visit the different residences and offer training and support to their peers, between 6-8 pm. The tutors were trained in searching the Discovery tool and Basic referencing. This is an important step in our involvement toward student development and taking IL to the student. Attendance at the 4 Durban sessions that took place was poor and Wi-Fi challenges at the residences also impacted the training and access to resources. The programme did not take off in the Midlands campuses.
