I. INTRODUCTION

The annual report provides a general overview of the DUT Library Services for the reporting period, January to December 2024. The year 2024 has seen significant achievements in ENVISION2030 perspectives and a commitment from smart library staff to provide exceptional smart services and resources to our diverse user community. Against a backdrop of challenges, the library has not only maintained its operational excellence and integrity but has emerged as a beacon of knowledge, fostering an environment conducive to learning, research, and intellectual exploration. Our goal is to improve library and information services and support learning, teaching, research, innovation and community engagement in a more open, developmental, inclusive, impactful, transformative, empowering and sustainable manner.

For the period under review, we have seen quite an impressive record number of DUT-affiliated researchers and their articles published through the library transformational agreements (TAs), also known as open access (Read and Publish) agreements. This initiative has unlocked reading and publishing prospects for researchers and the DUT community at large. DUT authors are now able to publish their work in any of the six (6) major publishers of scientific knowledge without incurring article processing charges (APCs). These agreements are with major publishers of scientific knowledge: Taylor and Francis, ELSEVIER, Springer Nature, Wiley, Emerald and the Association for Computing Machinery (ACM). Transformational agreements provide read and publish opportunities for DUT-affiliated authors/researchers. DUT currently holds six (6) transformational agreements. This Library investment philosophy drive harmonizes well with the ENVISION2030 strategic objectives, particularly the Innovative Curricula and Research (SO4), as well as Financial Sustainability (SO8). A total of 127 articles were approved during the period under review, with an estimated saving of R7 297 553 to the institution. This represents a significant increase in the TAs uptake compared to 2023 where 58 articles with an estimated saving of R3 719 733.78 were approved for publication. I must hasten to emphasise the fact that under normal conditions, the majority of these researchers would not have had the financial support to publish their findings in prestigious outlets and journals with significant impact. What is even more interesting and positive news is the fact that the majority of these articles were published in quartile I and 2 high-impact international journals. This achievement will certainly go a long way in increasing the visibility and impact of our research enterprise, hopefully translating into better rankings in the near future.

As part of the investment in the state-of-the-art infrastructure, the DUT Community was introduced to the Learning Commons, a modern, flexible space for undergraduate students at the BM Patel Library, featuring ergonomic desks, comfortable seating, Wi-Fi access, and high-quality conferencing facilities during a briefing session on 30th July 2024. The library's research and publication culture was taken to another level proving that the DUT Library is deeply entrenched in the academic project of the university and global knowledge production systems. The Smart Library has been fostering a culture of research and publications in library and information science, enhancing its position within the university's research enterprise and global scientific communities. To this end, thirteen (13) research outputs authored by smart librarians have been published in international high-impact journals and conference proceedings, with four (4) in Quartile I and three (3) in Quartile 2 high-impact international journals and others in Quartile 3 in the field of Library and Information Science and other related fields. These publications are indexed by Scopus and Web of Science (WoS) among major indexes.

Furthermore, the Smart Library people continued to make their mark and raise the DUT flag on the international stage, representing the university at various national and international industry forums and knowledge-sharing platforms. As part of an engaged university committed to making an impactful contribution to society, the international stage has become a playing field for some of our library staff. Dr Mbongwa Patrick Mhlongo and Dr Malefetjane Phaladi have had their papers presented at the 25th European Conference on Knowledge Management (ECKM), at the University of Pannonia, Veszprem, Hungary. Our librarians, Dr. Mousin Omarsaib, Nontutuzelo Sogoni, and Sara Mitha, presented their research papers at the International Conference on Information Literacy (ICIL Africa) in Egypt. On November 8th, 2024, a library colloquium was held at the Library Conference Centre to promote a research and publication culture. The event featured 25 presentations, with 8 first-timers. It aimed to encourage staff to reflect on their practices, identify trends, and suggest improvement areas. The colloquium serves as a breeding ground for developing research ideas, Master's and Doctoral studies topics, research papers, and improvements in library practices. As the library management, we are very much intentional about fostering an enabling, supportive and fearless research

culture. A record number of publications produced by the library staff in the last three to four years in high-impact DHET-approved journals bears testimony to these efforts. All such intentional efforts help us to provide services and support to the university community from a position of authority.

In addition, the year also saw a much more impactful contribution by the library staff members, presenting six papers at the Library and Information Association of South Africa (LIASA) Conference held at the Durban International Convention Centre. DUT's Executive Dean of the Faculty of Accounting and Informatics, Professor Oludayo Olugbara, was invited as a guest speaker at a conference, extending DUT's representation beyond library staff.

I.I. Highlights

• Durban International Book Fair (DIBF)

One of the main highlights was DUT's participation in the Durban International Book Fair, which took place from 27 November to 01 December 2024 Eduvos in Umhlanga. DUT showcased its staff and student authors at the fair. This was the third time DUT has participated in the fair, and the Library, Writing Centre and the Department of Graphic Design were co-hosts at the DUT stand. This year's event was on a much bigger scale, attracting many more literary partners, authors, schools and members of the public. The five (5) day literary feast featured book launches by novice and established authors of novels, poetry and academic works; workshops on cover layout & design, creative writing and publishing; and a range of competitions, including a hugely popular chess tournament and the 'Mind Blown League'. The event was open to the public and it attracted more than 3000 visitors, including local schools, community organisations and book publishers. As an acknowledgement of our ongoing support and commitment to promoting literacy and reading in our city, DUT was granted the privilege to share the naming of one of the three allocated rooms that were used for book launches and workshops. The DUT Cheryl Roberts Stage hosted over 50 book launches, with 22 academic, fiction, and poetry works authored by current and former staff and students.

Members of the Library Book Club also attended the Durban International Book Fair. Book club members and Coordinators attended the DIBF as volunteers and also as authors who were allowed to launch their books at the book fair. The book fair allowed book club members to engage with students from other institutions, to learn about different writing techniques and styles, as well as to engage with publishers from all over South Africa.



Transformational Agreement's Marketing and Communication Strategy Document

These agreements typically involve partnerships between libraries and publishers to transition from traditional subscription models to open access (OA) models. The goal is to make research outputs freely available to the academic community and the public. To support this initiative, the library has created a comprehensive strategy document. Currently, social media is being used to encourage the DUT community to take advantage of this service.



• Library Innovation Day

The Library's Innovation Day took place on Friday, 6 September, at the BM Patel Library, 4th floor. The event provided an opportunity for library staff and Library and Information Science (LIS) WIL students to showcase innovative ideas and proposals for enhancing library services, while also exploring new practices within the LIS sector. Library Tech Week is a yearly event led by library IT staff to raise awareness of library services and resources. It involves university technology role players, library vendors, and DUT suppliers. The week took place across all six DUT Libraries and promoted 4IR technology, new library electronic resources, and university software like Question PRO and Writing Centre Bookings. The library partnered with FAI 4IR laboratory experts to introduce NAO, a popular humanoid robot, and Virtual Reality technology. Library vendors, including JoVe, Perlego, Elsevier, and EBSCO, participated in a road show by sending representatives, hosting training sessions, and providing promotional items to students. The library IT staff provided support to students during library tech week, demonstrating popular issues and assisting with technology-related questions. A survey was conducted to assess students' use of the library's e-zones and IT student support centres, with participants entering a draw for a tablet or TV box. The week successfully brought technology to students, shared resources, and showcased 4IR technology and other university software.


• DUT Portfolio of Transformational Agreements (Read and Publish)

As part of its operational intent to provide library and information services and research support in a manner that is much more open, developmental, inclusive and sustainable, during the period under review, the Library continued to market its portfolio of transformational agreements at faculty and other strategic forums. Transformational agreements provide read and publish opportunities for DUT-affiliated authors/researchers. DUT now has a total of six (6) transformational agreements, which allow DUT authors to publish without paying article processing charges (APCs). It is hoped that this essential service will help improve the visibility and accessibility of Southern African research. LIASA 2024 Annual Conference and DUT Participation

DUT Library staff attended and participated in the recent Library and Information Association of South Africa (LIASA) Annual Conference, held at the Durban Inkosi Albert Luthuli International Convention Centre (ICC) from 1 to 4 October 2024. The conference theme, reflecting 30 years of democracy in South Africa, was "Libraries in an Age of Democracy". The presence of DUT was felt strongly at this conference. The DUT Smart Librarians, who participated as volunteers, presenters, and facilitators, contributed significantly to the LIASA national conference. They chaired sessions, presented six papers, and directed the Gala Dinner Proceedings. Prof Olugabara, Executive Dean of Accounting and Informatics, delivered a keynote address on Artificial Intelligence. Dr Phaladi chaired a session in the presence of the KZN MEC for Sports, Arts, and Culture. DUT's representation extended beyond library staff, with Professor Oludayo Olugbara, Executive Dean of the Faculty of Accounting and Informatics, speaking on Al advancements and showcasing AI innovation projects. DUT's representation and profile at the conference extended beyond library staff. Through the office of the Marketing and Communication Librarian, as a member of the new LIASA board and the DUT Library Services Director, the Executive Dean of the Faculty of Accounting and Informatics, Professor Oludayo Olugbara, was invited as one of the guest speakers. Professor Olugbara's presentation focused on Advancements in Artificial Intelligence: Challenges and Opportunities for the Library & Information Sector. As part of showcasing DUT's Al innovation projects, Prof Olu's biography was read by Neo, one of DUT's AI robots.



• International Federation of Library Associations (IFLA) participation

As part of the engaged university making an impactful contribution to society out there, the international stage becomes a playing field for many of our library staff. The marketing and communication librarian, Mr Romeo Matumba, continues to represent DUT and Africa at the International Federation of Library Association and Institutions (IFLA) Management and Marketing Standing Committee. He was invited to be part of the jury responsible for the IFLA PressReader International Library Marketing Award.

Calls for libraries to submit proposals were shared worldwide, including all library associations in the SADC region. The award recognises libraries that are implementing innovative and strategic methods to market library services and resources to their communities. The judging panel has since completed and finalised the process, and winners will be announced soon. As part of the judges, the member was further allocated the responsibility of answering queries and communicating with participants or libraries that have submitted entries. This responsibility was shared with another co-judge from Australia.

In February 2024, the marketing and communication librarian was further invited by the IFLA's Management and Marketing Standing Committee to deliver a presentation on DUT's experience regarding developing library marketing and communication plans. This was for the IFLA's Management & Marketing mid-year sessions that took place in Lima, Peru, from 4 to 8 March 2024. The DUT Library, South Africa and Africa were represented at this mid-year session, as there was only one speaker from the African continent.

• Infrastructure Development

For this period under review, the unit hosted ten Library and Information Science (LIS) WIL students. To improve the reading culture of the students, a book club session and brown bag lunch was held with WIL students on 30th August 2024.

• Establishment of DUT Press

In consultation with DVC: RIE, the library developed a business plan for the DUT Press. After consultation with DVC: RIE, a revised proposal, addressing the financial sustainability concerns raised by stakeholders, has been submitted. The Press proposal and business plan were taken through various management and governance structures for approval. The Library looks forward to the actual launch and establishment of the DUT Press.

• New Library Electronic Resources

Due to budgetary constraints in the past few years, the library has not been able to subscribe to any new databases. In 2024, with an increased operational budget, four (4) new library resources were procured.

Library EAPP 2024

There is a quote that says, "Strategy without tactics is the slowest route to victory. Tactics without strategy is the noise before defeat", which is attributed to Sun Tzu, an ancient Chinese military strategist and philosopher. In line with this famous quote, during the period under review, library management was involved in a series of workshops and consultations with staff to develop the Library Extended Annual Performance Plan. The Library EAPP2024 cascaded down from the Teaching and Learning EAPP 2024 and the Institutional EAPP2024 targets. The development of this operational plan informed and gave the much-needed direction to the performance contracting process.

I.2. Lowlights / Challenges

Staff are reporting infrastructure challenges, including air conditioning issues and network issues that do not foster a conducive working environment.

Network and Wi-Fi Problems

The Alan Pittendrigh Library and Midlands Campus are experiencing network and WIFI issues, affecting access to resources and services. This has led to a postponement of a quarter-long webinar organised by the Research and Postgraduate Directorate due to server and authentication challenges.

The issue with certain cell phones, such as Mobicel, Nokia, Oppo, Stylo, ZTE, Hisense, Premio, iPhones and others, being unable to connect to the Wi-Fi persists. It is hoped that DUT ICTS can find a solution, as many students rely on these affordable, newer brands to access services like Moodle and Outlook. A call regarding this issue was logged in the first quarter of 2024, and the query was forwarded to the relevant department, but no solution has been found yet. Additionally, Wi-Fi connectivity has been poor, with connections either being too slow or frequently dropping.

Poor Air-conditioning in Libraries

The air conditioning issues in our libraries (Alan Pittendrigh Library basement area at Steve Campus, BM Patel Library at ML Sultan and Indumiso Library are unresolved, causing discomfort to students and staff due to high temperatures approaching summer. There has been a noticeable decline in foot traffic within the BM Patel Library, as students prefer to seek cooler alternatives for study or remote learning options. This decrease in library usage could affect the availability of essential services provided by the library.

The excessive heat is also contributing to the malfunctioning of library equipment, including computers and other technological resources. Overheating can cause slowdowns and failures in systems, which disrupt student research activities and staff operations.

Poor State of Printing and Photocopying Solution

The library's printing and photocopying infrastructure requires immediate attention for replacement. The contract for replacing the existing equipment expired in 2020, leading to compromised service quality, with only a few machines operating at optimal capacity. The library's integrated printing and photocopying solution has reached the end of its life cycle, necessitating urgent action to address this critical issue.

The library is offering a minimal service with the remaining working machines. The plans to replace the machines have been delayed for over two years now, largely due to the ongoing process to acquire a university-wide printing solution headed by ICTs, and unfortunately, there seems to be no solution in sight. A pilot project was supposed to be implemented by Minolta, however, this has not been put in place as yet. It must be noted that the library was granted a condonation until 31 December 2023 to continue with its current arrangement with Minolta, which is a cost-per-page service.

The photocopying facility at the Alan Pittendrigh Library (Steve Biko Campus) has collapsed. This means that both staff and students are without photocopying facilities. This is a very poor reflection of our services and needs to be attended to urgently.

• Critical Services at RISK - ICTS Issues

ICTS plays a critical role in ensuring the library's online resources are accessible via wired and wireless networks. Despite multiple meetings with ICTS, the issue of commissioning a virtual server for the Open

Scholar repository upgrade remains unresolved, posing risks to the institution's ability to capture all research articles and dissertations.

The DUT Open Scholar repository continues to run DSpace version 5, which reached the end of life in January 2023. Security updates and support for this version of DSpace are no longer available. In addition, Google Analytics ceased to function after June 2023. Since DUT's F5 firewall proxies all requests to the repository, it is not possible to determine the source of requests except by using Google Analytics. Consequently, there have been no usage statistics since June 2023. Furthermore, disk space on the current server is almost depleted.

Despite many meetings with senior management at ICTS, the new server, which was made available in the third quarter of 2023, was not functional due to ICTS's inability to make the necessary adjustments to DUT's firewall and domain name system. The reason the Library cannot upgrade the Open Scholar repository remains that the new server, ir-dev.dut.ac.za, was not accessible from outside the DUT network. This problem was eventually resolved in the last quarter of 2024.

For the continued operation of DUT's institutional repository, the server must be migrated to the new environment and upgraded to DSpace7 in 2024 and going forward.

ICTS Support Service

The ongoing unavailability of ICTS support during evenings and weekends poses challenges for the library's IT and service operations. Users requiring assistance outside of regular business hours often face delays and frustration, especially during peak times such as exam periods. To improve this issue, it is recommended that the library management work with the ICTS department and propose that they provide ICTS staff availability during critical periods.

• Organisation Review

A degree of uncertainty, stress and apathy is prevalent among the staff due to the anxiety associated with not knowing what the future holds. Hopefully, more detailed information will be provided to address this issue in the new year.

• Slow and Ageing Staff Computing Equipment

Due to the age of the staff computers and laptops, much frustration is setting in, as operations are being affected. Plans are afoot to address critical service points with the limited CAPEX allocation.

Data Literacy

In positioning the Library for data-driven decision-making, it became necessary to build a data culture that involved staff understanding the dynamics of collecting, storing, ethically engaging and sharing data as well as presenting data in an informative manner. All library staff have been enrolled on the data literacy online course (Kubicle's Data Literacy course). This self-paced approach allows staff the flexibility to engage with the learning material at a convenient time. Staff are enrolled in levels appropriate to their developmental needs. However, they may opt to take additional modules if desired. Kubicle's Data Literacy course ended on August 11, 2024, with library staff enrolled in three levels (basic, intermediate, and advanced) based on their job function and data literacy requirements. Three LIS interns completed Level I modules, and the course was open to optional modules.

Transformational Agreement's Marketing and Communication Strategy Document

These agreements typically involve partnerships between libraries and publishers to transition from traditional subscription models to open access (OA) models. The goal is to make research outputs freely available to the academic community and the public.

To support this initiative, the marketing and communication librarian has created a comprehensive strategy document. This document is designed to guide library management staff on effective ways to market and communicate services related to TAs at DUT. The document has been shared with library management for feedback and comments.

Library Survey

The Library Life Pulse survey tool has been identified as the survey tool of choice for 2024. It will replace the LibQUAL tool. The DUT Library team is currently planning implementation strategies for the survey. It was envisaged that the survey should be administered in the third term. Unfortunately, delays in getting the contract/engagement letter signed by the designated signatories have resulted in the survey not being administered in September as planned. It will be administered in March 2025.

Performance Management

Inculcating a culture of accountability is a priority for the DUT Library and a critical pillar for the successful rollout of the performance management system across the system. To this end, for the period under review, 100% of library staff signed the performance contracts, completed their mid-term review reports and were scheduled to complete year-end final reviews. The Library achieved a 100% compliance target. HCS has offered training on the new tool. All staff were encouraged to attend the training.

Feedback on Institutional Audit Report

The library, like other academic and admin departments and units, was invited to provide feedback or points of correction to the draft Institutional Audit report. Mr Thomas and Mr Matumba coordinated the Library's response.

Logos Hope Book Fair

In May, the Library organised a trip to the Logos Hope Book Fair at Durban Harbour for its staff and the library book club members. This visit aimed to explore a wide range of literature and understand a global initiative that promotes knowledge and cultural exchange. Logos Hope, managed by GBA Ships, is the world's largest floating book fair. Since its launch in 2009, it has travelled globally, offering over 5,000 titles, including educational, professional, personal development, and fiction books at affordable prices. As mentioned on its website, the Logos Hope aims to spread knowledge, foster cross-cultural understanding, and provide humanitarian aid across the globe. During the visit, DUT staff and book club members explored an extensive collection of books and also mingled with people from different communities. The visits to the Logos Book fair were also covered in the library's social media pages.

The visit to the Logos Hope Book Fair underscored the DUT Library's dedication to fostering a love for reading and continuous education. By participating in such events, the library supports intellectual growth and cultural exchange, enriching the academic environment for all its members.



GENED Thematic Review

The Library was represented during the GENED thematic review workshop. Mr. Thomas attended support department interviews on August 22, 2024, and has shared a draft report for review, with him coordinating the process for the Library.


2.1.3. Creativity

Research support X feed


The Library's research support X account @DUTlibresearch, alongside the library's primary X account @DUT_library, and the Facebook page @Dutlibrary, persist as active communication and marketing tools. These platforms effectively engage undergraduates, postgraduates, researchers, and other internal and external stakeholders. The content disseminated through these channels encompasses resource updates, training opportunities, research events, and various marketing endeavours.

A representative selection of content posted in the postgraduate research support X feed for 2024 is presented below. The feed has 413 followers, from 400 followers in 2023, and it is managed by the postgraduate librarians.



Read for Research Alerts

The purpose of the alert is to promote and create awareness of the resources that the library has to offer to support postgraduate (PG) students and staff at DUT. The library PG support team circulated the Read for Research newsletter which covered research books, upcoming workshops and updates on research-related activities. Read for Research alerts were compiled and distributed by the Postgraduate librarians. These alerts showcase useful research books and other research resources available to DUT researchers and postgraduate students. Six issues were produced for 2024.





Current Awareness

Library Technology Week (29 July to 02 August 2024)

Library Technology Week has become an annual event that promotes both library and university technologies. This event took place from 29 July to 02 August 2024 and included a programme that showcased Library technologies, Al advances, Scopus Al, QuestionPro as well as new library resources (Perlego & Jove).

Library Video Project (Postgraduate Services)

The project to complete a video shoot for the Research Commons and postgraduate services was reenacted in April. The purpose of the video is to showcase the resources and services offered by postgraduate librarians. The video is meant to highlight the support provided to postgraduate students and promote the library's offerings across its campuses. The video was filmed at the Midlands and Durban libraries. Filming at the Midlands Campus Libraries took place on 19 April 2024, and at the Durban Campus Libraries on 22 April 2024. Mr Keith from the Audiovisual Unit played a key role in the video production. He helped with the technical aspects, ensuring high-quality footage was captured. His expertise was essential in setting up the equipment, managing lighting, and overseeing the recording process to ensure the final product met professional standards. This project was coordinated by the marketing and communication librarian, Mr Romeo Matumba.

The postgraduate service video project highlights the DUT Library's commitment to enhancing postgraduate students' academic experience by providing comprehensive resources and support. By showcasing these services, the library aims to engage and assist postgraduate students in their research and academic endeavours. The project was completed in August, and the video is now available on the Library's YouTube channel, website, and other social media platforms.

2.1.3.2. Innovative Projects

• Library Innovation Day

The Durban University of Technology (DUT) Library hosted its first annual hybrid Library Innovation Day at the BM Patel Library on 6 September 2024, where eleven (11) library staff and four of the Work Integrated Learning (WIL) students from the Library and Information Science (LIS) programme presented new approaches, ideas and suggestions to enhancing library services. The event offered a platform for discussing innovative ideas that could potentially reshape how the library operates, with a focus on improving user experience, staff capacity, and sustainability. The proposals presented during the event will not only improve current services but also ensure that the library continues to evolve into the SMART library, that is open, inclusive, developmental and sustainable.

• Library Tech Week

Library Tech Week is a yearly event that is led by library IT staff to create awareness of the services and resources provided by the Library. In keeping with the library's principles of openness and inclusiveness, the planning team brought on board other university technology role players, library vendors and DUT suppliers to be part of the week's activities. Tech Week activities took place across all six DUT site libraries.

One of the major outcomes of the week was to promote 4IR technology, new library electronic resources and other university software such as QuestionPro and Writing Centre Bookings. Apart from showcasing the library's 4IR technology, the library partnered with experts from the Faculty of Accounting and Informatics (FAI) 4IR laboratory. The FAI 4IR team introduced NAO, a small humanoid robot that proved to be very popular. NAO had students mesmerised with his dance moves, quirky quotes and interesting library facts, as he interacted with students. Students in attendance also had an opportunity to use the Virtual Reality technology on display.

As part of the roadshow, library information resources vendors also sent representatives to do product demonstrations for students and to host training sessions for librarians. These included JoVe, Perlego, Elsevier and EBSCO. These vendors also provided students with promotional items.

Finally, the library IT staff ended each of the sessions by explaining the range of support that is offered by the Library IT student support centre. Short demonstrations of popular issues by students were completed and staff were on hand to assist with technology-related issues and questions. The team also ran a survey for the duration of the week to assess students' use of the library's e-zones (computer laboratories) and IT student support centres. Students who completed the survey were entered into a draw to win a tablet and TV boxes.

Overall, the library tech week achieved its outcomes of taking technology to the students, sharing new resources, and showcasing 4IR technology and other university software.

• Makerspace Integration: Pilot Programmes for 2025 Identified

The library continues to forge relationships with academic departments at the Indumiso Campus to integrate the Makerspace into the curriculum. The Library Makerspace Integration Team met with staff from the departments of Education, Nursing and Civil Engineering on 27 August 2024. The main aim of the workshop was to finalise integrated projects for implementation in 2025. For each of the departments, one pilot programme has been identified, and both the library team and the departmental staff will work towards ensuring that all systems and processes are in place by the end of 2024. In December 2024, the LIT team and academics from the Nursing, Civil, and Education departments attended a training session on 3D printers and scanners.

On March 15th, the Library IT team, with the help of a Luban Workshop student, successfully repaired 3D printers.

Makerspace usage statistics

Furthermore, there is a dire need for additional

tools and equipment. The library submitted a request for additional equipment and tools for the Makerspace to Dr. Joe Molete, but due to his resignation, the team resorted to sourcing additional funds.

• Information Literacy Practice Sharing

A hybrid session was arranged for the Information Services staff, wherein Ms Sogoni and Dr Omarsaib shared highlights from the pilot intervention, which resulted in the submission of a conference paper. The title of the paper is "Fostering and Promoting a Culture of Ubuntu': a case of teaching Information Literacy in isiZulu' to first-year Horticulture students at the Durban University of Technology, South Africa". This took place on 27 August 2024.

Library Discovery Tool

Discussions around the User Interface Usability testing exercise have begun and the intervention is planned for next year in consultation with EBSCO. Colleagues from EBSCO were invited to address the Information Services staff on the research that informed the design of the new User Interface Usability on the 24th of July 2024. A further session was arranged on the 26th of July for the Information services librarians to understand how the relevancy ranking in EBSCO Discovery Service works. Both these interventions were not well attended.

After much discussion, it was decided to move over to the new user interface for the Discovery tool, as of 2025. The interface design is based on feedback from the community about providing a Google-like interface that still offers the benefit of a library discovery system.




Image: New User Interface of the Library Discovery Tool.

Annual Library Colloquium

A colloquium was held on November 8th, 2024, for library staff to foster a culture of research and publication. Held at the Library Conference Centre, the event featured 25 presentations, including 8 by first-time presenters. The aim was to encourage library staff to reflect on their practice, identify emerging trends, and suggest areas for improvement within the DUT Library and the LIS sector in general. This annual colloquium serves as the breeding ground for the development and refinement of research ideas, topics for potential masters and doctoral

studies, research papers and improvements in library practices and systems. As library management, we are very much intentional about fostering a supportive and fearless research culture. A record number of publications produced by the library staff in the last three to four years in high-impact DHET-approved journals bears testimony to these efforts.

2.2 SYSTEMS AND PROCESSES

Transforming and positioning the library as a "Smart Library", a key role player in the scientific knowledge production and distribution systems, and the preferred publisher of such knowledge, demands a comprehensive re-evaluation of our systems and processes. To this end, several strategic initiatives have been developed to re-imagine the library's business processes and systems environment by investing in the development of state-of-the-art (smart) facilities, learning and research spaces.

2.2.1. Innovative Curricula and Research

Library Management System Review

During this year, the Library Management System committee compiled a report on different LMS systems that were reviewed during the second quarter. Staff members from different service points were part of the committee. Four LMS systems (MEDAD, Alma, WorldShare and FOLIO) were reviewed. After extensive discussions with vendors, a decision was made to renew FOLIO, taking into account the local service support, the system's development and anticipated upgrades.

• Library Management System Review

In ensuring that our resources are promoted and that content remains updated, a review of all Libguides was undertaken. Librarians were alerted to areas that needed attention and were tasked with addressing these promptly.

Problem-based learning (PBL) within ECP

The manager in charge of the Library Academic Services met with librarians whose departments were offering ECP. He briefed them on the emphasis of the Teaching and Learning EAPP on the Philosophy of Education and unpacked how PBL could be implemented within a controlled group like that of the ECP cohort. The respective librarians will be exploring embedding this teaching approach within their information literacy (IL) training.

• Turnitin checking

The Library was identified to run Turnitin similarity reports as part of the examination process and safeguard the integrity of the process, for Masters and Doctoral exam submissions.

In principle, this administrative task formed part of the library's postgraduate support service as of I March 2024. A workflow unpacking considerations and concerns was shared with the Library Director for further engagement with the research ambit. Attempts to arrange a briefing session with research coordinators and officers have proved to be difficult, considering other university commitments. The need for formal training on the tool is necessary for all involved in this process. This will be arranged in 2025.

List of prescribed books

In response to a request from the Registrar's office, the library management engaged librarians to acquire the list of prescribed books per programme for 2024. Some academics indicated that there were no prescribed works. The lists received were shared with relevant stakeholders.

2.2.1.1. Undergraduate Services (Information Literacy Training, Queries, Faculty Analysis)

• Cornerstone and IL

Librarians conducted face-to-face information literacy sessions for Cornerstone classes at the beginning of the first and second semesters, introducing students to library services, the website, and the discovery tool. Following the sessions, Cornerstone appointed tutors introduced referencing, trained by Mr. Thomas.

However, protests, technical issues, and network connectivity impacted attendance at these sessions. The intervention was a success, despite some glitches.

Residence Education Programme (REP)

The library was advised in August by colleagues from CELT that a total of 3 Information Literacy (IL) tutors could be appointed for the programme. There was no accommodation indicated for the Midlands. Three LIS students were appointed, and paperwork was submitted. Numerous delays by the Student Housing Department in getting the project started resulted in a missed opportunity, with the project not materialising.

Referencing Guide Review

A library task team has begun work on including guidance on Generative AI in the referencing guide. The team was looking at updating the Referencing Guide to include AI as well as amending any errors in the current guide. The team met to discuss ways in which AI should be included in the guide after having looked at how other universities have addressed the matter. The inclusion of examples in the Referencing Guide is directed by the Plagiarism policy and the Guidelines for AI Usage at DUT. The project is set to be completed by early 2025.

• After-hours Information Literacy sessions.

The Library was approached by an LIS student, who happened to be a member of the Nazareth Tertiary Student Association(NATESA) at DUT. The request was to arrange an Information literacy session for the members with a particular focus on finding previous exam papers. The after-hours librarians were engaged and offered 2 sessions, one focusing on the use of the Discovery tool and navigating the website, including finding the exam paper repository. The second session covered Referencing (plagiarism and how to reference). The sessions were well received.

• Information Literacy

Librarians continue to offer customised Information literacy training to the faculty. The content covered, teaching approaches adopted, time allocated, as well as the inclusion of assessments, is relative to the programmes concerned and the degree of integration allowed. Both face-to-face and online training is offered. In addition, support is provided via online platforms including the online subject guides, Moodle, MS Teams and the LiveChat facility. Information literacy training equips our students with essential skills to navigate vast amounts of information and critically evaluate sources through the irrelevant and questionable content. With the continuous rise of fake news, predatory publications and generative AI, ensuring that all students are information literate has become increasingly necessary.

The table below provides the average percentage of attendance of students by Faculty. It reflects **the average attendance for the sessions** held during this reporting period.

♣ Data in the table presented above reflects the average percentage of attendance for those programmes whose students participated in IL training. However, it does not represent the overall reach within the faculties, as not all students attend these IL sessions. For those who do, lecturers have indicated improved assignment quality, demonstrating that students are engaging more effectively with literature and applying the skills learnt during training.

- Over the past few years, data has shown that the same programmes and their lecturers consistently take advantage of the opportunity to send students to IL sessions, while others do not include IL training as part of their curriculum. The training sessions are scaffolded ranging from basic to advanced levels, ensuring a comprehensive learning pathway.
- Although some of the 2024 statistics show slight increases compared to 2023, there is still significant room for improvement and opportunities to engage the librarians in developing our students to become information literate.
- Librarians have embraced various teaching approaches and are flexible at customising and integrating lesson content according to the specific needs of individual programmes.
- 4 Several challenges hindered the progress of training sessions. Some of the challenges include protest actions, poor attendance, connectivity issues, and insufficient devices in library labs. To address these issues, librarians provide training and content online via MS Teams, Libguides and Moodle classes.

Reference Queries

Reference queries for teaching and learning support by faculty

The librarians are fielding queries via various online platforms, including email, WhatsApp, MS Teams and via the Ask a Librarian service, which entails a real-time live chat facility.

The LiveChat facility (LibChat) has been customised to enhance the routing process and is monitored by Information Service librarians, Circulation coordinators and IT support staff. The stats generated from queries for the circulation coordinators and IT support staff will be reported on in the respective managers' reports. An overall decline in the number of queries has been noted. This could be due to the students being able to navigate the platforms easily and not requiring assistance beyond the information literacy training, or it could be that the service requires more marketing. In both instances, efforts are directed at supporting the student through multiple platforms, including making tutorials and lecturer recordings available. Statistics tend to indicate a spike at the beginning of the year and then again when assignments are due but then tapers down afterwards.

There are still many queries relating to registration and access to emails that are channelled through the library's online chat facility even though there are other channels for this type of query. An overall decline in the number of queries has been noted. The reasons for this decline are unknown.

It is also noted that Librarians are not consistently capturing data collected via this service, and this shall be addressed.

Queries vary in nature and complexity, and the team has been trained on dealing with FAQs as well as routing the queries appropriately.

2.2.1.2. **Postgraduate Services**

Recognition of service

The postgraduate librarians are certainly being recognised for the services and assistance offered to the DUT research community. Our postgraduate librarians have received compliments and notes of appreciation from both academics and PG students. Sara Mitha and Patricia Badenhorst were both acknowledged at the Library's staff recognition awards event during the first semester.

OASIS Book Project

The postgraduate librarians were consulted and involved with assisting some academic staff members publishing with AOSIS. This involved the formatting and referencing of chapters for submission of the manuscript. It became evident that AOSIS Publishing did not have an EndNote Style file, so the referencing had to be done manually. There is an opportunity to develop an EndNote Style for AOSIS and this was discussed with the staff at AOSIS.

Inclusion of EndNote Guide

The inclusion of the EndNote page on the Research Guide for postgraduate students was produced to help students from installing the software to managing their references. The page provides useful videos and short documents for quick access.

Postgraduate Orientation 17th September 2024

On September 17, 2024, the DUT Postgraduate Orientation session was held at the B.M. Patel Library, organised by the Research and Postgraduate Directorate. Postgraduate librarian, Sara Mitha, presented on Library Postgraduate Services.

• Library Postgraduate Video

The project to complete a video shoot for the Research Commons and postgraduate services was completed in August. The video is now available on the library's Facebook, X and YouTube channels. The purpose of the video is to showcase the resources and services offered by postgraduate librarians and it highlights the support provided to postgraduate students and researchers. This project was coordinated by the marketing and communication librarian, Romeo Matumba. Keith Keneth from the Audio-visual Unit also played a key role in the video production. He helped with the technical aspects, ensuring high-quality footage was captured. His expertise was essential in setting up the equipment, managing lighting, and overseeing the recording process to ensure the final product met professional standards. It is anticipated that the completion and sharing of this video will significantly increase the visibility and use of the library's offerings, ultimately supporting the intellectual growth and success of DUT's postgraduate community. • Research Innovation and Engagement (RIE) Report on PG Experience 2024

The office of the RIE requested contributions from the PG librarians on the Library PG services for 2023/2024 for inclusion in the RIE Report on PG experience 2024.

• DUT GOOT Initiative

The PG librarians were included in the training programme for the GOOT Future Professors programme. This was held on the 27th November 2024. Participants found the library session very beneficial, and it was also an opportune time to create an awareness of the Transformational Agreements.

Turnitin Access

Access to Turnitin was terminated from the 4th November to the 18th November due to a delay in payment of subscriptions. Master's and doctoral students, as well as researchers, use Turnitin as a last port of call before submission, but it was not available. Discussions with the Research and Postgraduate Support Directorate is ongoing to arrange training on Turnitin for designated persons.

Author Profiles

Postgraduate Librarians have had requests from the Directorate for Research and Postgraduate Support with regards to metrics for DUT academic staff. This involves searching through the various databases for the respective author profiles. Whilst populating the spreadsheet with the relevant information, a few issues emerged. These issues were the multiple author profiles and the correction of home institutions. These issues need to be corrected for a true reflection of the author's profile. The information is requested for NRF rating applications, the Future Professors Programme and other awards.

• Training, Queries, Faculty Analysis

In this reporting period, several training events were held. These consist of Academic Induction, Postgraduate Orientation (both general and faculty-based), Doctoral Mentoring, as well as Research Capacity Development Workshops. The popular workshop called "EndNote for your academic writing" (new service offering) was offered twice in the third quarter due to the demand and needs of the students. The

highest number of attendees was for the Word for thesis. Among the list of workshops facilitated are the following:

- Searching the library collections, databases and Google Scholar
- Managing your research information with EndNote
- Systematic Reviews: Developing search strategies and using EndNote
- Word for thesis
- Resources for your research: Library databases, literature and software
- EndNote for academic writing

Most of the training offered is arranged within the Research Capacity Development Workshop series and targets registered Postgraduate students within DUT. Attendance at these workshops is encouraging, even though the number of RSVPs is usually higher than the attendance numbers. The recordings are then shared with all those that RSVP'd. A range of queries were attended to by the postgraduate librarians. Referencing queries show an increase in 2024 followed by article requests and Endnote. There is also a notable increase in systematic review queries since there is an interest among researchers to publish systematic review papers.

The nature of queries received covered a broad range of topics, including:

- 145 related to accredited publications,
- 309 on EndNote troubleshooting and installations,
- II3 on H-Index,
- 823 on referencing,
- 474 were requests relating to sourcing articles and chapters,
- 37 on SPSS licensing and installations,
- I41 on the formatting of a thesis,
- 268 queries relating to Turnitin,
- 🖶 39 Ask a librarian query and
- 86 on Systematic reviews.







- → During this period, postgraduate librarians have monitored and recorded the usage of our research commons to better understand the needs of our users and to enhance our services accordingly. The data collected includes the number of visits and the use of the facilities by Master's, Doctoral, and other categories of users.
- The stats indicate an overall increase in usage at the AP Library compared to the previous year. This may be attributed to an increase in the number of postgraduates as well as awareness of the library's postgraduate service. B.M. Patel Research Commons has not shown a decline in usage. This decline may be linked to the persistent challenges reported at the B.M. Patel facility, including issues with air conditioning and external noise levels.
- ♣ The stats reveal slow growth in usage at the Indumiso Research Commons, indicating the need for enhanced marketing efforts to increase awareness and attract more users.

2.2.1.3. Academic and Admin Support

- ♣ Mr Thomas, Sara Mitha and Nabisa Mbali addressed new academics in Durban during the second semester's academic induction session on 29 August. The session took place on MS Teams and had a total of 40 attendees.
- Nokuthula Mdlalose and Themba Nkuna represented the library at the Academic induction session for the Midlands staff on the 2nd of August 2024.
- ♣ Dr Phaladi addressed new staff at the HCS induction event on July 26, at Coastlands Hotel.

2.2.2.1. Library Technologies

Scholarship, DUT Repositories, Virtual library tools, Social media presence and management, Open Scholar

LibGuides

The subject/research guides are customised by Librarians to provide a portal to resources that support the various subjects offered at DUT. Librarians curate links to content which includes resources that the library subscribes to as well as open-access content. The platform is robust enough to function as more than a repository and has been engaged as a platform to market products and events as well as to administer formative activities. In consultation with lecturers, the librarians collate and present content that supports specific assignments. While some of the guides are consulted frequently, others are not. This platform provides a gateway to finding relevant resources within the discipline but requires greater marketing and adoption.



♣ The Engineering and Built Environment guides have shown the highest number of views for the Faculty guides. The contributing factor is the approach used for teaching Information Literacy within the Technical Literacy module, which directs students to the guide for content and engagement.

- Views for other guides show a spike around the time IL training is offered and when assignments are due. Generally, this resource is not optimally used and requires a marketing strategy.
- The Research Support guide and the Referencing guide are the most frequently visited guides given the content hosted and their appeal to the broader DUT community.
- → Students often use the LibChat facility. This is used not only for library-related queries, but students see it as a place where they can get assistance. Often, librarians field queries that do not relate to the library, e.g., about departments within the institution, getting a student card and many more such queries.

QuickFinder Video

A short video was created in collaboration with LIS WIL students to promote awareness and usage of the library's discovery tool, QuickFinder. The video was developed in response to concerns raised by book club members about the lack of visible promotion of QuickFinder among students. The video features a stressed student struggling to find relevant information for her assignments. Another student comes to the rescue and shows the stressed students how to find information using QuickFinder. The friend also highlights the benefits of using the library's website and QuickFinder. In the end, the relieved student thanks her friend, and they both encourage users to seek further information from faculty librarians and the library's website. The marketing and communication librarian designed the script and also encouraged participating students to speak in their Indigenous languages during the recording of the video as a way of promoting the use and integration of Indigenous languages while providing essential library services.



The video has so far received about **423** post reach, above **612 plays** and **577** engagements on Facebook, and these numbers are anticipated to grow as more users continue to visit the Library's Facebook and other social media pages

• ILL Service Video

A video to promote the Inter-Library Loans (ILL) service was also created. This video was created as part of the marketing strategy to increase awareness of the ILL service to the DUT community. The video shows a conversation between two students who are asking each other about an ILL service. A script was developed and shared with students who were given about 20 minutes each to prepare before the shooting of the video. This video was also developed with the help of WIL students to allow them to learn how library videos are created and developed.



The video has so far received about **553 post** reach, over **800 plays** and about **734** engagements on the Facebook page. These numbers are anticipated to grow as more users continue to visit the library's Facebook page and other social media pages

Facebook followers


In 2024, the Facebook page increased its number of followers by 280 from 5,376 in 2023 to 5,656.

Facebook Views (Countries)




- The library's Facebook account is receiving more audiences outside South Africa. As indicated above, some of the audience engaging and following the library's Facebook page come from countries such as Nigeria, the USA, Malawi, Zimbabwe, Swaziland, Canada, the UK and Botswana.
- ♣ During the first quarter, there were approximately 5,402 users, rising to 5,462 in the second quarter. This number grew to 5,482 in the third quarter and further increased to 5,538 in the fourth quarter
- From the 9 other countries listed on the stats, Nigeria and the United States have shown outstanding engagement increases compared to all other countries. Notably, Nigeria recorded 31 engagements in the first quarter, which increased to 40 by the fourth quarter.

Facebook content posted from quarter I to quarter 4




- More content was posted during quarter 3 with about 46 contents, followed by quarter 4 with 34 contents, quarter 1 with 32 and quarter 2 with 30 contents posted.

- There was an increase in content posted in 2024 compared to 2023 across all quarters. Notably, 30 posts were made in the second quarter of 2024, up from 13 in the same period of 2023. In the third quarter of 2024, 46 posts were published compared to 20 in 2023.
- The total number of posts in 2023 was 85, significantly lower than the **142 posts** in 2024. This marks the highest volume of content shared since the library's Facebook page was launched.

• X Account (formerly known as Twitter)




- ♣ In 2024, the X account experienced a significant increase in content posted compared to the 2023 period. The highest number of posts was recorded in the first quarter of 2024, with 32 posts, a substantial rise from the 5 posts in the first quarter of 2023.
- ♣ The lowest number of posts in 2023 occurred in the second quarter, with only 4 items published, compared to 17 posts in the same quarter of 2024.



Usage Statistics

• QuickFinder (EBSCO Discovery Tool)

The provided data showcase the usage of the QuickFinder Discovery Service, including sessions, search clicks, total requests, full-text requests, link-out requests, and abstract requests. The number of searches performed on QuickFinder from Jan – Dec 2024 was 223435. During the same period last year, 192153 searches were done. This is an increase of 16% in 2024 compared to 2023. There are significant increases in the use of the QuickFinder, especially during the examination preparation months, April, May, August and September. It is important to note that academic and research activity does peak in some months and that these seasonal variations provide useful input into the planning and delivery of user-centred services.

• Full-text Databases (Journals and E-Books)

- Between January and December 2024, 2016479 full-text items (journals and e-books) were viewed, compared with 1575772 for the same period last year an increase of 27,96%. The reason could be that WGSN increased usage by 1317.29% (High usage from January June 2024).
- ₩ WGSN adjusted to the correct usage decreased usage by 96%, during the third and fourth quarters of 2024.

Abstracting/Indexing Databases

- A total of **96049** searches were done in the abstract databases from Jan to Dec 2024, compared to 144065 searches done for the same period last year, a decrease of 33.33%.
- Scopus usage increased to 22494 by 74.20% searches during Jan Dec 2024 compared to 12913 of the same period in 2023
- Waters & Oceans Worldwide decreased to 59637 by 9.40% searches during Jan − Dec 2024 compared to 65828 of the same period in 2023
- Web of Science decreased to 9798 by 84.06% searches during Jan Dec 2024 compared to 61469 searches performed during the same quarter in 2023
- SciVal usage increased to 4120 by 6.87% searches during Jan Dec 2024 compared to 3855 of the same period in 2023

• eBook Usage

Full-text (subscriptions and purchased titles) ebooks viewed decreased by 17.42% in 2024. For the period Jan – Dec 2024, a total number of 72570 e-books were viewed, compared to 87875 during the same period in 2023.






eBook Usage / Downloads



The top 5 most purchased and downloaded eBooks during this quarter were from ProQuest eBook Central and Ebscohost.




The trend graph shows the usage of electronic resources over a five-year period, including searches, full-text views, e-books, and articles. In 2024, there was an upward trend in journal articles, but there is concern about the usage of e-books, suggesting a need for a more intentional marketing strategy to promote these resources in the new year.



Journal Downloads

The 5 most downloaded journals were collected from 8 full-text databases i.e. Science Direct, Springer, EBSCOhost, Emerald, IEEE, ProQuest, Taylor & Francis and Wiley, for Jan – Dec 2024 to determine the 5 most used journals downloaded. The most popular database for the reporting period was Science Direct, with 376082 full-text downloads, and 5 of the most downloaded journals for this period were from Science Direct.

The most used journal for Jan – Dec 2024 was PLoS One [ScienceDirect] with 12916 full-text downloads, followed by the International Journal of Environmental Research and Public Health [ScienceDirect] with 9321 downloads, Scientific Reports [ScienceDirect with 9207 downloads, Energies [ScienceDirect]with 8998 downloads and finally Sensors [ScienceDirect]with 7593 downloads.




2.2.2.3. Library Website and Support Tools

The library website https://library.dut.ac.za/ is the main source of all library information and resources. The browser statistics for the DUT library website from 2023 to 2024 show significant changes in user preferences. The most popular browsers for accessing library websites include Chrome, Edge, Firefox, Safari, and Samsung Internet. Chrome usage increased from 15,596 in 2023 to 64,562 in 2024, while Edge nearly quadrupled and Firefox and Safari doubled. Less popular browsers like Aloha and Phoenix declined.

A Desktop remains the primary platform for users when engaging with the website. It is promising to see an increase in engagement with the library website via a mobile device. This aligns with our strategy to ensure that the new library website is design agnostic, as well as efforts to include many of the library services in the University APP.



Access by source

The table below provides insights into the engagement on the library website. It highlights the way users access the library website from various sources/ routes. The data categories users based on the sources of their visit, either directly, or via referral. The majority of the users accessed the website directly in 2024 with an increase of 185% in sessions and 154% in engaged sessions, suggesting a strong connection to the library website. Increases in both referral and organic social could be attributed to library efforts in increasing the library presence on social media, library resources and the learning management platform.

The statistics demonstrate the behaviour of library users when accessing the library website. The majority of users access the library directly and not via Google or another referral database.

Traffic to the website increased significantly in 2024. The main DUT Library page views shifted from 172,796 to 400,017, with pages like E-Books, Access to Electronic Resources, and Research Tools more than doubling their views. New pages like Plagiarism Tutorials and Undergraduate Support gained notable engagement in 2024. Overall, the data highlights growing interest and improved access to the library's online resources.

• Usage of Library Resources: User Authentication







Examination Repository

The repository experienced a significant increase in submissions, particularly from Faculties of Applied Sciences and Management Sciences. Visits doubled, particularly for Health Sciences and Management Sciences faculties. Paper downloads also surged, indicating faculties' commitment to providing accessible resources and increased student engagement in exam preparation.



2.2.2.4. Facilities Usage

There has been a serious increase in the usage of library facilities.

The table below shows the usage statistics of our materials in the library in the current reporting year in comparison to the same period last year, 2023. The 2024 annual statistics for the BM Patel, Brickfield, and City Libraries reveal significant shifts in service utilisation compared to 2023. The data highlights notable trends in user engagement and service demand, with some areas experiencing sharp declines and others showing encouraging growth

The table above provides an analysis of the statistics for 2024 across all DUT library sites. The data includes circulation numbers, headcount, photocopying usage, and in-house activities, compared with the same period in 2023. The percentage variance is calculated to understand the changes and the attributing factors for these variations.

DUT Libraries across all sites experienced mixed results in their key operational statistics when compared to the same period in 2023:

- **I.** Circulation: Circulation services experienced a significant 87.62% decline in 2024, largely due to a shift in borrowing habits, possibly due to increased digital resource reliance or changing access preferences.
- 2. Headcount: The combined libraries saw a 35.21% increase(202,014 in 2023 to 273,145) in user visits and headcount, indicating a resurgence in library usage, possibly due to improved facilities, expanded programming, or increased on-campus activities.
- **3. Photocopying**: The use of photocopying services declined by **43.13**%, with total usage falling from **74,255** in 2023 to **42,228** in 2024. This reduction aligns with broader trends favouring digital over physical copies, further exacerbated by challenges such as outdated printing infrastructure.
- **4. In-house Usage**: In-house usage of materials rose by **38.92**%, from **3,816** in 2023 to **5,301** in 2024. This increase demonstrates a growing demand for resources available only within the library, reflecting its importance as a study and research hub.

The data underscores a dual narrative for these libraries. While traditional services like circulation and photocopying have seen sharp declines, the increase in headcount and in-house usage reflects the libraries' growing role as vital physical spaces for study, collaboration, and access to unique resources. These insights can guide future initiatives, particularly in addressing technological upgrades and enhancing user experiences.


Periodicals: From 192 current subscriptions, I is a duplicated title. Duplicate titles are titles that we subscribe to for two or more site libraries. The number of subscriptions decreased in 2024 as compared to 2023. The Library's paid subscriptions decreased by 24.11% in 2024 from the previous year. This is due to print titles ceasing and becoming open access and the cancellations in September 2023, when 14 periodical titles were identified for cancellation for 2024 due to financial constraints and no longer relevant.



R25 099 636 was allocated for subscriptions to databases and periodicals for 2024, an increase of 10% from the R22 817 000 received in 2023. To expedite the process and prevent interest charges and/or suspension of access, the requisitions were sent to Procurement in November and December 2023. These requisitions were tracked with Procurement via the Library Procurement Plan, on a monthly basis. At the beginning of 2024, the exchange rate was unstable, and not favourable. Most of the large journal and database invoices were paid when the exchange rate when the exchange rates were high. The 2024 budget would be adequate to sustain the current subscription with a favourable balance at the end of 2024.

In 2024, 19 print newspaper subscriptions worth R33,000 were reinstated for six sites.

Copyright Expenses

R2 million was allocated to the copyright central fund, which was exhausted around mid-July. For this reason, we were facing a significant funding shortfall for copyright compliance and applications thereto in the 2024 reporting year. To deal with the shortfall, invoices totalling R955 176,66 for the remaining part of the year had to be paid from other operational accounts. In summary, the top-up was urgently required, driven primarily by several key factors, among others:

- i) Increased new applications for third-party information resources.
- ii) Due to re-curricularisation, further funds are required to supplement new subject content specifically for advanced qualifications.
- **iii)** There have been several new lecturers who are revising course materials which require the inclusion of third-party information resources as part of the curriculum delivery to students.
- iv) Newly appointed academic staff cannot account for previously constructed study guides of former staff. Hence, new 3rd party information resources are being sourced, which requires a licence for use and dissemination.
- v) Copyright infringements have been flagged as a serious risk to the university's reputation. The heightened awareness campaigns and inspection by the library copyright office have resulted in many of our academics in recent times applying for copyright licenses for the use of third-party information resources in their course material.

The DVC: Teaching and Learning has been approached for additional funds. Unfortunately, there were no additional funds to allocate to the central copyright fund.

2.2.3. Research Support (Postgraduate and Faculty Research Services)


2.2.3.1. DUT Open Scholar

The DUT Open Scholar repository is still running an old version of DSpace (version 5), which reached the end of its life last year in January 2023. In addition to security updates and support for this version of DSpace no longer being available, third-party utilities, such as Google Analytics ceased to function after June 2023. Since DUT's F5 firewall proxies all requests to the repository, it is not possible to determine the source of requests except by using Google Analytics. Consequently, there have been no usage statistics since June 2023. Furthermore, disk space on the current server is almost depleted. The server is being kept going by periodically deleting log files.

A new server running DSpace 7 is now available. However, its deployment has been delayed due to problems with the integration with Elements, DUT's research information system. Symplectic, who provide Elements, are working on resolving a problem that surfaced during a recent upgrade. As soon as the integration with Elements is functional, the new server will be deployed.




The graph below compares uploads between 2024, 2023 and 2022.







The repository has been updated with an 'SDG' browse index, making it possible to locate all items associated with any particular United Nations' Sustainable Development Goal (SDG). The SDG classification of existing items was accomplished using the natural language processing functionality of the PostgreSQL database, along with a set of keywords adapted from those provided by Elsevier's SDG Research-Mapping Initiative and the University of Auckland's Keyword-Mapping Project. Furthermore, an 'SDG' metadata field has been added so that any new items are assigned SDG metadata when they are made available on the repository.

The 'SDG' browse index makes it possible to locate all items associated with any particular United Nations' Sustainable Development Goal (SDG).




SDG Browse Index

The RDM policy has been placed on hold, as there are discussions around developing a single open science policy which will incorporate the RDM activities. The Library and the Research Office have been jointly tasked to develop the Open Science Policy. A workshop to develop the policy is prioritised to take place in quarter I of the new year.

The Library has been increasingly adopting the publishing role. The library has directed much of its investment philosophy towards making open access a reality. We are moving away from a traditional print collection-based model to a more broadly service-oriented model. 




Google Analytics: AJIMS pageviews by country (Jan - Dec. 2024)



2.2.4.1. Systems & Support

This service is offered virtually and on-site. The statistics below highlight the dire need to strengthen student IT support services across the campus. There is considerable demand for account activation and DUT4life queries throughout the year. Password reset, WI-FI issues and student portal issues are other high-demand queries. This information is critical in the allocation of appropriate resources to ensure that students are promptly assisted at all times. The Library IT Team offered both online and on-site support. Due to a large number of photocopying machines not working, there has been a general decrease in the use of photocopiers across the library sites. The library is still waiting for ICTS and Minolta to finalise the proof of concept for the centralised photocopy solution for the university.

2.3. SUSTAINABILITY

2.3.1. Distinctive Education

UCDG Funds

The Library participated in deliberations, which culminated in the submission for funding to DHET. The funding allocation for 2024 has been allocated, albeit for a small amount (R91 015.00). Allowance was given to use available funds from the 2023 allocation to appoint tutors in the interim, which supplemented the 2024 allocation. The appointment process is completed. A total of 10 tutors were appointed and continued providing tutorship in the quarter.

2.3.2. Financial Sustainability: OPEX, CAPEX, Strategic Priorities Funds

For the period under review, the Library received a total operational budget of R **32 349 439.00**. As of 31 December 2024, 100% of the main budget and CAPEX had been spent, periodicals budget spent was sitting at 98.44%. - these were positive indicators that the library budget was used to meet current needs, as well as allow for the acquisition of new software and other online materials to support the academic and research project. All CAPEX items have been delivered except for one item which is scheduled to be delivered in the new year.

Transformational Agreements (TAs) with Big Publishers of Scientific Information (Read and Publish Agreements)

Science coming out of publicly funded universities should flourish inclusively and sustainably to ensure public access that is free from copyright restrictions. TAs are some of the mechanisms of ensuring just equitable and universal publicly funded research. DUT authors can publish in any of the six transformational agreements that have been signed by the DUT Library. These agreements are with major publishers of scientific knowledge: Taylor and Francis, ELSEVIER, Springer Nature, Wiley, Emerald and the Association for Computing Machinery (ACM). These agreements are also known as Read and Publish or transformational agreements that allow DUT to publish open access, without paying any APCs. For the reporting period under review, 127 Article Publishing Charge (APC) estimated saving of R7 297 553 was approved from the following publishers (ScienceDirect, Springer, Wiley, Taylor & Francis and Emerald).


There are some instances, especially in the case of Gold open access journals, whereby a 15 % discount on APCs is granted to DUT authors.



The uptake of transformational agreements (TAs) for the period January to December 2024 is covered below.

- 👃 A total of 127 articles were approved from January to December 2024, with an estimated saving of R7 297 553 to the institution. This is a significant increase in the uptake compared to 2023, where 58 articles with an estimated saving of R 3 719 733,78 were approved.
- ♣ As highlighted in the figure below, DUT authors have not taken up the free APCs for ACM Digital. This could be due to the nature of the resource, which is mainly conference proceedings.
- 4 It must be noted that as part of the agreement, there are waived APCs and discounted APCs. For example, ELSEVIER offers waived APCs for all the HYBRID journals and discounted APCs (15%) for their gold open-access journals.
- ♣ Of the 127 articles approved, 9 articles from ELSEVIER fell into the discounted APC category. It is important to note that approval for this category is done in conjunction with the Research Office.

From January to December 2024, 127 transformational agreements were approved, resulting in an estimated savings of R7,297,553 for the institution, a significant increase from the previous year, where 58 articles were approved, saving R3,719,733,78. This achievement will go a long way in increasing the visibility and impact of our research enterprise, hopefully translating into better rankings in the near future.


The team undertook an analysis of all the articles that were approved for waived and discounted APCs, by department. As highlighted in Table 2 (below), consistent with 2023, there was significant uptake of the waived APCs from the departments of the Institute for Water and Wastewater Technology (IWWT,), Biotechnology and Food Science, Research & Postgrad Support and Mechanical Engineering. These departments combined contributed to approximately 51% of all the articles approved.

The guidelines aim to integrate Indigenous languages and promote inclusivity in community services, coordinated by Prof Seifi Leili from the University of Birjand, Iran.

• External Professional Associations and Industry Engagements (Local, Regional & International)

After being nominated to serve as an additional member of the LIASA Board from June 2024 until June 2027, the Marketing and Communication librarian was later nominated within the board to serve as Chair of the Marketing portfolio. This portfolio now allows the new chair to recruit members from the ground from various sectors and institutions to assist with marketing LIASA activities and LIASA as an entity. All board members also attended a face-to-face session in celebration of National Librarian's Day, organised by the National Library of South Africa in Pretoria on July 10, 2024. - ♣ Mr Romeo Matumba, Marketing and Communication Librarian, continue to represent DUT and Africa at the International Federation of Library Association and Institutions (IFLA) Management and Marketing Standing Committee.

As part of the engaged university making an impactful contribution to society out there, the international stage becomes a playing field for many of our library staff. The marketing and communication librarian, Mr Romeo Matumba, continues to represent DUT and Africa at the International Federation of Library Association and Institutions (IFLA) Management and Marketing Standing Committee. He was invited to be part of the jury responsible for the IFLA PressReader International Library Marketing Award.

Calls for libraries to submit proposals were shared worldwide, including all library associations in the SADC region. The award recognises libraries that are implementing innovative and strategic methods to market library services and resources to their communities. The judging panel has since completed and finalised the process, and winners will be announced soon. As part of the judges, the member was further allocated the responsibility of answering queries and communicating with participants or libraries that have submitted entries. This responsibility was shared with another co-judge from Australia.

In February, the marketing and communication librarian was invited by the IFLA's Management and Marketing Standing Committee to deliver a presentation on DUT's experience regarding developing library marketing plans and strategies. This was for the IFLA's Management & Marketing mid-year sessions that took place in Lima, Peru, from 4 to 8 March 2024. The DUT library and Africa were well represented at this mid-year session, as there was only one speaker from the African continent.




Image: Q&A session after Romeo Matumba 's virtual presentation to delegates in Lima, Peru

External Assessment and Examination

For the period under review, Dr Malefetjane Phaladi, the Library Director, served as an examiner for a number of South African universities, including the University of Fort Hare, University of South Africa and the University of Limpopo for their Higher Research Degrees (Master's & Doctoral) students.

LIASA Conference

DUT Library staff attended and participated in the recent Library and Information Association of South Africa (LIASA) Annual Conference, held at the Durban Inkosi Albert Luthuli International Convention Centre (ICC) from 1 to 4 October 2024. The conference theme, reflecting 30 years of democracy in South Africa, was "Libraries in an Age of Democracy". The presence of DUT was felt strongly at this conference. The DUT Smart Librarians, who participated as volunteers, presenters, and facilitators, contributed significantly to the LIASA national conference. They chaired sessions, presented six papers, and directed the Gala Dinner Proceedings. Prof Olugabara, Executive Dean of Accounting and Informatics, delivered a keynote address on Artificial Intelligence. Dr Phaladi chaired a session in the presence of the KZN MEC for Sports, Arts, and Culture. DUT's representation extended beyond library staff, with Professor Oludayo Olugbara, Executive Dean of the Faculty of Accounting and Informatics, speaking on Al advancements and showcasing Al innovation projects.

DUT's representation and profile at the conference extended beyond library staff. Through the office of the Marketing and Communication Librarian, as a member of the new LIASA board and the DUT Library Services Director, the Executive Dean of the Faculty of Accounting and Informatics, Professor Oludayo Olugbara, was invited as one of the guest speakers. Professor Olugbara's presentation focused on Advancements in Artificial Intelligence: Challenges and Opportunities for the Library & Information Sector. As part of showcasing DUT's Al innovation projects, Prof Olu's biography was read by Neo, one of DUT's Al robots.

A photo of all the DUT Library staff members who volunteered, presented, and facilitated sessions at the LIASA Conference was shared on Facebook and is currently trending with over 2,149 views, 1,136 post impressions and 368 post engagements.



> CHELSA National Theses and Dissertation Repository Project

Library staff continue to be recognised and sought after for their expertise at a national level. A National Repository Task Team was convened by the Council on Higher Education Libraries (CHELSA) to investigate the feasibility of a national electronic theses and dissertations repository as well as a replacement for the defunct Nexus current research database. The steering committee is made up of two DUT Library staff members (Sagren Moodley and Sean Carte). They anticipate launching a proof-of-concept server soon.

Academic Citizenship Activities - External Assessment and Examination

For the period under review, as part of his academic citizenship, Dr Malefetjane Phaladi, the Library Director, served as an examiner for the University of South Africa and assessed a Master's thesis in Information Science for their student.

• Work Integrated Programme (WIL)

The Library hosted 10 3rd-year students from DUT's Library and Information Studies program for their WIL program, spending 8 weeks in the library, exposing them to academic library practices and participating in library activities and projects. The library is also offering a graduate employment programme, including an internship for DUT graduates, and a tutorship programme for 10 student tutors. The internships are designed to provide experiential development for DUT graduates, particularly those in the LIS program. The library also employs student library assistants to assist with library operations, with preference given to LIS students.
