DUT Library Shines Bright at the LIASA Conference

Library staff made a strong impact at the 2024 LIASA Annual Conference, held from I-4 October at the Durban ICC. Themed "Libraries in an Age of Democracy," the conference celebrated 30 years of democracy in South Africa, with DUT contributing meaningfully throughout the event. A record of twenty-one (21) staff members from DUT Library attended, actively participating as volunteers, presenters, session chairs, and facilitators. A total of six research papers were presented by DUT staff at the conference. Beyond library staff, DUT was also represented by Professor Oludayo Olugbara, Executive Dean of the Faculty of Accounting and Informatics, who delivered a keynote address titled "Advancements in Artificial Intelligence: Challenges and Opportunities for the Library & Information Sector." As part of his presentation, Professor Olugbara introduced Neo, a robot developed at DUT, who delivered his short biography, a live demonstration of the university's innovation in Al technology.

Mandela Day Activities

The DUT Library Community Outreach Project Team, led by Sarah Khan, partnered with an external charitable organisation, headed by Franki Hills, to launch a donation drive for the 67 Blankets for Mandela Day initiative. This drive aims to collect blankets, scarves, beanies, booties, and berets. Since 2014, the charity organisation has been recognised in the Guinness Book of World Records on four occasions, for its remarkable achievements. The crocheted items, made by DUT Library staff members, serve as a gesture of care for the most vulnerable, particularly during the winter season.

In alignment with the strategic objectives outlined in the university's ENVISION2030, the Library Community Outreach Project Team has established a collaborative relationship with the DUT Community Engagement Office for mutually beneficial initiatives. The handover event for the crocheted items took place at BM Patel Library, ML Sultan Campus, on 12 June 2024. The event was attended by the Library Management Team, the Library Community Outreach Project Team, Phumzile Xulu from the RIE: Engagement Office, and Franki Hills from the charity organisation. The Library Marketing and Communication Librarian, Romeo Matumba, facilitated the programme.

Sarah Khan delivered the welcome and background message, followed by remarks from the Director of Library Services, Dr Malefetjane Phaladi. Dr Phaladi expressed his deep appreciation and admiration for the team's outstanding work.



Open Access Week Public Lecture

he Durban University of Technology (DUT) Library commemorated International Open Access (OA) Week with a public lecture on 28 October 2024. The lecture, delivered virtually via Microsoft Teams, was presented by Dr Reggie Raju, Director of Research and Learning at the University of Cape Town Libraries.

Open Access Week provides the academic and research community with a platform to explore the benefits of Open Access, exchange insights with peers, and promote broader engagement in establishing Open Access as the standard for scholarly publishing and research dissemination. The 2024 theme, Community over Commercialization, builds on the previous year's discussions, underscoring the need to prioritise collaborative knowledge-sharing over commercial interests. Dr Raju's lecture, titled Shift in the Open Access Paradigm: Impact on Dissemination and Access to Information, examined the evolving landscape of Open Access publishing and its implications for equitable information access.


DUT's Director of Library Services, Dr Malefetjane Phaladi, delivered the opening remarks and formally introduced the guest speaker. The event was facilitated by the Marketing and Communication Librarian, Romeo Matumba, who also moderated the Question-and-Answer session, with the closing remarks delivered by Sagren Moodley, Manager: Information Resources.

Uring his lecture, Dr Raju reiterated that it is time for Africa to make Open Access (OA) and Open Scholarship work for the African continent. "We need to look at how we should work together as librarians and researchers to counter monopolistic publishing cartels. Open Access has introduced enormous possibilities, yet we have not adopted open access practices that meets our needs as Africans. The global north has introduced interventions that address their challenges, and we have unwittingly followed those practices which have further stripped our capacity to contribute to the world's knowledge production.

In his conclusion, Dr Raju edged participants to work together, to challenge the current narrative that affect the adoption of principes and practices that will benefit Africa. "The current publishing ecosystem is rooted in unfavourable historical constraints, such as geographic and language barriers and it is time that we come together to rethink and re-imagine our efforts and strategies in one voice", concluded Dr Raju.

The lecture attracted a distinguished audience from the Library and Information Services (LIS) sector in South Africa, including executives from the Library and Information Association of South Africa (LIASA), library directors from both public and academic institutions, as well as staff and students from DUT. The event provided an essential platform for scholarly discourse on the future of Open Access and its role in promoting inclusive and sustainable knowledge dissemination.

Copyright Services

Copyright plays a crucial role in the world of publishing, for authors to be incentivized. Publishers are certified to act on behalf of an author through a copyright transfer or exclusive licence to copy, publish and adapt work, whilst defending their integrity.

Have you considered copyright in an open-access world? Does it make a difference?

For all intent and purposes, open access should not affect usage, however, there is a common misconception that open access articles are not governed by copyright

FACTS: Open-access publishing authors have three choices: i) retain copyright, ii) share it, or iii) transfer it.

The essential principle of the Open Access (OA) movement is that knowledge derived from Publicly Funded R&D should be freely accessible.

Free is Great, Open Access is Even Greater

Open access, in contrast to free access, provides instant and unrestricted availability, distribution, and reuse of information without charge. With advancements in technology and shifts in our learning environment, from Library Management Systems (LMS) to e-reserves, the way information is shared is evolving. It is crucial for us to understand key considerations regarding the utilization of copyrighted content in academic settings. This will ensure that publicly funded research is made available in a manner that is open, inclusive, developmental and sustainable.

Durban International Book Fair

The EDUVOS Durban International Book Fair (DIBF) recently took place at the EDUVOS Umhlanga Campus. The theme, 'Once Upon a Time', highlighted the festival's commitment to promoting a culture of reading and storytelling, particularly among young children. The five-day literary feast featured book launches by both novice and established authors of novels, poetry, and academic works; workshops on cover layout and design, creative writing, and publishing; as well as a range of competitions, including a hugely popular chess tournament and the Mind Blown League. The event was open to the public and attracted more than 3,000 visitors, including local schools, community organisations, and book publishers.

In recognition of its ongoing support and commitment to promoting literacy and reading in the city, DUT was granted the privilege of co-naming one of the three allocated rooms used for book launches and workshops. The DUT Cheryl Roberts Stage hosted over 50 book launches, 22 of which featured academic, fiction, and poetry works authored by current and former DUT staff and students. Among the DUT student authors featured at the fair were Huvanya Naidoo, who presented *One Chance* and *The Legacy Series: Erased by Time*; Dumo Xaba, who showcased A *Dubious Alliance* and *The Legacy*; Dr Thabani Mazibuko, who introduced *Life Beyond the Karman Line: Outerspace*; Sboniso Manqele, who launched *Suicide Note*; and Samukelo Dlamini, who presented *Izimpumputhe*.

Additionally, nine Graphic Design students launched children's literature books, which they authored, illustrated, and published as part of a second-year project. These included Leo and the Sea Turtle by Taariq Chetty, Wash Your Hands by Sinoyolo Tantsi, Emihle's River Rescue Mission by Lusanda Mzolo, Thembi and the Umgungundlovu River by Reese Pather, Tony the Whale's Big Problem by Mpathwenhle Ndaba, The Adventure of Maya and Hooterman by Jadene Pillay, Heart of the River by Nikhiel Pakkiri, Mkhulu and the Wooden Guitar by Siyaphila Mbuyazi, and Tales of Togetherness by Tyrese Ramgopaul.

Seven DUT staff members launched their academic works at the book fair, covering topics such as healthcare quality, information services, bioplastics, residential satisfaction, and higher education during COVID-19. Poetry collections by Dr Marí Peté and Lee Scott were also introduced. Book launch sessions were expertly facilitated by DUT colleagues. A key feature of the DIBF was a series of workshops, including Content Layout & Design by Prof Barry Lottering and Creative Writing by Prof Gift Mheta and Dr Jeff Mkhize. An insightful literacy session was led by Phumzile Xulu, with DUT Journalism students sharing their community projects. A notable addition was the participation of volunteers from higher education institutions.

Transformational Agreements

ransformational agreements (TAs), also known as Read and Publish agreements, are contracts negotiated between institutions, publishers or consortiums, that allow research work to be available on openaccess platforms. It allows authors at DUT to publish approved articles in open-access platforms without having to personally fund the cost of article processing charges (APCs).

As part of its commitment to delivering library and information services, along with research support, in a more open, developmental, inclusive, and sustainable manner, the library continues to promote its portfolio of transformational agreements at faculty board meetings and other strategic forums. Moreover, a marketing and communication strategy is in place to further strengthen the dissemination of this service to the DUT community.

LIASA Launches SA Digital Literacy Day (SADLD)

he Library and Information Association of South Africa (LIASA) launched the South African Digital Literacy Day (SADLD) on 25th October 2024 as part of Global Media and Information Literacy (GMIL) Week, which took place from 21st to 25th October. This initiative was a response to UNESCO's recommendation to promote digital literacy during GMIL Week, aiming to educate and empower communities to engage productively with digital technologies.

GMIL Week is an international movement that encourages media and information literacy stakeholders to organise events and activities related to media and information literacy within their communities, cities, municipalities, or regions. The 2024 theme, "The New Digital Frontiers of Information: Media and Information Literacy for Public Interest Information," addressed the transformative impact of emerging technologies on the production and dissemination of public-interest information, highlighting both opportunities and challenges.

LIASA recognised that digital literacy had become an essential competency for communities to participate in the modern world and acknowledged its role in supporting other literacies.

n alignment with GMIL Week, the objectives of the South African Digital Literacy Day were:

- To serve as a platform for libraries, institutions, government agencies, and the private sector to collaborate in raising awareness about the critical need for digital skills in the contemporary world, particularly within the context of the Fourth Industrial Revolution (4IR) and the global digital economy.
- To promote and recognise initiatives that raise awareness of digital literacy for lifelong learning, personal development, employability, and entrepreneurship.

The core theme of Digital Literacy Day, "Enabling the Sustainable Co-existence of Technology and Humans: Reducing the Digital Divide through Digital Skills," highlighted the need to equip communities with digital skills for inclusive participation in the digital economy. An annual subtheme was introduced to address emerging challenges and trends, ensuring ongoing relevance.

South African Digital Literacy Day became an annual event on the last Friday of Global Media and Information Literacy (GMIL) Week, typically in the third week of October. It supported key Sustainable Development Goals:

- ⇒ **SDG 4: Quality Education:** Expanding digital, technical, and vocational skills by 2030.
- ⇒ SDG 9: Industry, Innovation, and Infrastructure: Promoting sustainable industrialisation, innovation, and ICT access.

The event, hosted at the National Library of South Africa (NLSA), saw most attendees joining via Zoom. Speakers Included the National Library's CEO and National Librarian, Kepi Madumo; CHELSA Chair, Nomawethu Danster; Gauteng Provincial Education representative, Deon Van Vuuren; LIASA President-Elect, Professor Lefose Makgahlela; Department of Sports, Arts and Culture Director, Puleng Kekana; and LIASA President, Charlie Molepo.


DUT & UNISA Book Launch

Dr Godfrey Gombana Musvoto, a senior lecturer in Town and Regional Planning at DUT, unveiled his newly edited book' The Dynamics of Residential Satisfaction in Low-income Human Settlements in South Africa", exploring residential satisfaction, the sense of contentment derived from housing. Speaking at the launch, he highlighted South Africa's complex housing history and the challenges affecting satisfaction, including poor living conditions, inadequate maintenance, limited facilities, and high crime rates.

Unlike developed nations such as the US, UK, and Australia, South Africa has yet to conduct systematic residential satisfaction surveys. Dr Musvoto emphasised the need for both qualitative and quantitative approaches to understand housing issues, particularly the aspirations of low-income youth seeking independent households. Funded by the National Research Foundation (NRF) from 2019 to 2022, the project enabled international research collaboration. Contributors included doctors, professors, and postgraduate students from various South African universities. At the launch, Professor Paulus Zulu (UKZN) provided historical insights, linking South Africa's housing challenges to apartheid-era policies. Dr Meiya Nthoesane (Unisa Press) praised the book's impact, while Dr Gilberte Lincoln addressed the challenges of conducting research during COVID-19, particularly in Mayville, where formal and informal housing coexist.

Delivering the vote of thanks, Dr Malefetjane Phaladi, DUT's Library Services Director, highlighted the book's role in shaping policy development, human settlement theories, and academic empowerment, involving honours and masters students as well as postdoctoral fellows.

Book Club Debate On Using Indigenous Languages for Library Services

The DUT Library Book Club hosted an event featuring book reviews and a debate on integrating indigenous languages into teaching, learning, research, and library services on I November 2024 at the BM Patel Library. The guest speakers were Pastor Sihle Yeni, founder of El-Betel Worldwide Ministries International, and Ms Yachal Du Plessis, Lecturer in the Faculty of Management Sciences at DUT. The Programme was directed by Tamara Ntombenhle Sima, a third-year student from the LIS Programme, under the guidance of Romeo Matumba, DUT's Librarian: Marketing and Communication.

Mr Matumba began proceedings with a welcome address, stressing the importance of librarians and other DUT staff in fostering DUT's graduate attributes. He urged staff to mentor and coach students through programmes such as book and poetry clubs.

The Book Club Chairperson, Prince Mchunu, a third-year LIS student, outlined the purpose of the event. His introduction led to a debate entitled 'Integrating Indigenous Languages into Teaching, Learning, Research, and Library Services', which sparked a lively discussion between two student teams and the audience, highlighting the topic's relevance within the DUT community.

The debate session generated critical discourse around the preservation and integration of indigenous languages at higher institutions, leading to the sharing of ideas and practices. Guest speaker, Yachal Duplesis provided an insightful overview of the topic, offering analysis and commentary on points raised by both teams and addressing questions from the audience. "Today's topic addresses key aspects of decolonization, highlighting the importance of extending this discussion beyond the walls of DUT. We must foster this kind of dialogue to reach a common ground and collaborate effectively in bridging the gaps left by colonial powers in South Africa", added Yachal.

As part of the programme, a session was held to review two books by Sihle Yeni: 'The Workhorse: The Money Mindset' and 'His Majesty: The Holy Spirit'. This segment was moderated by Nokuphiwa Dlamini, another outstanding second-year student from the LIS programme, who engaged participants with thoughtprovoking questions to stimulate the discussion. Pastor Sihle Yeni, author of the reviewed books, shared valuable insights into his writing style and inspirations. He further expressed gratitude to the panel for their outstanding reviews of his two works.










Library Staff Team Building




